



Pinellas County 2025 National Flood Insurance Program's (NFIP) Community Rating System (CRS) Annual Report

1 OVERVIEW

Pinellas County participates in the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) Community Rating System (CRS). Submittal of these annual reports to the Board is a program requirement.

Participation in this program provides enhanced public safety, reduced damage to property and public infrastructure, avoidance of economic disruption and loss, and supports a resilient Pinellas.

Because Pinellas County and most of its municipalities participate in the NFIP CRS, residents and businesses may get up to a 30% discount on their flood insurance premiums. The savings adds up to more than \$10 million dollars per year for unincorporated property owners. Unincorporated Pinellas County is currently rated a CRS Class 2 which results in up to a 40% discount on NFIP flood insurance premiums.

2 REPORT CONTENTS

The calendar-year 2025 annual updates required by the CRS program include the following:

- Pinellas County Local Mitigation Strategy (LMS) Annual Update Report, which includes:
 - Pinellas County Repetitive Loss Area Analysis (RLAA) (*page 198 of 300 herein*)
 - Multi-jurisdictional Program for Public Information (PPI) (*page 169 of 300 herein*)
 - Flood Insurance Improvement Plan (*page 185 of 300 herein*)

The LMS is a countywide hazard mitigation plan that includes the County and participating municipalities, as well as several agencies and non-governmental stakeholders. LMS is a plan developed to reduce and/or eliminate the risks associated with natural and man-made hazards. These plans must be in accordance with the Federal Disaster Mitigation Act of 2000. Without an approved LMS, the County would be unable to apply for various Federal hazard mitigation grants. The current LMS also serves as the County's and many municipalities' Floodplain Management Plan. Participation in the National Flood Insurance Program's Community Rating System requires the adoption of a Floodplain Management Plan.

The RLAA is a detailed mitigation plan for repetitive loss areas. It provides more specific guidance on how to reduce damage from repetitive flooding than the LMS. Assessment of the flood hazard, including repetitive loss areas, is a required component of the LMS if it is to be used as the community's Floodplain Management plan. The community must prepare an annual evaluation report for its repetitive loss areas.

The PPI is a step-by-step coordinated approach to flood hazard outreach. The County's purpose in developing this plan is to improve communication with citizens, and to provide information about flood hazards, flood safety, flood insurance, and ways to protect property and floodplain functions to those who can benefit from it.

This letter is sent in compliance with the Florida Administrative Code 27P-22.004(4)(e) requirements pertaining to the 2025 – 2026 annual update of Pinellas County's Local Mitigation Strategy (LMS) and its Working Group.

The Chair for Pinellas County's LMS Working Group is Smita Ambadi, Principal Planner with Pinellas County, and the Vice-Chair is Sarah Kessler, Environmental Specialist with the City of Clearwater, as elected by the LMS Working Group on January 21st.

The County's LMS membership consists of two types of members: voting and advisory. Voting members include representation from all participating municipalities and Pinellas County. Advisory members include representation from other public and private agencies including regional partners, nonprofits, and community members. Advisory members do not formally vote but are consulted for technical expertise and valuable input into the planning process. The Working Group continues to work with and seeks to increase participation of not-for-profit organizations, faith-based associations, and the private sector. The LMS meetings that were held in 2025 are as follows: January 8, January 22, February 12, March 5, March 26, April 2, April 9, May 7, June 11, June 18, June 25, July 9, July 16, July 21, August 27 (Annual Update Training), October 1, October 29, and December 17. These include the regular scheduled quarterly meetings, and meetings held for the 2025 LMS Five-Year Update, the LMS Annual Update Training, Elevate Florida, and the Hazard Mitigation Grant Program (HMGP) project prioritization process. Discussion topics and other pertinent information were disseminated to the Working Group at the LMS meetings, and through emails, and the LMS SharePoint site. All meetings are posted on Pinellas County's LMS webpage, including the meeting schedule for 2026.

Elevate Florida is a first-of-its-kind, groundbreaking statewide residential mitigation program. Led by the FDEM, this program is designed to protect homes and communities by reducing damage caused by natural disasters like hurricanes and floods.

