Pinellas County Human Services is now accepting applications for federal funding through the Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant Countywide (JAG-C). JAG-C provides financial assistance to local projects that offer a high probability of preventing and controlling crime and improving the criminal justice system. JAG-C is a pass-through grant of federal funds allocated to the Florida Department of Law Enforcement (FDLE) by the Bureau of Justice Assistance.

FDLE is responsible for the final review of applications and award approval.

B.1. Describe the mission and purpose of the organization.

Founded in 1979, ALPHA (Acceptance. Life. Purpose. Hope. Accomplishment) House (AH) Pinellas County provides housing and trauma-informed supportive services to homeless pregnant women and teens, new mothers with infants, and families experiencing crisis pregnancies. For over 40 years AH has been the only residential maternity program in Pinellas County providing therapeutic services and unconditional love to over 3,000 unduplicated women, teens, and their infants. Every single mother/expecting mother we serve has experienced catastrophic trauma and victimization through domestic violence, sexual violence, human trafficking, abuse, and neglect. Annually, 94% of those who graduate from our housing programs make a triumphant transition into permanent housing and sustainable independent living.

Our mission is fulfilled when a mother has received the emotional healing and mental health supports that are necessary for her to reclaim her life, safely care for her baby, complete her education, gain job skills, find housing, and become self-sufficient so she can raise her baby in a healthy environment.

B.2 Explain the organization's experience and capacity relevant to the proposed program, including staff qualifications and experience.

AH's unique and extensive expertise in addressing the intersection of intergenerational abuse, human trafficking, exploitation, poverty, and homelessness is a culmination of having a 43-year presence serving this marginalized population in Pinellas County. Our experience in identifying and meeting the individual critical needs of high-risk women/teens has created a trauma-informed culture in every aspect of our program. AH delivers a wrap-around model of care for comprehensive services integration, including basic needs, trauma-informed case management, employment and education services, wellness/abuse prevention curriculum, and life skills.

AH is led by a devoted Executive Director, Jennifer Stracick who holds a Master's degree in Social Work and is a Licensed Certified Social Worker with the Florida Department of Health (and is currently attaining her doctorate). Additionally, Ms. Stracick has lived experience as a teen mother herself who has risen to leadership through purpose-driven resilience. Ms. Stracick has been leading the charge at AH for 16 years and is guided and evaluated by our Board of Directors which is comprised of many Pinellas County community leaders and public servants. Day-to-day operations and services are delivered by a team of credentialed professionals with backgrounds in social work, mental health, and human services.

C. Community Needs

C.1. Clearly identify the problem to be addressed through the proposed program. Provide supporting statistics or data specific to Pinellas County such as needs assessments, interviews, waiting lists, surveys, trends and/or analyses. The link between homelessness, violence, and child abuse among young women and teens is clear and demands our attention. Each night, there are more than 6,800 homeless children, families, and adults in Pinellas County (2015 - 2020 Pinellas County Point-in-Time (PIT) Homeless Report.) A startling 62% are in St. Petersburg, including teens and young women who are on the AH waiting list (currently there are 6), each seeking a safe haven but living on the streets due to a lack of program funding.

The National Alliance to End Homelessness 2020 report revealed Pinellas County has the 3rd highest rate of homelessness in Florida and is the 2nd most dangerous place for homeless people (National Coalition for the Homeless 2017 Report). Included in these statistics are homeless, pregnant teens, and young mothers. Single unaccompanied women comprise a growing trend upward from 26.9% in 2016 to 31.2% in 2020 (Florida Department of Children and Families, Office of Homelessness, Council on Homelessness Annual Report).

Once homeless, there are few safety nets available for young women who become mothers, the lack of which can result in devastating consequences such as substance abuse, unsafe sexual practices, mental health issues, and repeated abuse. AH is a beacon of hope for these traumatized young women. single unaccompanied women comprise a growing trend upward from 26.9% in 2016 to 31.2% in 2020.

Homelessness is predicted to continue to rise over the next four years despite the measures taken by the federal government, states, and localities in response to the pandemic and its economic fallout. Considerable unmet needs remained evident near the end of 2021 with 20 million households reporting having too little to eat and 10 million households behind on rent. In the first quarter of 2022 three million fewer people are employed compared to prepandemic numbers (Center on Budget and Policy Priorities).

C.2d. Provide a brief summary of the accomplishments that have been achieved and/or the needs met to date.

One of our biggest accomplishments is our meaningful growth, as a means to help more mothers/pregnant women/teens break the cycle of generational abuse. Homeless women/teens who have experienced chronic adversity and abuse (domestic violence, sexual violence, human trafficking, exploitation, rejection, neglect, and victimization)



from a young age may not consider abusive experiences as trauma. Instead, these experiences are viewed as a normal part of daily life. This way of understanding and describing adversity does not mean that experiences such as these are not traumatic; these experiences are many times misunderstood as such due to a history of life-long abuse.

Since AH began offering abuse-specific services through counseling and prevention, case management, group therapy and mentoring, 99% of mothers are able to report three qualities of a healthy relationship — demonstrating they understand the differences between healthy vs unhealthy relationships. Additionally, 97% of mothers identify three ways in which power and control can show up as behavior in abusive relationships. There has also been an 80% decrease in our calls to the Child Abuse Hotline for suspected abuse over the past year.

These interventions help our residents to positively refocus their energies on maximizing their child's developmental experiences. As a continuation of the project previously funded by JAG-C funds, in the past year, we have reduced child abuse reporting by an additional 10 percent. We have also increased the daily therapy sessions that are available to mothers who are struggling. We have also integrated daily child development and parenting resources to residents who are struggling in their new role as a mother. All these efforts, coupled with the housing, education, food, support, and role modeling lead to the development of healthy minds, bodies, and babies — and the reduction of child abuse and homelessness over the past year

C.3. How will the proposed program be coordinated with existing programs in the community?

ALPHA House leverages the full weight of its continuum of care, community resources, and collaborations for the enrichment of our programs, the women/teens we serve, and to help minimize our costs. These leveraged services include the use of AH's extensive network of community resources and providers, ensuring that the linkages offered are relevant, timely, culturally competent, and effective in meeting their needs. AH receives gifts in kind and donated services to help reduce our organizational budget on recurring costs such as food, clothing, hygiene products, workshops, and activities.

Collaboration is at the heart of how our services unfold. For example, we receive referrals from emergency and transition housing organizations such as the St. Petersburg Free Clinic, CASA (Community Action Stops Abuse), the Salvation Army's Emergency Shelter, the YWCA Family Village Emergency Program, and 211 Tampa Bay Cares.

We also foster relationships with other service providers in our area such as:

- The Guardian Ad Litem program, provides mentorship for teen mothers
- 211 Tampa Bay Cares, connects women in need to our program
- Operation PAR, provides substance abuse assessments and treatment if needed
- Healthy Start/Healthy Families, provides pregnancy education and parenting education
- Worknet Pinellas, helps with job placement
- Ready for Life, provides aftercare to foster care girls
- Tomlinson School, provides secondary education
- Johnnie Ruth Clark, provides medical care for mom and baby
- Habitat for Humanity of Pinellas, helps our moms qualify to buy a new house
- Pinellas County Housing Authority, provides housing vouchers to the moms upon completion of our resident program.

D. Scope of Services

Please provide the following information.

D.1. Describe the program or types of services to be delivered. How do the services apply to the proposed FDLE priority area?

AH services include therapeutic counseling, trauma-informed case management, crisis intervention, abuse prevention, evidence-based (women-specific) Healing Trauma curriculum (published by the Hazelden Foundation), life skills education, and vocational education. Designed to help women begin to recover from the effects of trauma, Healing Trauma is a gender-responsive, six-session (90-minute sessions) educational program for women that uses a strength-based approach to empower women and increase their sense of self. The program helps women discover the strengths they have, increase the skills they need for healing and focuses on emotional development. The program uses psychoeducational and cognitive-behavioral therapy techniques, expressive arts, body-focused exercises, mindfulness, and relational therapy. They also will learn coping mechanisms (activities and techniques) to help them feel grounded and safe. This program addresses two of the FDLE priority areas; (1) Prevention and Education: addressing domestic violence prevention and, (2) Crime Victim/Witness Programs: addressing children exposed to violence, abuse, and neglect, and counseling & clinical services.

As our mothers go through the process of understanding what has happened to them and acknowledging how abuse has affected them, AH offers ongoing support through weekly meetings with their designated Case Manager, both individually and in groups. Case managers link our clients to other community services and educational resources; our Life Skills Counselors help residents to identify parenting and mental health goals; and they work diligently to educate clients on how to meet the challenges of everyday life, including effective parenting, job skills, healthy nutrition, and money management education. Our goal is to provide the education and life lessons that are necessary to fight future child abuse and transform each mother and child from hopelessness to a world of self-sufficiency.

D.2. What is the target population and eligibility criteria?

The target population we serve (and eligibility criteria) are homeless pregnant women and teens, ranging in age from 14-41 years old (95% are between the ages of 14-25 years old), with a child under 9 months old. They come to us from throughout Pinellas County.

100% of the mothers we serve are survivors of trauma from either human trafficking, abuse (emotional, physical, and/or abandonment), and many are experiencing crisis pregnancies as a result of the trauma they have experienced. Most of the mothers and children we serve are from Pinellas County and over three-quarters are from South Pinellas County. The majority of the young women who come to AH prove that homelessness and teen pregnancy are directly linked to previous physical, sexual, and/or emotional abuse. Most have already engaged in negative behaviors and are at risk of perpetuating abuse, neglect and becoming victims of intergenerational poverty. Many of the teen mothers we serve simultaneously experience the challenges of adolescence and first-time parenthood. For them, their capacity to provide quality parenting and their chances of living productive lives are extremely compromised without our support. With this in mind, in 2016 we established an Aftercare Assistance/Alumni program which helps clients who recently completed



our residential program to stay connected to AH while they are in the process of transitioning to a life of independence. Aftercare Assistance is available for up to 12 months for those young and/or new mothers who need this additional support to ensure their successful integration back into the community and as a continued measure to prevent child abuse.

