General Information Prior Authorization (PA)




- 911 calls for Emergency level services do not require PA.
- Sunstar is responding to all non-emergency requests even if a PA is not obtained.
- This creates ambulance bills for our citizens they were not expecting.

Sunstar has not refused a transport request.

Background on Prior Authorization (PA) Required by Insurance



- Of recent and over the past 10 years, several Federal and various Audits have identified Fraud in the non-emergency ambulance transportation industry
- PA for non-emergency ambulance transportation began in Pinellas County in 2014 for Medicaid recipients with the implementation of Statewide Medicaid Managed Care (SMMC).
- After Medicaid, the PA requirement expanded to Medicare Part C/Advantage and Commercial insurance plans and some specialized Medicare transports, e.g., Dialysis, Wound Care.
- The Florida Hospital Association identified this PA <u>Insurance</u> <u>Requirement</u> is costing \$1.1 Billion due to patient discharge delays.

Impact of Prior Authorization (PA) Required by Insurance



- Fiscal Impact: loss of approximately \$1M annually since 2014.
- Patient Impact: claims that could have been paid by the insurance carrier become the responsibility of the Patient.
 - From 2021 2024, Medicare Part C/Advantage, & Commercial plans denied for no PA increased from 1,661 to 4,385 or 164% demonstrating the PA requirement trend.
 - These accounts were sent to collections.
 - In 2024, an average of 365 patient accounts went to collections each month.
- If this collection trend continues it may result in additional subsidies from the EMS Millage Tax.

Challenges to Obtaining Prior Authorization (PA) Required by Insurance



- 1. The requesting health care provider must obtain the PA before the service is provided; in most cases it cannot be requested by the service provider, Sunstar, per insurance plan requirement.
- Staffing and procedural changes required by hospitals and Skilled Nursing Facilities
- 3. Timeliness to obtain a PA is within the control of the individual insurance carrier.
 - Transport from free standing ERs to hospital main campus for higher level of care or inpatient admission
 - Return to Skilled Nursing Facility for patients treated in the ER
- 4. No standardized method to obtain PA; it varies by individual insurance carrier.

Actions Taken Regarding Pre-Authorization



- Sunstar dispatch began asking the requesting facility for a PA in May 2020 and communicated that the patient may receive a bill if not obtained.
- Correspondence mailed to Hospitals and Skilled Nursing Facilities (SNF) Summer 2025
- Presentations to Gain Feedback & Input:
 - July 17th Comprehensive Meeting: Met with hospitals and Skilled Nursing Facilities
 - September 18th Presented to Medical Control Board
 - September 19th Presented to EMS Advisory Council
 - Florida Ambulance Associate (FAA) Board Meeting Agenda Item
 - 13 individual meetings with healthcare facilities; provided each with a scope of potential impact by assessing 3 calendar years of data for each entity for non-emergency transport initiated at their facilities.
- Continuous Follow-Up Meetings with Hospitals and SNF's to provide Payer data and assist with a solution. (Ryde Central)
- Notification was sent to hospitals and SNFs with an effective date of November 1, 2025, to start obtaining PA.

Potential Solutions to Prior Authorization Requirements



- Hospital and Skilled Nursing Facilities can choose to be payer of last resort via contract. Some other systems practice this approach.
- Work with major insurance providers to distinguish different levels of non-emergency transport to request PA not be required in certain circumstances, e.g., Free Standing ED to Hospital for higher level of care
- Allow for the issuance of Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity (COPCN) for non-emergency interfacility transportation for hospitals.
 - This action would not eliminate the need for PA regardless of the provider.
 - There are specific pros and cons related to this proposal, associated with fragmentation of the system, loss of economies of scale, disaster emergency response capacity, quality control, etc.