Application Details

Property Owner Eligibility

Your property does not need to have experienced flooding or damage to be considered. However, applications may be prioritized based on history of loss. Property owners must:

- Be over the age of 18,
- Be a U.S. citizen, non-citizen national, or qualified alien,
- The legal owner of the residential property in the State of Florida, and
- **Be able to contribute up to twenty-five percent (25%) of the project's total cost.** Property owners will be required to provide up to 25% of initial inspection costs prior to inspections being completed. Total project cost will vary based on factors such as project type, square footage of living space, foundation and construction type, and any necessary project activities. Approved property owners will receive a detailed breakdown of their construction cost-share and will have time to decide if they would like to move forward with the project's next phase. The cost-share will also include relocation expenses during construction, meaning the program will pay at least 75 percent of these expenses.

Multi-family real estate such as duplexes, triplexes, condos, townhomes, semi-detached homes, apartments and manufactured homes may be eligible.

Eligible Construction Projects

- **Structure Elevation:** Physically raising an existing structure.
- **Mitigation Reconstruction:** The construction of an improved, elevated building on the same site where an existing building and/or foundation has been partially or completely demolished or destroyed. These activities result in the construction of code-compliant and hazard-resistant structures. Mitigation Reconstruction is the alternative to Structure Elevation when the structure is not sound enough to elevate, as determined during application review.
- **Acquisition/Demolition:** A structure is purchased from voluntary sellers and demolished, to be maintained by the local community as open space. The local community must agree to participate in this project type.
- **Wind Mitigation:** Measures that reduce the risk of future wind damage to structures. This may include alterations to the roof, windows, doors, and other vulnerable components of structures. Wind mitigation is another alternative for homes that are not sound enough to elevate.

Potential Program Benefits

- **Significant Cost Savings** – Homeowners can save 75–100 percent on the cost of protecting their property from future flood damage, making it a cost-effective alternative to managing the project independently.
- **Lower Insurance Premiums** – Reduce flood insurance costs with improved property resilience.
- **Increased Property Value** – Strengthen your home’s value with long-term flood protection.
- **Comprehensive Support** – Enjoy end-to-end assistance, from application to construction, including contractor services, temporary housing support, and Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) accommodations.