The young women who arrive at AH seek a simple basic human need - to feel safe and protected while preparing for the birth of their child. They need help with all pre-and post-natal aspects of being a new mother. 100% of our clients suffer from depression and low esteem. They have experienced inconsistent schooling and access to education, lack coping skills, are distrustful, and many are penniless. They require services that are holistic and comprehensive in nature to address their physical, emotional, mental health, and spiritual needs and well-being. Approximately 50% of our clients are over the age of 18, and 50% are teens who are homeless when referred through their caseworker and are admitted on an emergency basis. Most have a history of intergenerational poverty, academic failure, or exploitation, and have dropped out of school before reaching us. They lack sufficient skills to care for themselves and to parent and nurture their babies. AH offers them the hope they need for a better future.

D.3. Program Specifics

D.3a. Identify the geographic service area.

AH serves all of Pinellas County.

D.3b. Hours/days of operation for program/project during contract period.

AH is opened 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, 365 days a year. As it pertains to this funding request, the abuse-prevention education series is a six-week, 90-minute class. Abuse-prevention is also delivered through counseling, case management, group/individual therapy, workshops, and mentoring which occur between the hours of 8am – 5pm, Monday through Friday.

D.3c. Program Staff

Staff for this funding request:

Counselors ensure that effective case management, mental health, substance abuse and medical treatment are provided for each resident. They conduct new resident intakes, assess individual counseling needs, and develop a treatment plan with each client. They establish and maintain a weekly individual counseling schedule and facilitates all abuse prevention classes/trainings.

Case Managers develop a Success Plan which is at the core of how women/teens and staff partner to create goals that are victim-centered, focus on strengths and lead to positive outcomes and overall well-being. They identify strengths and goals, potential barriers, and service needs. Identified goals align with five core outcomes: social-emotional well-being, housing, employment, education, and social connections.

Life Skills Counselor is part of the clinical team working with Counselors and Case Managers on the Success Plan. They provide invaluable skills development in the areas of budgeting, banking, saving, meal planning, resume building, and education services that help build their confidence and lessen the known stressors that can trigger abusive behaviors.

Residential Staff Assistants (RSAs) are staffed 16 hours/day Mon-Fri and 12 hours/day on weekends providing critical clinical follow-up and documentation. Often, residents will hold back during individual and group sessions but will provide honest feedback with RSAs in casual conversations. RSAs care for the babies when mothers attend therapeutic and case management sessions. They accompany minors to the hospital when care is needed and support them in labor



and delivery when they give birth.

In addition to general onboarding training (Trauma-Informed Care, Motivational Interviewing, First Aid/CPR, and Harm Reduction), staff undergoes rigorous training including human trafficking and abuse prevention. Staff must have ALL training, education, and experience relevant to the services they are providing.

D.3d. What Direct Services can this program or project provide?

Ending this generational cycle of abuse is one of the primary missions of AH's residential and community programs. AH offers abuse-specific counseling, case management, group therapy, and mentoring.

AH's full continuum of direct services, provided through a trauma-informed lens meets the physical, emotional, educational, vocational, and spiritual well-being of the women and teens we serve. In addition to shelter, food, and clothing AH provides Medical and Mental Healthcare, Case Management, Education and Employment Services, Positive Youth Development, and Parenting Workshops that teach residents to value themselves and their children.

The Abuse Prevention/Trauma Healing curriculum provides direct assistance to women and teens that helps them process their trauma(s) and teaches them about healthy vs unhealthy relationships. Residents meet with their Counselor on a weekly basis as a group and individually to learn about victimization and abuse, process their individual trauma, and develop the skills needed in creating healthy relationships. Our mothers are led on a healing journey to recovery as they learn to identify abusive behaviors and learn techniques that will help safeguard them to prevent future trauma.

New this year, all staff will take Mental Health First Aid training to improve their understanding of and learn how to identify the signs and symptoms of mental health and substance-use issues. They will learn how to interact with a person in crisis, and how to connect a person with help, trauma, and self-care.

D.3e. Service Units (Number, unit, time increment- 52 Families per year or 400 pounds of food per week)

AH expects to serve 35 residents this year (depending on the individual life circumstances of the homeless women/teens served, with turnover rates, we can serve up to 78 women/teens a year (pre-Covid) through AH's residential services for homeless mothers and expecting teens/women. We will deliver therapeutic abuse-prevention (individual and group) follow-up services and documentation, and life-skills development for a total of 3,540 units (hours) of service.

To monitor our progress, success, and impact, AH, utilizes the Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) a database that tracks real-time data on clients who are being served, services they receive, their progress toward their individualized goals, and program outcomes.

Additionally, AH measures the effectiveness of our services by collecting and reviewing client survey data. All participants receive a pre-and post-survey consisting of 6 questions to assist AH in evaluating and improving services to the community. The data is collected and reviewed by the Director of Residential Programs, and the leadership team. We also evaluate the success of our agency by tracking the number of clients served, the number of successful exits to permanent/permanent supportive housing, and the number of women in our program who gained employment and/or furthered their education while in the program. In 2020, despite COVID-19 related concerns, 15 residents successfully exited to a stable destination with 22 moms who enrolled in school and 98% of mothers who have not returned to homelessness – all of which, received trauma-informed case management, abuse-specific counseling, group therapy, and mentoring.

These include increased utilization of data and analytics to evaluate return on investment; major donor strategies; a focus on maximizing existing and new government grant opportunities; an investment in Web-based giving; a more effective, data-driven, but relationship-focused foundation strategy; a new emphasis on corporate giving; increased volunteer engagement of future generations of donors; and strategic gift-in-kind acceptance to offset actual agency expenses. AH's commitment to sustaining the program is underscored by the fact that no one program at AH is reliant on only one source of funding.







ALPHA House respectfully requests funding in the amount of \$58,364 (3559 Units) from the Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant to support our mission of helping homeless mothers, teens, and their babies to break the cycle of homelessness and intergenerational abuse. Grant funds will be used specifically in providing critical supportive clinical follow up services for therapeutic groups, individual counseling, intensive supports, and case management services. These services assist women/teens in the vital processing and recovery of individual trauma and abuse — how they talk about trauma, express distress, understand traumatic events, and heal. It will also assist in funding the costs for a one-time Mental Health First Aid Training for 18 staff (\$65/per person x 18 units) and one-time Trauma Healing Curriculum costs (\$700 for 1 unit).

CONTRACTUAL SERVICES POSITION DESCRIPTIONS

• Critical clinical follow up and documentation enhances therapeutic programming and helps expedite residents' path to healing, recovery and preventing the cycle of generational abuse. Childcare is provided for the babies when mothers attend therapeutic and case management sessions. Residential Staff Assistants also accompany our residents when they need to go to the hospital and when it's time to deliver their baby. They offer advocacy and support during these stressful events. The Resident Advisor is an essential position to their clinical support. They are with the residents for long periods of time and develop authentic bonds with them, many times the women/teens will confide in the Residential Staff Advisor during casual conversations offering information that they are not as comfortable sharing during clinical sessions.

- Life Skills development services provide mothers with opportunities to learn and build the skills needed in becoming confident and self-sufficient. The Life Skills Counselor is a member of the clinical team providing invaluable skills-development and lessening the stressors that trigger abusive behaviors.
- Individual Counseling services offer mothers the opportunity to process their trauma individually. These services are provided by the Counselor position. The Counselor is a Registered Social Work Intern with the Florida Board of Health. She is also working towards her LCSW.
- Therapeutic Groups offer mothers the opportunity to learn together through the evidence-based Healing Trauma curriculum that is also coordinated by a Counselor position. The Counselor provides these groups to all residents.
- Case Management services are provided by the Case Manager position. The Case Manager offers resources to the mothers and ensures that all mothers are working and/or attending school. The Case Manager also transports residents to all doctor's appointments and assesses their daily progress for permanent housing.
- Supervision is delivered by the Director of Operations and the Executive Director who holds a Master's Degree in Social Work and is a Licensed Certified Social Worker with the Florida Department of Health.



B. Organization Profile

B.1. Describe the mission and purpose of the organization.

Directions for Living (DFL) has a rich history of healing and preventing trauma in our community due to homelessness, mental illness, and addiction. For the last 40 years, DFL has served local residents of all ages by providing crucial research supported and evidence-based behavioral health services to thousands of adults, children, and families annually. DFL provides critical medical (i.e., psychiatric, medication management, counseling, substance misuse) and clinical (i.e., adult and child case management) services and is dedicated to making behavioral health care accessible and affordable for all. Many clients who need the above-mentioned services and supports are at or below the Federal Poverty Line, struggle with housing stability or homelessness, and are under insured or without insurance. DFL serves some of the most vulnerable individuals and ensures they receive the care they need to live safely and securely in their community by targeting immediate stabilization and facilitating self-sufficiency.

For 34 years, DFL has been serving the local homeless population through a variety of services that make up a mini continuum of care: 1) homeless intensive case management and care coordination services, 2) prevention and diversion services, 3) rapid rehousing, and 4) housing-focused outreach (Housing First) to individuals, aged adults, chronically homeless, adults with dependent children, and young adults who have aged-out of the child welfare system. DFL's Homeless Street Outreach teams target five jurisdictions across the county and are responsible for successfully engaging hard-to-reach residents living without homes with needed life-saving resources and linking them with community supports and services.

Research on Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACE) serve as a cornerstone for all DFL programs and is embedded into all areas of our agency (i.e., mission, policies). ACEs are stressful or traumatic events that occur in a child's life prior to the age of 18, including exposure to physical, emotional, or sexual abuse and neglect, domestic violence, substance misuse or mental health issues, parental separation or divorce, and/or a household member being incarcerated. The ACE study taught us that when children are exposed to chronic stressful events, their neurodevelopment can be disrupted. As a result, a child's cognitive functioning or ability to cope with negative or disruptive emotions may be impaired. Eventually, these unhealthy coping mechanisms can contribute to an abundance of poor health outcomes in growing children, both immediately and later in their adult life. In fact, people with six or more ACEs died nearly 20 years earlier on average than those without ACEs.

DFL's mission is to be a welcoming and compassionate provider, advocate, and partner to adults, children, and families in need of integrated healthcare, social support, safety, and hope for the future. DFL's vision: Thriving children. Empowered adults. Strong families

B.2 Explain the organization's experience and capacity relevant to the proposed program, including staff qualifications and experience.