Given the bridge’s physical connection to the seawall and the presence of major underground utilities beneath it, failure of the seawall would significantly threaten transportation continuity, public safety, and emergency service delivery in this high-traffic corridor. The project will directly protect approximately 0.15 to 0.18 acres (roughly 6,500 to 7,800 square feet) of vulnerable shoreline and upland infrastructure. This includes the full 131.5-foot length of the seawall and an inland buffer zone extending approximately 50–60 feet based on topographic survey cross-sections and the area protected from erosion and wave attack. The proposed seawall elevation of 5.2 ft NAVD88, constructed with structurally superior NZ steel sheet piles, is expected to provide shoreline protection against wave action, overtopping, and erosion associated with storm events in the 10- to 25-year return interval (approx. 4–10% annual chance). While the wall does not meet the minimum elevation to fully prevent inundation from the 1% annual chance storm event (FEMA Base Flood Elevation = 10–12 ft NAVD88), it will provide significant mitigation against smaller, more frequent storm surges and tidal flooding. Failure of the existing seawall poses a severe risk of structural undermining and utility exposure, which could result in flood-related damage, infrastructure service disruption, and erosion hazards for the bridge and adjacent properties. Installation of new backflow prevention vaults will significantly reduce the frequency and severity of flooding caused by tidal inundation. In addition, this project will support the daily local and regional commercial and private vehicular traffic as well as the Pinellas Suncoast Transit Authority's (PSTA) Bus services connecting downtown St Petersburg to downtown Tampa and activity centers in between. The WTP was originally constructed in 1930 and has an operating permit for production up to 68 million gallons per day (MGD) but normal operations have a throughput of 28-33 MGD. The City purchases water from Tampa Bay Water, which is supplied from the Cosme-Odesa well field. Water supply enters the plant from Tampa Bay Water through three individual lines, is treated, and potable water is distributed to the entire City of St Petersburg plus the City of Gulfport, a total of 273,673 people according to 2019 census data. As the only occupied parcel the City owns outside of the City limits, this site provides a geographically higher location less vulnerable to potential storm events, and provides an opportunity to enhance City emergency operations functions. The Code Plus project will design the new structure to harden the facility against hurricanes, severe storms, and power outages to ensure continuity of City emergency response operations at the Cosme WTP during and after such events. This will be achieved by incorporating higher standards above Florida Building Code and ASCE-7 minimum requirements and designing the facility to withstand 150 mile-per-hour wind speeds. The City will consider the following elements from FEMA 453 - Design Guide for Improving Critical Facility Safety from Flooding and High Winds and FEMA P-1019 Emergency Power Systems for Critical Facilities that are eligible under a Code Plus project: hurricane doors and windows with impact-resistant glass, exterior wall protection from water infiltration, weatherstripping, roof and truss system including gravity-support brackets for gutters, and an on-site permanent generator as a redundant power source. The permanent generator will specifically provide redundancy to the WTP's service lines that pump water from Tampa Bay Water's well fields, which currently operate on grid power only with no backup. If the well fields are not powered due to grid failure from a severe storm or hurricane, potable water storage will provide adequate supply for a few days until they are depleted. If the power grid is disrupted for more than a few days and the City's stored water supply is depleted, potable water service would be lost throughout the entire City and Gulfport. Therefore, the proposed Code Plus project will not only ensure continued emergency operational capacity for the City during and after a severe storm or hurricane, but will also secure access to potable water through short and long-term power outages that affect the Cosme WTP. Additionally, during the City will design safe rooms, as part of the EOC, that provide near-absolute life-safety protection during a hurricane to the critical and essential services personnel that must remain in the EOC during a hazard event (approximately 30 staff members). This will be achieved by ensuring the room is designed to withstand at least 180 mph winds as outlined in ICC 500. The City will follow all guidelines and standards laid out in FEMA P-361, Safe Rooms for Tornadoes and Hurricanes (2021) and ICC 500 Standard for the Design and Construction of Storm Shelters (2020) in the design of the room. In addition to these services, the Fleet facility also includes the repair and maintenance of radio communication equipment for public and non-public safety which are crucial to maintain emergency services. While a generator is not needed to run the radios, the generator does run the back-up encryption for the system in case the radio should go out. Finally, the facility also serves as a sub-emergency operations center (EOC) for the City. Fleet staff use the facility building as an EOC to maintain operations until wind reaches a sustained speed of 45 mph when they must evacuate. In addition to the City of St. Petersburg, the facility also provides services to the University of South Florida, St. Petersburg (University) and the City of Gulfport. The facility maintains the University's vehicle fleet. The facility also provides services for the City of Gulfport during emergency situations, including sharing fuel. During disaster events, the Fleet Facility requires functional operations to continue without outside assistance for at least seven days. This includes back-up power generation. The current generator at the facility is unreliable during an emergency, and does not have an inverter. This renders the generator incapable of working with the site's electronics or sensitive components. These issues were made evident during Hurricane Ian when storm damages required the use of the site's current generator. When the generator worked it damaged computer boards for the electronic fuel station and the facility. This generator failed after the first day on generator power and the City was forced to rent an additional generator for 10 days before power was restored at the site. Additionally, the current generator is not big enough to serve the entire Fleet Facility. In order to ensure that the Fleet Facility has the necessary electrical power to maintain continuity of emergency operations, the City proposes to install a 600-kW diesel fueled emergency generator that will serve as a source of redundant power in the event of a power failure. The generator will be able to directly connect to the existing systems so that when power is lost, the generator can immediately and directly provide power to necessary elements within the facility. Additionally, the proposed generator will be larger than the current model, ensuring the entire facility, and any future updates, can maintain power during emergencies. The proposed project is expected to cost \$750,000, based on preliminary estimates. This facility directly addresses the city's more disaster resilient community goal in the Pinellas County Local Mitigation Strategy. 1 INTRODUCTION AND PLANNING COMMITTEE

This annual report presents the ongoing status of Pinellas County's Program for Public Information (PPI), which includes the flood insurance and flood response plans. This program is the floodplain management outreach arm of the Countywide Local Mitigation Strategy (LMS). The PPI includes all unincorporated areas of Pinellas County as well as 19 partner municipalities:

- City of Belleair Bluffs
- City of Clearwater
- City of Gulfport
- City of Indian Rocks Beach
- Town of Indian Shores
- City of Largo

Staff and stakeholders from these jurisdictions comprise the Pinellas County Flood Risk and Mitigation Public Information Working Group (FRMPIWG), which serves as the PPI committee as well as the stakeholder working group for the LMS. Having the same group of staff and stakeholders offers better coordination and consistency in messaging countywide and avoids duplication of efforts to reduce flood risk and damage. This committee meets the basic CRS PPI requirements, and it also evaluates Flood Insurance Coverage, Floodplain Management, Flood Warning and Response, and provides input to the multi-jurisdictional LMS. The FRMPIWG Core Members and Additional Support tables were updated in 2025 to reflect personnel changes (Table 1-1 and Table 1-2).