DFL has been working hard to enhance the response to persons in crisis who have a mental illness through a variety of police/mental health collaborations. DFL works with several law enforcement agencies by pairing a master's-level

Further, DFL developed an innovative approach to respond to the community's mental health needs using Telehealth Remote Access to Crisis Evaluation (TRACE), a Behavioral Health expansion program between DFL and four local Police Departments. Finally, DFL and the Largo Police Department have worked collaboratively on the Enriching Lives through Mental Health Services (ELMS) program. The ELMS Officer and Navigator partnership help stabilize residents with severe and persistent mental illness and/or substance misuse in order to mitigate institutionalization and ensure that high utilizers get appropriate services and community-based support. This partnership has been successful at de-escalating high stress situations, lessening the number of return calls that must be responded to, reducing mental health crisis related arrests and repeat calls for service, and reducing Baker Acts to restrictive facilities. DFL knows that homelessness, co-occurring mental illness, and substance misuse disorders are prevalent among those interacting with the criminal justice system. Far more often, these individuals are better served by the behavioral health services offered at DFL, than by the law enforcement and or the criminal justice system.

B.3. What credentials or licensing does the organization maintain which support the program?

All DFL programs are nationally accredited. DFL first received accreditation from the Commission on Accreditation of Rehabilitation Facilities (CARF) in 1997. In 2021, CARF International granted a 3-year reaccreditation for DFL's programs, for the ninth consecutive cycle, which represents the highest level of accreditation that can be awarded to an organization and demonstrates DFL's admirable adherence to the CARF standards. At an organizational level, DFL maintains licensure in accordance with Chapter 397, Florida Statutes to provide substance abuse services for general intervention and outpatient treatment for children and adults.

DFL also partners with law enforcement as the lead agency for Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) training. CIT training increases law enforcements knowledge and sensitivity to those impacted by mental illness in our community. DFL plays a significant role in this crucial training. Currently, DFL has the only Certified CIT Coordinator, our President & CEO, April Lott, serves as the CIT Chair and an instructor, and dozens of DFL staff prepare throughout the week to provide important training support in the form of role plays where the officers get to practice their new calm, assess, facilitate skills. In the last 12 months, DFL provided the 40-hour CIT training to over 600 officers throughout Pinellas County.

C.1. Clearly identify the problem to be addressed through the proposed program. Provide supporting statistics or data specific to Pinellas County such as needs assessments, interviews, waiting lists, surveys, trends and/or analyses. Pinellas County has one of the highest rates of death by suicide, Baker Acts, and homelessness in the state. In 2020, 175 Pinellas County residents died by suicide. This rate does not account for the more than 1,122 youth and adults who experienced non-fatal intentional self-harm injuries (Florida Department of Health). In 2020, Pinellas County reported 32,348 adults experienced a serious mental illness and 11,523 individuals were hospitalized as a result of mental and behavioral health disorders (Florida Department of Health).

Because police officers are often the first professionals to interact with people suffering from behavioral health issues, ensuring individuals are triaged to the appropriate level of care has important implications. The National Council for Behavioral Health stated 10 percent of 911 calls are associated with a mental health crisis and those calls often end with individuals being arrested. Further, when answering these types of calls, County resources are used inefficiently and result in increased costs to the community. The National Council for Behavioral Health reported costs to taxpayers *Printed By: Amanda Craft on 5/17/2022* 6 of 12



reaches \$45 billion annually as a result of incarcerating people with mental illness.

Law enforcement mental health calls can be time-consuming and complex, often leaving officers with a set of choices that include leaving an individual in a potentially harmful situation, taking them to a crisis stabilization unit, or arresting them. The demand for time-sensitive behavioral health supports are needed to ensure that persons experiencing a mental health crisis receive the right level of care and support at the right time and with the right acuity. In response to this need, DFL has developed a multi-layered system of supports, including TRACE, that work synergistically to help prevent individuals in crisis from using emergency services for non-law enforcement issues and cycling in and out of crisis stabilization units or jail.

C.2d. Provide a brief summary of the accomplishments that have been achieved and/or the needs met to date.

Telehealth Remote Access to Crisis Evaluation or TRACE is an expansion of the partnership between Directions for Living (DFL) and our community's Law Enforcement Agencies. TRACE allows on-duty Officers to access tele-behavioral health services while on active emergency calls serving the community. TRACE has responded to 169 calls from April 2021 to current and diverted 60 percent of individuals from being Baker Acted or incarcerated. The program's ability to provide Police Officers with timely mental health assessment and evaluation has significantly reduced the number of individuals being transported to a crisis stabilization unit or jail. Collaboration between law enforcement and mental health service providers is essential and using technology to meet the growing demand of the community has shown promising outcomes for those in crisis.

C.3. How will the proposed program be coordinated with existing programs in the community?

Collaboration is key to serving individuals experiencing a mental health crisis as it allows organizations to come together in an effort to address complex issues in creative ways. Directions for Living (DFL) collaborates with nearly every social services agency in the County on a daily basis. DFL's existing knowledge of and partnerships with community providers enables program staff to assess and link clients to the most appropriate level of care.

Individuals served by the TRACE call are considered a priority client within DFL's established network of service lines. Given the breadth of service provisions offered in-house, many warm handoffs occur within DFL, which means greater coordination and collaboration between providers and the client and greater continuity of care. This includes outpatient individual/family counseling, case management, psychiatric/medication, homeless services, and SOAR assistances. DFL has established a strong partnership with Pinellas County Department of Health (DOH) and is the DOH sole contracted behavioral health care provider. In addition, DFL's team works with Operation PAR and Westcare for substance abuse concerns and other behavioral health providers to ensure individuals are served promptly and holistically.

DFL's partnership with law enforcement also extends to our work as the lead agency for Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) training. CIT training increases law enforcements knowledge and sensitivity to those impacted by mental illness in our community. DFL plays a significant role in this crucial training. DFL has the only Certified CIT Coordinator, our President & CEO, April Lott, serves as the CIT Chair and an instructor, and dozens of DFL staff prepare throughout the week to provide important training support in the form of role plays where the officers get to practice their new calm, assess, facilitate skills. In the last 12 months, DFL provided this 40-hour training to over 600 officers throughout Pinellas County.

D. Scope of Services

D.1. Describe the program or types of services to be delivered. How do the services apply to the proposed FDLE priority area?

Telehealth Remote Access to Crisis Evaluation (TRACE) is a behavioral health expansion program developed by DFL that provides virtual crisis intervention to divert persons from entering the wrong system (i.e., jail, crisis stabilization units) and is currently used in collaboration with four local Police Departments. TRACE is one component of a comprehensive, multi-layered system of supports.

TRACE allows on-duty officers access to real-time Tele-behavioral Health services while on active 911 emergency calls serving the community. Partnering together, law enforcement is able to access clinical consultation services to assess individuals experiencing a mental health crisis to determine the best outcome to the call and to link individuals to timely follow-up behavioral health care. TRACE aims to provide assessment services to clients who appear to be in crisis to help determine the most appropriate emergency call outcome, all while supporting the Police Department. Police officers are equipped with tablets to use in the field to initiate virtual mental health assessments between individuals in crisis and a DFL on-demand behavioral health clinician.

This co-response model increases officers' ability to recognize signs and symptoms of mental health issues and the need for professional help. It also provides an observational learning opportunity that includes training on how to better deescalate and address an individual's mental health needs. Finally, individuals experiencing a behavioral health crisis will have faster access to behavioral health services post law enforcement response. Substantial cost savings are anticipated for behavioral health, law enforcement, and the community, while improving the lives of individuals in crisis.

TRACE is a collaborative mental health program with law enforcement providing virtual crisis intervention to divert persons from entering the wrong system, which falls under the mental health and law enforcement FDLE priority areas.

D.2. What is the target population and eligibility criteria?

The target population and eligibility are the individuals and/or families in the Cities of Largo, Belleair, Treasure Island, and Gulfport who are experiencing a behavioral health crisis and who come to the attention of a participating Police Department during an active 911 emergency call for service.

D.3. Program Specifics

D.3a. Identify the geographic service area.

Directions for Living (DFL) is located in Pinellas County, Florida. The benefit of the TRACE service, is that it is not geographically limited. The service is connected to each geographical catchment area that the law enforcement agencies serve. Currently, DFL is partnering with the Cities of Largo, Belleair, Treasure Island, and Gulfport to provide TRACE services.

D.3b. Hours/days of operation for program/project during contract period.

The current hours and days of operation are Sunday 3:00pm to 11:00p, Monday through Thursday 7:00am to 11:00pm, and Friday 7:00am to 3:00pm. Directions for Living would like to expand the TRACE's availability to include 24 hours of coverage from Thursday through Monday, which has shown to be a time when law enforcement encounters more behavioral health crisis calls.



D.3c. Program Staff

TRACE is staffed by two Crisis Counselors who work in partnership with law enforcement on a shift-by-shift basis. Crisis Counselors are trained in Mental Health First Aid (MHFA). Counselors are masters prepared in Counseling, Psychology, Social Work, or related field; skilled in clinical knowledge to provide clinical intervention with adults and children who manifest a range of psychopathology, utilizing various treatment approaches; knowledgeable in local community resources; and are computer literate and proficient with the electronic technology of the service.

Crisis Counselors are supported by the Director of Intake and Assessments and the Division Director of Outpatient Services. The Director of Intake and Assessments is a responsible administrative position providing guidance, training, coverage, and outcome support to the TRACE team. The Division Director of Outpatient Services is responsible for the day-to-day management of operations, clinical programming, and is routinely measured against contractual performance indicators.

All staff have access to an IT department that ensures equipment and repairs or updates are completed as needed, a Quality Management department to monitor safety, compliance, and outcomes, a dedicated Credentialing Specialist who ensures that all new hires and existing staff have met the statutory requirements within the State of Florida to practice in their respective fields, and a Marketing, Human Resources, Billing, Facilities, and Management Information Systems departments ready to assist and support the mission and work of DFL.

D.3d. What Direct Services can this program or project provide?

DFL developed a multi-layered system of supports that work synergistically to prevent individuals in crisis from using emergency services for non-law enforcement issues and cycling in and out of crisis stabilization units. This multi-layered system begins by establishing a reciprocal relationship between DFL and a law enforcement agency. Next, officers are trained in Mental Health First Aid within their first 2 years of service, followed by Crisis Intervention Team training once they gain necessary on-the-job experience. The next layer includes connecting the law enforcement agency's officers with DFL's virtual crisis intervention program, TRACE. DFL's existing co-response Mental Health Unit follow up with individuals identified by TRACE to ensure they receive priority access to ongoing care needed to alleviate emotional distress, avoiding future use of 911 or law enforcement.

Once the officer identifies someone with signs and symptoms or worsening signs and symptoms of a mental health emergency, they are connected to a TRACE Crisis Counselor. A Crisis Counselor engages the individual or family virtually and provides crisis intervention, de-escalation, and clinical assessment to determine the best immediate course of action. Crisis Counselors provide law enforcement, in real time, with a recommendation for appropriate level of care and intervention.

DFL's Adult and Children's Care Coordinators follow up on referrals and linkages to recommended services for the individual. DFL developed a comprehensive behavioral health care system that allows for timely interventions including: Certified Recovery Support Peers, Intensive Case Managers, Outpatient Counselors, SOAR Staff, Housing Navigators, Psychologists, APRNs, and Psychiatrists.

DFL's layered approach is critical for ensuring individuals experiencing a crisis receive the right level of care and support at the right time and with the right acuity in order to prevent them from being arrested or Baker Acted.

D.3e. Service Units (Number, unit, time increment- 52 Families per year or 400 pounds of food per week) Directions for Living will serve 120 unduplicated new individuals annually.



D.4. What information will be collected to demonstrate program success? Describe how client/individual data is collected. (Please be specific on the platform your program uses if you collect data electronically, and the interval at which data is collected)

Directions for Living (DFL) will monitor progress of the program by tracking weekly TRACE calls and provide monthly summaries by outcome (Baker Act or diverted). The tracking will be performed using DFL's Electronic Health Record System (EHR), which has the ability to track and maintain client and service level data for care coordination and system improvement. The EHR system allows for the creation of customizable forms and reports that can be built based on the needs of the staff and the agency. DFL also has a dedicated Management Information Systems team to pull data from the EHR system to inform required performance reports. Data can also be pulled at any time during the project to conduct internal progress checks. In addition, DFL works with the Crime Analysts at Largo Police Department, Belleair Police Department, Treasure Island Police Department, and Gulfport Police Department to reconcile data throughout the month and at month end.



AMENDED AND RESTATED ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES OF UPPER PINELLAS, 1009 OCT 24 51 2 58

The undersigned, being the President and Secretary of Mental Health Services of Upper Pinellas, Inc., hereby amend Article I (providing for name change); Article IV (providing for change of qualifications of members); Article VI (providing for change of subscribers); Article VII (providing for a change in Officers); Article VIII (providing for separation of Directors from Members of the Corporation); Article IX (providing for separation of meetings of the Corporation from meetings of the Board); Article X (providing for the Articles to be amended only at meetings of the Corporation); Article XII (providing for the frequency of Board meetings to be regulated in the Bylaws); of such Articles as thereafter amended and restate the Articles of Incorporation orginally filed June 3, 1981 under the name of MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES OF NORTH PINELLAS, INC., as amended and restated by Amendment and Restatement filed June 30, 1982 by Mental Health Services of Upper Pinellas, Inc., pursuant to Article XI of said Restated and Amended Articles previously filed herein, with these Amendments and Restatement having been proposed by the Directors and having been approved at a meeting duly called in accordance with the Bylaws of the Corporation and approved by two-thirds (2/3) vote of the members as follows:

ARTICLE I

Name

The name of the Corporation shall hereafter be DIRECTIONS FOR MENTAL HEALTH, INC., with its principal offices located at 1437 South Belcher Road, Clearwater, Florida. The Board of Directors may from time to time move the principal office of the corporation to any other address in the State of Florida.

ARTICLE II

Purpose

The general nature of the objects and purposes of the Corporation shall be as follows:

Section 1. The Corporation is organized exclusively for charitable, educational and scientific purposes, including, for such purposes, the making of distributions to organizations under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law) and administering a community mental health center program.

Section 2. No part of the net earnings of the Corporation shall inure to the benefit of or be distributable to its members, Directors, Officers, or other private persons, except that the Corporation shall be authorized and empowered to pay reasonable compensation for services rendered and to make payments and distributions in futherance of the purposes set forth in these Articles.

Section 3. No substantial part of the activities of the

Corporation shall be the carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation, and the Corporation shall not participate in, or intervene in (including the publishing or distribution of statements) any political campaign on behalf of any candidate for public office.

Section 4. Notwithstanding any other provision of these Articles, the Corporation, shall not carry on any other activities not permitted to be carried on (a) by a corporation exempt from Federal income tax under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law); or (b) by a corporation, contributions to which are deductible under Section 170(c)(2) of the Internal Revenue 170(c)(2) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law).

ARTICLE III

Powers

The Corporation shall have the power, either directly or indirectly, either alone or in conjunction or in cooperation with others, to do any and all lawful acts and things and to engage in any and all lawful activities which may be necessary, useful, desirable, suitable, or proper for the furtherance, accomplishment, fostering or attainment of any or all of the purposes for which the Corporation is organized, and to aid or assist other organizations whose activities are such as to further accomplish, foster or attain any of such purposes. Notwithstanding anything herein to

the contrary, the Corporation shall exercise only such powers as are set forth in furtherance of the exempt purposes of the organizations set forth in Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, as amended, and its regulations as the same now exist or as they may be hereafter amended from time to time.

ARTICLE IV

Qualifications of Members

Members of the Corporation shall be at least eighteen (18) years of age, a resident or otherwise member of the service area community, of good moral character, and have demonstrated an interest in the furtherance of the delivery of mental health services. Membership shall be reflective of the socioeconomic, cultural, and demographic makeup of the service area.

Notwithstanding any other provisions of these Articles, the membership shall at all times be constituted in accordance with the Rules of the Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services, Mental Health Program Office Chapter 10E-4, as it may be amended from time to time or its successors.

Members shall be elected in accordance with the Bylaws of the Corporation. The number of members shall be regulated by the Bylaws of the Corporation, but never less than three (3).

ARTICLE V

Term of Existence

The date when corporate existence shall commence shall be the date of the filing of the original Articles of Incorporation in the office of the Secretary of State of the State of Florida and the

Corporation shall have perpetual existence thereafter.

Crisis Counselors are trained in Mental Health First Aid (MHFA) and are available to law enforcement officers via on-demand Tele-behavioral Health. Once the officer identifies someone with signs and symptoms or worsening signs and symptoms of a mental health emergency, they are connected (via a wireless devise) to the Crisis Counselor. The Crisis Counselor will engage the individual and/or family virtually and provide crisis intervention, deescalation, and clinical assessment to adults, children, and families to determine the best immediate course of action. Since 1989, MORE HEALTH, Inc. has been working to improve the health of children, teens, and adults through interactive health and safety lessons. MORE HEALTH instructors have taught over 4.2 million students in schools throughout the Tampa Bay area, one lesson, and one classroom at a time.

B.2 Explain the organization's experience and capacity relevant to the proposed program, including staff qualifications and experience.

Over the past thirty three years, MORE HEALTH (MH) has established strong partnerships with public school districts and private schools in the Tampa Bay area to enhance their health education programs. Johns Hopkins All Children's Hospital is our major partner in Pinellas County, providing financial assistance as well as ensuring our lessons are medically and scientifically accurate. In addition, Tampa General Hospital is our founding partner, since 1992.

For over twenty years, MORE HEALTH has partnered with Pinellas and Hillsborough Counties' law enforcement entities to deliver the firearm safety education and to ensure our lessons are accurate, up-to-date, and relevant. MORE HEALTH safety and violence prevention instructors are highly trained and frequently evaluated. They come from medical, education, and safety prevention backgrounds. The instructors go through rigorous training to receive classroom teaching certification and are evaluated daily by classroom teachers and by unscheduled observations made

by MORE HEALTH administration.

MORE HEALTH Instructors and Administration have credentialed access to schools in accordance with the Jessica Lungsford Act.

Firearm Safety instructors are certified by MORE HEALTH to teach elementary and/or middle school firearm safety and middle school lessons. There are currently twelve MORE HEATH instructors certified to teach Firearm Safety lessons in elementary classrooms and four certified to teach Firearm Safety lessons in middle schools.

C.1. Clearly identify the problem to be addressed through the proposed program. Provide supporting statistics or data specific to Pinellas County such as needs assessments, interviews, waiting lists, surveys, trends and/or analyses. Pinellas County residents know the impact of firearm violence. It is especially difficult when children are involved. Recently, a Clearwater High athlete was accidently shot in the eye with a high-powered BB gun, resulting in several surgeries; a 3-year-old boy picked up a gun that was left within reach and accidently shot himself resulting in non-fatal injuries; a 16-year-old in St. Petersburg was arrested and charged after he accidently shot a 9-year-old family member.

Recent Florida Department of Health firearm trauma statistics show a disturbing trend in Pinellas County. After a few years of declining rates in three categories: death, Emergency Room visits, and hospitalizations due to firearm trauma among children aged 0-19, the rates have reversed and increased in the year 2020.

The importance of educating children about firearm safety is a necessary prevention strategy to reduce firearm injuries and deaths. The U.S. Dept of Health & Human Services states on its website "evidence continues to mount showing the profound influence children's early experiences have on later success." We expect our firearm/violence prevention program will positively influence their behavior translating to avoiding future firearm trauma.

Adults need to understand the risks to children when they own a firearm. Research has shown that keeping guns stored unloaded and locked can prevent unintentional shootings and suicides; two of the greatest threats posed by unsecured guns to the 0-19 year old age group. When children and teens have unsupervised access to guns, tragedies are inevitable. A 2019 Harvard study suggests that modest increases in the number of homes safely storing firearms could prevent almost a third of youth gun deaths due to suicide and unintentional firearm injury.

C.2d. Provide a brief summary of the accomplishments that have been achieved and/or the needs met to date.

MORE HEALTH is proud to be in the final editing stages of a new Firearm Safety video for elementary school children. This video focuses on potentially dangerous situations and how children can be heroes and keep themselves and others safe. The video, "What is a Hero?" will be used as a pre or post visit activity in Pinellas County schools and will also be available for anyone to stream or download.

Pinellas County's third grade and middle school students have continued to receive the MORE HEALTH Firearm Safety and Violence Prevention program over the last two years. Our flexibility and versatility have allowed us to offer schools multiple methods of delivery. During the 2021-22 school year, approximately 7,200 students have received or are scheduled to receive a Firearm Safety and Violence Prevention lesson.

Pre and post testing of students in third grade during the 2021-22 school year, reported a 36% knowledge gain relating to their understanding of the potential dangers of firearms.

C.3. How will the proposed program be coordinated with existing programs in the community?

MORE HEALTH is an active member of Safe Kids Suncoast Florida and partners with its members to educate parents, caregivers, and adults about the importance of storing firearms safely and educate them on Florida's laws/penalties regarding storing guns properly.

Multiple Pinellas County law enforcement entities partner with MORE HEALTH in the classroom and at safety fairs and community firearm safety programs.

The Pinellas County School District continues to be an active participant in the MORE HEALTH Firearm Safety and



Violence Prevention Program, requiring all third grade students to receive the lesson. During teacher and administration summer trainings, both lessons are widely promoted.

D. Scope of Services

D.1. Describe the program or types of services to be delivered. How do the services apply to the proposed FDLE priority area?

With funding from the Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant, MORE HEALTH proposes to continue the Firearm Safety/Violence Prevention Project in Pinellas County's public, charter, and private schools. MH instructors will teach the Firearm Safety 1 Lesson, Respect Not Risk and the middle school lesson, Responsibility, Respect and Reason to Pinellas County students. Applying kinesthetic style teaching methods, the interactive lessons are taught using hands-on visuals and role play to help students develop the skills to help them stay safe in potentially dangerous situations. Studies show 8-year-old children cannot reliably distinguish between real and toy guns. The MH lessons teaches them to treat every gun as if it is real and loaded. MH lessons are endorsed by the Pinellas County School District.

Pinellas County law enforcement agencies will partner with MH to team-teach the Firearm Safety courses. Law enforcement officers bring real world experiences into the classroom. Students respond positively to the officers, creating a sense of trust with law enforcement. Various Police Departments have committed in-kind donations of officers' time to team-teach the Firearm Safety lessons in elementary and middle schools in their cities. Parents, caregivers, and teachers will receive important information about firearm safety and proper gun storage through an informational packet sent home with students. The information includes how to obtain a free gun lock and encourages parents to have conversations with their children's friend's parents about proper gun storage.

Additionally, the MH Firearm Safety and Violence Prevention Program involves community outreach to adults in highrisk communities. Adults will learn about the laws pertaining to gun ownership and proper storage of their firearms. Two events will be coordinated and conducted by MH staff with local law enforcement agencies. The goal is to reach at least 25 adults per event.

D.2. What is the target population and eligibility criteria?

Every elementary and middle public, private, and charter school in Pinellas County are MORE HEALTH's target area and are eligible to schedule our Firearm Safety program. MORE HEALTH makes every effort to provide our life saving Firearm Safety Lessons to all schools that request it. By securing adequate funding and having certified instructors available, we do our best to meet this goal.

Community education will take place on the weekends or in the evening.

The Firearm Safety and Violence Prevention program will have a total of nine staff members directly involved in the project.

Five Certified Firearm Safety instructors will provide the safety education in elementary and middle school students. A scheduler/community events planner will schedule Firearm Safety in elementary and middle schools and adult education in community or faith based centers.

The Grant manager will manage the grant, complete progress reports and ensure goals are met.

The bookkeeper will maintain the budget and submit quarterly invoices.

The executive director will oversee the project.

The Firearm Safety and Violence Prevention program will provide at least 340 Firearm Safety and Violence Prevention presentations, one class at a time. The third grade students, at the discretion of their classroom teacher, will also watch our new, "What is a Hero?" video. We created the video to encourage students to be a hero, by telling an adult if then encounter a firearm. The video will be available on our website for the 2022-23 school year and classroom teachers can stream or download for student to watch before or after the MORE HEALTH lesson presentation. In partnership with a school, community center, or faith based organization, at least two adult Firearm Safety programs

In partnership with a school, community center, or faith based organization, at least two adult Firearm Safety programs will be held in Pinellas County with the goal of teaching adults how and why to properly store their firearms.

D.3e. Service Units (Number, unit, time increment- 52 Families per year or 400 pounds of food per week)

A Service unit equals one classroom receiving the Firearm Safety Lesson. (A unit includes teaching and scheduling including fringe benefits, mileage to and from schools, printing, supplies, materials, and administration, including grant manager.) The 40-45 minute presentations will be delivered during the 2022-23 grant year, beginning October 1, 2022, and ending September 30, 2023. The lessons will be delivered in Pinellas county public, private, and charter schools. However, if requested, MORE HEALTH will also provide the lifesaving lesson to community groups, such as the Police Athletic League and Boys and Girls Clubs.

D.4. What information will be collected to demonstrate program success? Describe how client/individual data is collected. (Please be specific on the platform your program uses if you collect data electronically, and the interval at which data is collected)

MORE HEALTH tracks the number of classroom presentations through their Excel Data Collection Document. This document contains the name of the school, the lesson scheduled, the contact person at the school, how many classes per grade level, number of students in the grade level, the date scheduled, the times of the class, and special instructions (such as send 10 extra name tags for special ed students.) The document also records the date the information was entered into the data base. It is updated with new information daily with new confirmations, date and time changes along with added classes/students.

Another Excel Data collection document is used to track classroom teacher evaluations. Using a 1-5 scale, classroom teachers rate the presentation on 7 measurable points; pre-visit activities, relevance, meeting national and state health standards, quality of visual aids, student engagement, instructor presentation and instructor knowledge of the content. This document is monitored closely and checked on a bi-weekly basis.

Pre and posttests are sent to random schools to determine student's knowledge prior to and after the lesson. These tests determine if students are learning the information and indicate if there are areas where teaching could be more





The mission of the PCSO's Sexual Predator and Offender Tracking (SPOT) Unit is to be proactive and aggressive in regards to monitoring, tracking, and enforcing Florida State Statutes that relate to registered sexual predators, sexual offenders, and career offenders.

The SPOT Unit was created in 2000 to track and monitor sexual predators and offenders in the PCSO's jurisdiction. Since 2006, the PCSO has assumed responsibility for countywide oversight of sexual predators and offenders. This decision was unanimously made by the Law Enforcement Task Force of the Pinellas Assembly that year. The Task Force concluded that having a single agency cover the entire county would result in a more efficient and effective registration and address verification process. Pinellas County has a high number of offenders and predators.

The SPOT Unit is led by a sergeant who oversees the entire operation of the Unit. He has worked within the SPOT Unit for seven years. The senior member of the SPOT Unit staff is a corporal with 9 years of experience tracking and monitoring sexual predators and offenders. Together, over the years, they have attended hundreds of hours of symposiums, conferences, and other various continual learning webinars. They also are the lead instructors on all the on-the-job type training.

According to the National Center for Missing & Exploited Children (NCMEC), in 2019, there were 917,771 (279 per 100,000 population) registered sex offenders in the United States, with 74,629 of those offenders and predators residing in Florida.

The FDLE ranked Pinellas County fifth among Florida's 67 counties for the number of offenders/predators living within its boundaries, although it is the second smallest county in geographic size. Pinellas County has seen the subpopulation of transient offenders (which includes sexual predators, sexual offenders, and career offenders) increase from 24 in 2008, when the number began to be tracked, to 204 as of December 31, 2020. In the 2020-2021 grant year, the SPOT Unit registered 137 new sexual offenders and predators, conducted 6,692 re-registrations/transient registrations updates, performed 4,494 address verifications, distributed 4,905 flyer notifications, and made 61 arrests and 29 referrals to the State Attorney's Office. This has been done with a limited staff of eight deputies (including one corporal) and one sergeant. The SPOT Unit enters between 36,000 – 40,000 updates annually in multiple systems. The approximate caseload per deputy was 222 offenders, which includes career offenders.

The PCSO SPOT Unit monitors and tracks sexual predators, offenders, and registered career offenders on a countywide basis. The Unit was created in 2000 to track and monitor sexual predators and offenders in the PCSO's jurisdiction. Starting in 2006, the PCSO assumed responsibility for countywide oversight of sexual predators and offenders. This decision was unanimously made by the Law Enforcement Task Force of the Pinellas Assembly that year. The Task Force concluded that having a single agency cover the entire county would result in a more efficient and effective registration and address verification process. Pinellas County has a high number of offenders and predators. Having adequate staffing to monitor registered sexual predators and offenders in Pinellas County is imperative for the safety of the community, especially with projected increases in population both statewide and countywide.

Each deputy has a primary responsibility for one geographic zone and serves as a backup for another. They perform address verifications, surveillance, neighborhood notifications, and community education. They also provide countywide services to all of Pinellas County's population, but the participants of the program served are the 2,314 sexual predators, sexual offenders, and career criminals currently being supervised in the county.

D.1. Describe the program or types of services to be delivered. How do the services apply to the proposed FDLE priority area?

The SPOT Unit monitors and tracks sexual offenders, predators, and career offenders who reside in Pinellas County. The Unit has assumed responsibility for countywide oversight and maintains effective registration and address verification of the sexual offenders and predators. The SPOT Unit conducts monthly face-to-face contact registrations, re-registrations, and unscheduled registrations/information updates, as well as, distributes flyer notifications, informing the public of those offenders and predators who have taken up residence within their neighborhood.

D.2. What is the target population and eligibility criteria?

As of December 31, 2020, the target population was 2,314 sexual predators, sexual offenders, and career criminals, including 204 total transient offenders and sexual predators.

D.3. Program Specifics

D.3a. Identify the geographic service area.

The SPOT Unit monitors and tracks sexual offenders, predators, and registered career criminals throughout the entire county of Pinellas, which is 608 square miles.

D.3b. Hours/days of operation for program/project during contract period.

Open registration of sexual offenders, predators, and career offenders is done on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays from 8:00 AM - 4:00 PM. The SPOT Unit staff primarily work Monday - Friday, from 7:00 AM - 4:00 PM, with many of the deputies working 10-hour shifts.

D.3c. Program Staff

The SPOT Unit is staffed by one sergeant, eight deputies (including one corporal), and two senior administrative assistants. Each deputy has primary responsibility for one geographic zone and serves as a backup for another. The deputies rotate between on-site registrations and community and neighborhood duties in their individual zones.

D.3d. What Direct Services can this program or project provide?

They perform address verifications, surveillance, neighborhood notifications, and community education of sexual offenders, predators, and career criminals currently being supervised in Pinellas County.

The SPOT Unit deputies interact and assist other agencies such as the State Attorney's Office, Florida Department of Law Enforcement, Florida Department of Corrections, and other local law enforcement agencies.

PCSO's SPOT Unit performs the following countywide services: offender and predator neighborhood address



verifications, community notification of offender movement, on-site verification of residence, apprehending violators, searching for absconders, and conducting investigations and surveillance. 





B.1. Describe the mission and purpose of the organization.

Founded in 1915, the Pinellas Park Police Department (PPPD) serves more than 54,000 residents living within 16 square miles. Under the leadership of Police Chief Michael Haworth, the PPPD employs 150 paid employees including sworn police officers, dispatchers, school crossing guards, and support staff. Approximately 65 volunteers and explorers support the services provided by the PPPD.

The agency consists of three divisions: Operations, Investigations, and Services. Its mission is to provide professional services in partnership with our community. Its vision is to be a professional law enforcement agency that is constantly evolving in partnership with the community to provide exceptional service, ensure public safety, and enhance the quality of life in Pinellas Park. Our values are Integrity with honor, pride, and principles; Service with a commitment to excellence; Professionalism as our constant standard of conduct; Dedication to our citizens and to each other.

To broaden the PPPD's scope of service, a Community Redevelopment Policing Unit was established in 2009. The slated purpose of the CRPU is to afford accelerated police presence in the City's Redevelopment District. This police presence is intended to promote and maintain good community relationships while performing all aspects of community problem-solving. The CRPU's mission is to create and maintain a cooperative and long-term partnership with those who own and operate businesses, live in, or visit the Community Redevelopment Area.

The PPPD provides protective services for a permanent population of 55,077 and contracts with the Township of Kenneth City to serve a population of more than 5,000. C.1. Clearly identify the problem to be addressed through the proposed program. Provide supporting statistics or data specific to Pinellas County such as needs assessments, interviews, waiting lists, surveys, trends and/or analyses.

Pinellas Park lies in the geographic center of Florida's most densely populated County. With access to US 19, the County's major north/south arterial, as well as the Howard Frankland and Gandy Bridges that traverse Tampa Bay, Pinellas Park lies at the confluence of three of the region's most important transportation corridors. The City's central location and heavily traveled roads are contributing factors to Pinellas Park being ranked in the highest 15% of Florida cities (populations 15,000-74,999) for impaired or aggressive driving and for speeding.

These demographics demonstrate a need for the PPPD to expand its law enforcement capabilities by acquiring two sUAS systems, hardware and accessories, battery packs, and online training for certified pilots. The acquisition of this equipment is consistent with the PPPD's strategic goal to provide effective and progressive technology, equipment, resources, and programs to ensure public safety.

New Program

C.2a. If new and innovative, discuss what is currently being done in the community to address the need and how this program differs to provide better results.

In recent hostage events, the PPPD used tactical methods for securing the location, evacuating persons near the situation, and negotiating measures to arrive at the best possible outcome. In these cases, officers and members of the SWAT team risk their lives by maneuvering closely to the crime scene. The primary goal of this request is to alleviate the need for bodies to enter a crime scene prior to it being analyzed and secured. The PPPD will utilize sUAS to incorporate state of the art technology into patrol operations. By doing this, officers, detectives, and SWAT members will be better able to assess situations. Sending a drone into a hostage situation can save lives and reveal details that would possibly be missed by a human assessing multiple events simultaneously. The sUAS system will



enhance the Department's crime prevention strategies for designing, developing, and implementing plans during an immediate and dangerous situation.

The proposed request to purchase this equipment has multifaceted benefits: 1. Save lives, keeps officers out of danger; 2. Provide vital information that can protect lives; and, 3. Save money, cheaper to acquire and operate than deploying helicopters or hostage negotiation vehicles.

C.3. How will the proposed program be coordinated with existing programs in the community?

Upon purchase, training, and place into utilization, the sUAS systems will serve a vital role at traffic scenes, hostage situations, large crowd gatherings, and City sponsored special events. Recently, the City of Pinellas Park hosted Country in the Park, an all day event with rodeo, concerts, rides, and vendors. Had a missing person been reported during the event, a sUAS pilot would immediately begin a surveillance for the missing person. During large crowd events, such as protests, a sUAS can seek out unusual packages or known suspects.

D. Scope of Services

D.1. Describe the program or types of services to be delivered. How do the services apply to the proposed FDLE priority area?

Using a small Unmanned Aircraft System (sUAS) will allow officers to see dangerous locations without the need to expose themselves to armed subjects, and will eliminate the need for manned aircraft, often expensive to operate, difficult for responding to certain locations in which detection can lead to hostile action. The proposed sUAS equipment can be deployed with little notice to search missing persons and to obtain and record critical evidence in criminal situations. The proposed equipment applies to FDLE's Priority Program Area 1 - Law Enforcement and focuses on Priority 1: Equipment.

Aligning with the Byrne/JAG Strategic Plan - 2019, Pinellas Park is also experiencing new trends in criminal activity. Hostage situations and gun-related crimes have increased. Public protests become aggressive with illegal actions leading to severe injury and in some cases, death. It is imperative that officers are provided the best equipment for their safety and wellness.

The primary population being targeted for the sUAS system, is the general population. That being, crowds at City sponsored and private events in which officer detail is required. Secondary populations include hostage situations, missing person reports, and search and rescue victims from a natural disaster. Pinellas Park's total area is 16.80 sq mi. Land makes up 16.13 sq mi. Annexation into the City is voluntary by both the property owner and the City Council.

The PPPD conducts high-risk and life-saving operations in a variety of environments. The need for placing officers in dangerous locations or situations has been required for many years; however, new technologies such as small Unmanned Aircraft Systems have become more common and easier to attain. Using a sUAS, PPPD officers will be able to see dangerous locations without the need to expose personnel to armed subjects, hazardous materials, and dangerous surroundings. It also eliminates the need for manned aircraft, often expensive to operate and acquire. Direct services may include: searching for missing persons, detecting hostages and suspects, search and rescue missions, and assessing large crowd actions to determine the need for further assistance.

Upon receiving a signed agreement, the PPPD will begin the purchasing process to acquire two Skydio Enterprise Kits, hardware, batteries, and accessories. Once the equipment is inventoried, online training will begin. It is expected that the sUAS system will be placed into action a minimum of 20 per quarter, for a total of 80 times during the contract period.

Pinellas Park lies in the geographic center of Florida's most densely populated County. With access to US 19, the County's major north/south arterial, as well as the Howard Frankland and Gandy Bridges that traverse Tampa Bay, Pinellas Park lies at the confluence of three of the region's most important transportation corridors. The City's central location and heavily traveled roads are contributing factors to Pinellas Park being ranked in the highest 15% of Florida cities (populations 15,000-74,999) for impaired or aggressive driving and for speeding.

These demographics demonstrate a need for the PPPD to expand its law enforcement capabilities by acquiring two sUAS systems, hardware and accessories, battery packs, and online training for certified pilots. The acquisition of this equipment is consistent with the PPPD's strategic goal to provide effective and progressive technology, equipment, resources, and programs to ensure public safety.

In recent hostage events, the PPPD used tactical methods for securing the location, evacuating persons near the situation, and negotiating measures to arrive at the best possible outcome. In these cases, officers and members of the SWAT team risk their lives by maneuvering closely to the crime scene. The primary goal of this request is to alleviate the need for bodies to enter a crime scene prior to it being analyzed and secured. The PPPD will utilize sUAS to incorporate state of the art technology into patrol operations. By doing this, officers, detectives, and SWAT members will be better able to assess situations. Sending a drone into a hostage situation can save lives and reveal details that would possibly be missed by a human assessing multiple events simultaneously. The sUAS system will enhance the Department's crime prevention strategies for designing, developing, and implementing plans during an immediate and dangerous situation.

The proposed request to purchase this equipment has multifaceted benefits: 1. Save lives, keeps officers out of danger; 2. Provide vital information that can protect lives; and, 3. Save money, cheaper to acquire and operate than deploying helicopters or hostage negotiation vehicles.

Upon purchase, training, and place into utilization, the sUAS systems will serve a vital role at traffic scenes, hostage situations, large crowd gatherings, and City sponsored special events. Recently, the City of Pinellas Park hosted Country in the Park, an all day event with rodeo, concerts, rides, and vendors. Had a missing person been reported during the event, a sUAS pilot would immediately begin a surveillance for the missing person. During large crowd events, such as protests, a sUAS can seek out unusual packages or known suspects.

Suncoast Center has been providing a multitude of behavioral health, substance abuse, child safety, and social support services to the Pinellas County community for over 76 years. With over 42 sites, Suncoast Center serves clients in the office, clients' homes, as well as in the community. During our FY 21-22, Suncoast served 24,346 unduplicated individuals. Suncoast Center has over 280 full-time and 69 part-time employees that include psychiatric and medical staff, clinical therapists, case managers, administrative, and support staff. Staff consists of 40% minority members.

Suncoast Center maintains a Cultural Competency and Diversity Plan that addresses clients, personnel, and agency stakeholders. The plan addresses diversity in culture, age, gender, gender identity and expression, sexual orientation, spiritual beliefs, socioeconomic status, and language of the staff, clients, and the board. This plan is reviewed and updated annually. Qualified minority applicants are actively recruited by informing government employment agencies, civil rights organizations, schools, community leaders, and recognized minority groups of our interest in hiring minorities and of specific openings that exist.

The Bureau of Justice estimates that inmates spent an average of 25 days in jail. Pinellas County's Public Defender estimates that it costs taxpayers \$125 per day to house an inmate. Factor in the need for medication, treatment and disruption of inmates with a mental illness and the cost is even higher. Mental illness is associated with high rates of recidivism, which leads to jail overcrowding, behavioral issues, physical attacks (on the inmates and correctional officers), worsening of mental health issue and the increased cost to taxpayers.

At the close of 2020, Pinellas County reported a total of 12,687 felony arrests; 3,000 of which were mental health related. Once within the system, mentally ill offenders have difficulty meeting the requirements of the criminal justice system both while incarcerated and after being released. Homelessness, exacerbated mental health symptoms, and ineffective support systems in the community lead to an inability to comply with probation requirements. Many opt to go back to jail to finish their time, rather than trying to complete probation. It is well documented that adults with severe and persistent mental illness with a co-occurring substance use disorder have a dramatically increased risk of incarceration for non-violent petty crimes and have a 64% greater chance of being re-arrested than those who are not mentally ill. The days immediately following release are crucial to succeeding in the community and often are filled with tasks such as locating shelter and food, and reporting to the probation officer. Many mentally ill individuals are fearful, hyper-vigilant, and non-trusting when they are released from jail, and if they are dealing with substance use issues, they are at high risk of relapse and may not be able to successfully achieve any of their basic tasks.

The primary goals of Suncoast Center's Forensic Focused Outreach program are to assist client in achieving selfsufficiency and re-integration into the community by managing their mental health and/or substance abuse issues and to assist in preventing re-incarnation. Suncoast Center staff works closely with the Jail Diversion Program to engage those individuals in need of services in a community setting in order to maintain treatment gains. These services are provided at no cost to the person served. Our project accomplishments to date (10/1/2019 to 9/30/21) are as follows:



- We served a total of 198 clients.
- 111 successfully discharged (not incarcerated and living independently in the community)
- only 16 re-incarcerated

Funding provided through this grant would enable Suncoast Center to maintain the collaborative effort with the Jail Diversion Program.

Coordination of services is paramount to the success of this population and partnering in a manner that supports each other while honoring the expertise of each partner is one of our greatest assets. Suncoast Center has been a leader in the Pinellas Behavioral Health System of Care for the last 7 years. We bring our collaborative efforts together to improve connectivity and avenues of support for a robust system of care. Without our 50+ partners assisting to wrap around this client population, we would not have success. We partner with law enforcement, other behavioral health providers, medical, dental, and vision providers, housing/shelter providers, the Social Security Administration and other systems to assist in our clients' road to success.

Suncoast Center provides services to mentally ill individuals transitioning from jail and prison into the Pinellas County community. In correlation with the FDLE's priority areas of mental health and reentry programs, Suncoast Center's forensic services program identifies and engages ex-offenders, after they are released from the jail or at the end of their prison sentence, who have mental health and/or co-occurring disorders to provide counseling, case management, medication management and mental health and substance use education, all in an effort to assist in their reintegration into the community and as an intervention to further criminal justice involvement and or reincarceration.

D.2. What is the target population and eligibility criteria?

Suncoast Center's Forensic Focused Outreach is available to individuals 18 years of age or older who are residents of Pinellas County and are: below the federal poverty guidelines and without resources to pay for treatment; on probation/parole and/or have had significant legal involvement within the last 6 months; diagnosed with a severe and persistent DSM IV Axis I diagnosis, which may be mental health, substance abuse, or co-occurring; and willing to engage in the program, including therapeutic services.

D.3. Program Specifics

D.3a. Identify the geographic service area.

Pinellas County, on Florida's West Coast, is a 280-square mile peninsula bordered by the Gulf of Mexico and Tampa



Bay. The County from tip to tip is 38 miles long and 15 miles wide at its broadest point. Services are provided to individuals within the following cities: St. Petersburg, Clearwater, Largo, Palm Harbor, Pinellas Park, Dunedin, Tarpon Springs, Safety Harbor, Oldsmar, Gulfport, St. Pete Beach, Treasure Island, Lealman and Seminole.

D.3b. Hours/days of operation for program/project during contract period.

Services are provided Monday through Friday 8:00 A.M. – 7:00 P.M., or as needed to address the client's needs.

D.3c. Program Staff

Staff composition consists of various mental health and rehabilitation professionals. The team shares many roles and strives to function interchangeably to provide intense, continuous and coordinated treatment, rehabilitations, and support services to clients. Suncoast Center currently dedicates one clinical staff to provide mental health and co-occurring treatment to ex-offenders in the community.

D.3d. What Direct Services can this program or project provide?

Clients enrolled in this program receive case management services, advocacy, and education into the court processes. The clients receive assistance and encouragement to assist them in accessing behavioral health services and following through with the recommended services. They receive advocacy in court to support their ongoing recovery. The forensic case manager is able to assist the clients with their knowledge and understanding of the behavioral health treatment processes and also the court systems. The forensic case managers are a respected voice in the Pinellas County Courts, in a way that other advocates are not able to support the individuals with mental health issues. The forensic case managers assist clients in resolving their legal requirements, assisting in accessing and utilizing effecting behavioral health treatment, and promoting the decriminalizing of mental health symptoms.

D.3e. Service Units (Number, unit, time increment- 52 Families per year or 400 pounds of food per week)

Funding from this grant will provide psychiatric evaluation, mental health assessment/management, therapy and case management services to 35 individuals.

To efficiently monitor outcomes, Suncoast Center utilizes myAvatar EHR system to collect client demographic and services data at admission, throughout service provision, and at discharge along with reason for discharge as data elements that are available for reporting and/or exporting within appropriate HIPAA compliant restrictions. Manual tracking of discharges ensures accurate tracking of individuals who are successfully employed, are receiving benefits and have actually completed treatment.

WestCare's mission is to empower everyone with whom we come into contact to engage in a process of healing, growth, and change benefiting themselves, their families, coworkers, and communities. Our vision is to devote our best collective and individual efforts toward "uplifting the human spirit" by consistently improving, expanding, and strengthening the quality, efficacy, and cost-effectiveness of everything we do in building for the future.

WestCare GulfCoast-Florida, Inc. (WCGC), a subsidiary of WestCare Foundation, is an experienced provider of human and behavioral services. WCGC was established in 2001 and provides programs that offer community-based treatment programming for justice-involved individuals. WCGC's approach to treatment is client-centered, trauma-focused, and addresses the multiple needs of persons with substance use disorders and co-occurring conditions such as behavioral or mental health problems, criminal justice involvement, or experience with violence and abuse. WCGC offers several programs for individuals with substance use disorders in Pinellas County, including an emergency shelter, transitional and supportive housing (including Veterans), outpatient services, and residential treatment for justice-involved individuals.

B.2 Explain the organization's experience and capacity relevant to the proposed program, including staff qualifications and experience.

WestCare Foundation has provided substance use treatment since 1973. In Pinellas County, WCGC has provided homeless services for individuals with substance use disorders, including recovery support services at Mustard Seed Inn (MSI), since 2001. WCGC currently operates SAMHSA-funded Workforce Support and Medication Assisted Treatment grants, both of which provide support to MSI residents. WestCare is in compliance with an independent accounting firm annual audit, adhering to generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP). For sustainability and program continuations, WestCare's grants department submits 296 grant applications per year with a 68% success rate (2021). WestCare Foundation provides administrative support through finance/accounting, fund development/grants, legal, profession services, IT/Security, and evaluation departments. WCGC employs approximately 130 individuals with 10 staff dedicated to MSI. Angela Drayton, Program Manager, has overseen the operations of MSI since 2015 and has been with WCGC since 2009. Linda Welborn, who oversees Rapid Re-Housing at MSI, has been with WCGC since 2015. Yolanda Lang, Case Manager at MSI, has been with WestCare since 2016. MSI is in the process of becoming a Florida Association of Recovery Residences (FARR) Certified Residence.

Individuals who are addicted to alcohol or other drugs are at an increased risk for homelessness and are more likely to be high-users of public services. Additionally, many among this population have co-occurring substance abuse and mental health disorders or multiple chronic conditions. Individuals with addiction disorders who are homeless often have repeated encounters with the justice system (police, jail, court services, etc.), emergency medical transportation services, public hospital emergency room care, alcohol detoxification programs, and involuntary commitment services. Individuals returning from institutional settings often lack safe, drug-free home environments to re-enter, which greatly increases the risk of recidivism and relapse. According to the United States Interagency Council on Homelessness, some people are caught in a revolving door between the streets or shelters and jails, not to mention other institutional settings. The 2020 (most recent reported) Pinellas Co. Homeless Leadership's Point In Time Report indicates a significant population of homeless individuals with substance use and mental health problems: 426 Adults reported a Serious Mental Illness (21.3%) and 314 reported a Substance Use Disorder (15.7%). Of the 754 individuals who indicated a reason for their current homeless episode, 66 (8.8%) indicated alcohol or drug problems, the fourth highest indicator. Financial Problems (41.1%), Family Problems (18.0%) and Medical Problems (13.9%) remained the top three indicators. Although these numbers show an improvement over 2019, it is difficult to determine actual usage rates among the homeless due to varying rates of disclosure and difficulty in assessing these conditions. However, accidental drug deaths in Pinellas County have continued to increase – indicating that overall drug use has also increased.

Continuation of Funding Under this Grant

C.2d. Provide a brief summary of the accomplishments that have been achieved and/or the needs met to date.

This project was previously awarded a FY21 Justice Assistance Grant and this project is a continuation of that project. FY21 continued to present challenges and opportunities due to Covid-19. Mustard Seed Inn felt a significant impact. The pandemic not only reduced the number of individuals who were able to be accommodated through traditional homeless shelters due to distancing restrictions, but closures and reduced capacity within the Circuit 6 Courts greatly reduced referrals to residential drug treatment programs that are the primary source of referrals to Mustard Seed Inn. The ongoing low-income housing crisis resulted in longer stays at MSI due to a lack of accessible housing inventory. Despite reduced system capacity and the lack of affordable housing, Mustard Seed Inn managed to achieve the following accomplishments:

Proposed: 85% of MSI-TH residents will transition to permanent housing or rapid rehousing programs within 6 months.

Actual: 37% (Oct. 1, 2020-Sept. 30, 2021). The average length of stay was 176.5 days, just under 6 months. Given the shortage of affordable housing and the complexity of some of the cases (multiple felonies with multiple evictions, etc.) placements for some individuals has taken longer than expected. Most placements are currently happening between 8 and 10 months.

Other accomplishments include (Oct 1, 2020 - September 30, 2021):

- Serving 105 unique individuals
- Provision of more than 5,300 units of case management
- Provision of more than 10,500 units of Life Skills Training
- Provision of 60,690 meals

WCGC is active with the Homeless Leadership Alliance and participates in the Provider's Council and other committees. WCGC also participates in the Coordinated Entry System and works with partners to provide a variety of homeless services and supports, including health care services with the Department of Health, vocational services with Pinellas Exoffender Reentry Coalition, and mental health services with Directions for Living. WCGC works in partnership with local workforce providers: CareerSource Pinellas, the local workforce development board, assists with employee referral and recruitment, training, employability skills workshops, and career fairs; Building Toward the Future Student Program provides ongoing professional development regarding employer recruitment and creating career road maps for clients; People Empowering and Restoring Communities (PERC) provides specialized workforce training to ex-offenders through their Success Training and Retention Services (STARS) Workplace Readiness program; AmSkills Manufacturing and Training provides training and apprenticeship opportunities to clients. WCGC also maintains relationships with community colleges and vocational schools to help provide education and training opportunities. MSI provides transitional and rapid rehousing services for homeless individuals and families (rapid rehousing only) as well as vocational and employment services when indicated. Case management is provided to all residents to ensure they are linked to all necessary services to help maintain recovery for drugs or alcohol. MSI works closely with other WestCare programs to ensure easy access to workforce support and medication assisted treatment programs. MSI hosts a variety of support groups to assist residents in maintaining their abstinence from substances. Services provided through MSI help to reduce relapse and criminal recidivism. MSI supports the FDLE priority area of prevention and education through the provision of life skills training, vocational support, provision of housing, and the development of social skills. MSI services help to reduce risk factors commonly associated with criminogenic needs. MSI provides structure and



community that can reduce antisocial behavior, provides a network of peers who are also in recovery, supports educational training, provides structure to leisure time, and helps individuals to abstain from substances. The reduction of the risk factors helps to prevent future substance use and criminal activity.

D.2. What is the target population and eligibility criteria?

Participants must have an identified substance use disorder or co-occurring substance use and mental health disorder. Participants must be homeless or be transitioning from an institutional setting without identified housing. MSI accepts individuals from the local homeless coordinated entry system as well as from WC's residential drug treatment programs which primarily serves at-risk individuals from the justice system. Individuals in these programs are adults with a substance use disorder, either active or in recovery, who are experiencing barriers to obtaining or maintaining livablewage employment and self-sufficiency.

D.3. Program Specifics

D.3a. Identify the geographic service area.

MSI is located in St. Petersburg but serves homeless individuals and individuals transitioning from institutional settings from throughout Pinellas County. The majority of residents are referred from WCGC's residential drug treatment program which serves individuals with involvement in the Circuit 6 Drug Courts. Residents are also accepted from area homeless shelters. Individuals must have an identified substance use disorder and require additional support in developing life skills that support sober living.

D.3b. Hours/days of operation for program/project during contract period.

MSI is staffed 24-hours per day, 7 days per week. Administrative hours are 8 AM to 6 PM. Housing services, trainings, Mutual Aid / 12-Step groups, and other support activities often happen outside of administrative hours to accommodate the needs of residents and the community.

D.3c. Program Staff

The program is staffed by 10 individuals. Angela Drayton, Program Manager, has overseen the operations of MSI since 2015 and has been with WCGC since 2009. Linda Welborn, who oversees Rapid Re-Housing at MSI, has been with WCGC since 2015. Yolanda Lang, Case Manager at MSI, has been with WestCare since 2016.

D.3d. What Direct Services can this program or project provide?

The program provides transitional housing, rapid rehousing, case management, vocational/employment and educational training support, and transportation services for resident needs. MSI also provides all meals for residents, including "to-go" meals for working residents.

D.3e. Service Units (Number, unit, time increment- 52 Families per year or 400 pounds of food per week)

MSI provides approximately 100 units of case management weekly to an average of 50 people each month. MSI provides 200 units of Life Skills Training to an average of 50 people each month. MSI provides 3 meals a day to an average of 50 people each month.

D.4. What information will be collected to demonstrate program success? Describe how client/individual data is collected. (Please be specific on the platform your program uses if you collect data electronically, and the interval at which data is collected)

MSI collects data on length of stay in the program, income at program intake and exit, and tracks housing placements at exit among other demographic and socioeconomic indicators. This data is captured in PHMIS, the local homeless management information system. As a transitional housing program, MSI expects all residents to successfully exit the



program within 24 months, but strives to find permanent housing placements within 6 months. MSI considers any placement in permanent housing to be successful. MSI uses HLA Homeless Verification Forms to track demographic and income information of clients and records information in PHMIS. Additionally, WestCare maintains client records to document meetings, case plans (housing and recovery), and other relevant information required to support residents in their recovery and transition to permanent housing. HMIS data is entered as soon as possible after services are rendered in accordance with HLA guidelines (ideally at time of service). Monthly reports are generated to review timeliness and accuracy of data entry. Monthly reports are generated on a variety of services based on requirements in funding contracts.


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ORGANIZATION CHART

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF WestCare GulfCoast - Florida, Inc.

ARTICLE I

The name of the corporation shall be WestCare GulfCoast – Florida, Inc. (hereinafter referred to as the "Corporation").

ARTICLE II

The principal office of said corporation is 341 3rd Street South in the City of St. Petersburg, Pinellas County, Florida. The mailing address of said corporation is 341 3rd Street South in the City of St. Petersburg, Pinellas County, Florida.

ARTICLE III

The Corporation is a nonprofit corporation, as defined in F.S. 617 and is solely organized for the public benefit. The primary purposes for which said Corporation is formed are a combination of general charitable and educational purposes including but not limited to, the following:

- a. To provide treatment and/or counseling for substance dependent persons, male and female, who voluntarily seek help. The aim is to offer the encouragement and resources of the community and the creative supervision necessary to support substance abusing persons in their effort to live in a reality bound and responsibility-oriented society.
- b. To provide the services of WestCare GulfCoast Florida, Inc. to individuals who are currently dependent on drugs, alcohol or other deleterious substances as well as those with post dependency histories or

mental health issues who are returning to the community from treatment centers or correctional institutions.

- c. To stabilize such individuals, to help them develop realistic living plans, and to aid their re-entry into the community.
- d. To advance the corporate purposes without restriction as to race, creed, age, sex, color or national origin.
- e. To engage in any other lawful pursuit permitted under law for organizations, which are exempt from federal income taxation within the contemplation of Section 501(c)(3) of the Code.

Notwithstanding the statement of purposes or powers aforesaid, the Corporation shall not, except to any insubstantial degree, engage in any activities or exercise any powers that are not permitted to be carried on:

a. By a Corporation exempt from federal income tax under section 501(c)(3) of the Code; or

b. By a Corporation, contributions to which are deductible under Section 170(C)(2) of the Code.

No part of the net earnings of the Corporation shall inure to the benefit of, or be distributed to, its trustees, officers, members, if any, employees or other private persons except that the Corporation shall be authorized and empowered to pay reasonable compensation to officers and employees for services rendered and to make payment and distributions in furtherance of the purposes of the Corporation.

No substantial part of the activities of the Corporation shall be carrying on propaganda or otherwise attempting to influence legislation, or participation, intervening in (including the publication or distribution of statements), any political campaign on behalf of any candidate for public office.

ARTICLE IV

The Corporation is governed by the Board of Directors. The Board of Directors shall consist of not less than three (3) and not more than fifteen (15) Directors. Provided that the Corporation has at least three Directors, the number of Directors may at any time or times be increased or decreased as provided in the Bylaws. The term of each Director shall be not less than three years, except as provided in the Bylaws.

ARTICLE V

Notwithstanding any other provisions of these articles, this corporation shall not carry on any other activities not permitted to be carried on by corporations exempt from Federal Income Tax under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. This corporation shall at all times operate as a non-profit making enterprise and no member shall derive any personal monetary gain from its activities or from its properties, funds or assets.

ARTICLE VI

This Corporation shall not issue capital stock but rather certificates of membership may be issued to each member upon such terms and qualifications as may be prescribed by the Bylaws and by the laws of the State of Florida.

ARTICLE VII

The Corporation shall have a perpetual term.

ARTICLE VIII

A Director or Officer of the Corporation shall not be personally liable to this Corporation for damages for breach of fiduciary duty as a Director or Officer, but this Article shall not eliminate or limit the liability of a Director or Officer for acts or omissions which involve intentional misconduct, fraud or a knowing violation of the law, or the payment of distributions in violation of Florida Law. Any repeal or modification of this article by the Directors of the Corporation shall be prospective only, and shall not adversely affect any limitation on the personal liability of a Director or Officer of the Corporation for acts or omissions prior to such repeal or modification.

ARTICLE IX

This property of this Corporation is hereby forever and irrevocably dedicated to charitable and educational purposes stated in Article III hereof, and no part of the net earning or assets of or to the benefit of any other private persons. Upon the dissolution or winding up of the Corporation, any such assets remaining after payment of, or provision for payment of all debts and liabilities of this Corporation, shall be distributed to WESTCARE FOUNDATION, INC., if then existing or if not then existing, to a nonprofit fund, foundation, or corporation, which is organized and operated for scientific, charitable, or educational purposes and which has, by reason of its scientific, charitable, or educational purposes, been granted tax-exempt status under Section 501(c)(3) of the Code, with the intention that such fund, foundation, or corporation shall have been established for the same or similar humanitarian objects or purposes for which this Corporation is established and that such humanitarian object and purposes be

furthered and perpetuated. This Corporation shall not participate in or intervene in any political campaign on behalf of any candidate for public office.

ARTICLE X

The Corporation's resident agent shall be Janette M. McCurley, Esquire who maintains a law office at 100 Second Avenue South, Suite 704, St. Petersburg, FL 33701.

ARTICLE XI

The Corporation reserves the right to amend, alter, change or repeal any provision contained in these Articles of Incorporation by a vote of at least a majority of the voting power of the Board of Directors at a meeting called for that purpose.

ARTICLE XII

Every person who was or is a party to, or is threatened to be made a party to, or is involved in any action, suit proceeding, whether civil, criminal, administrative or investigative, by reason of the fact that he, or a person of whom he is the legal representative, is or was a Director, Officer, employee or agent of the Corporation, or is or was serving at the request of the Corporation as a trustee, director, officer, employee or agent of another Corporation, or as its representative in partnership, joint venture, trust or other enterprise, shall be indemnified and held harmless to the fullest extent legally permissible under the laws of the State of Florida from time to time, against all expenses, liability and loss (including attorney fees, judgments, fines and amounts paid or paid in settlement) reasonably incurred or suffered by him in connection therewith. Such right of indemnification shall be a contract right which may be enforced in any manner desired by such person. The requested funds will be used to assist adults who have been identified with substance abuse and/or co-occurring substance abuse and mental health disorders to obtain and stay substance free, learn how to cope with crisis, learn how to stay safe, obtain employment, and linked to any other services as needed.

1 unit = 1 staff hour 2,000 hours x \$25/hr = \$50,000

<u>Personnel</u>

Case Manager. This position is responsible as the primary advocate and for coordinating all services. They assist the client in linking them with community resources, providing critical support for job development, acquiring stable housing, employment, obtaining and following through with mental health services, and submitting applications for benefits.

100% of annual salary = \$28,850

This position will work 100% of the time on the project and the grant will pay for 100% of salary/benefits.

Fringe Benefits

WestCare Gulfcoast Florida, Inc. fringe benefit rate is 21.9%. Fringe benefits include Social Security and Medicare Tax (FICA) @ 7.65%, Worker's Compensation @ 1%, State Unemployment @ 3%, Retirement @ 3%, and Health/Dental/Life Insurance @ 7.25%.

Supplies

Amounts requested for supplies represent consumables needed to operate the program. Costs are calculated based on historical expenditures.