2 ASSESSMENT OF PUBLIC INFORMATION NEEDS AND TARGET AUDIENCES

Pinellas County and its 19 participating communities continue to implement the PPI. The committee members met three times in 2025 to evaluate the outreach initiatives and update the plan report, as well as provide input on the LMS. Table 2-1 summarizes the committee's actions and discussion points from all three meetings. FRMPIWG meetings are advertised on the County's website (pinellas.gov/boards-councils-and-committees/flood-risk-and-mitigation-public-information-working-group/) and are open to the public.

Other notable discussions include presentations for mobile home parks held by the City of Oldsmar and Indian Shores highlighting a project focused on boat owners. The group discussed some upcoming hurricane preparedness events and the migration of the SharePoint.
July 18, 2025	The committee reviewed the status of the LMS and Multi-Jurisdictional PPI, along with their adoption status. The committee learned that the Pinellas County Board of County Commissioners adopted the 5-year update for the LMS and PPI. The attendee's list was discussed and updated for the year to reflect any staff or stakeholder changes. Other outreach project initiatives were discussed including the utility bill onserts, social media campaigns, updates to the Real Estate Disclosure Program, and dissemination of Repetitive Loss Area mailouts, as well as storm surge signage updates.
October 24, 2025	The committee reviewed the status of the PPI and potential updates to the report, including updates to the Flood Insurance Coverage Assessment and Repetitive Loss Area Analysis. The committee also discussed implementation of projects, creating new projects, and the status of the outreach projects. The committee created a task force to produce consistent flood-proofing messaging and flyers. The committee reviewed the LMS for messaging consistency and discussed the annual update. The committee will review the LMS in detail and provide additional comments to County staff to be incorporated into the LMS annual review.

The committee also reviewed the types of flooding across the County and how each is being addressed through outreach and mitigation. The committee refined priority audiences and messages to identify new ways for engaging with them about flood risks.

4 MESSAGES AND OUTCOMES

Outreach campaign messages must be accurate and concise to produce actionable and positive outcomes. In 2025, the committee established a task force to evaluate existing key messages and identify updates to key messages established in 2024.

5 PROGRAM FOR PUBLIC INFORMATION (PPI) PROJECTS

New projects, such as the Tampa Bay News inserts, were also developed to streamline the coordination of messaging and better communicate to the public. Appendix B details the projects and includes the status of each.

FRMPIWG SHAREPOINT TOOLKIT

The FRMPIWG SharePoint toolkit, maintained by Pinellas County, allows the participating communities to access PPI and LMS resources, including outreach project templates. Communities can also upload completed project documentation. The toolkit addresses the needs of the participating communities to better coordinate messages and projects. Communities can view outreach messages of other communities as well as edit and upload their own content. The toolkit also provides templates for brochures, community newsletters, repetitive loss area letters and other valuable tools they can use to better communicate with residents about flood hazards and measures they can take to reduce risks. The toolkit also tracks and documents the status of outreach initiatives.

Since its inception in 2020, the committee has continually updated the toolkit with a more modern, user-friendly interface. The toolkit has evolved beyond outreach to meet further needs of the participating communities by providing calendar notifications of pertinent outreach events and allowing the download of other documents, such as LMS documentation and the Flood Warning and Response Plan.

FLOOD RESPONSE PLAN

The committee identified a two-part update for the Flood Response Toolkit. Part One updates the messaging to reflect clear actions by the municipalities and direct messaging to the public. Part Two will allow for better organization and more user-friendly search capabilities. The committee completed Part One before the 2024 Hurricane Season. The group aims to finish Part Two by the end of 2026. Additionally, the County and the *Tampa Bay Times* developed the 2025 Hurricane Preparedness Guide to update emergency contacts, pet guidelines, and storm timelines.

6 FLOOD INSURANCE IMPROVEMENT PLAN

The committee reviewed and updated the flood insurance improvement plan. In 2025, the County received the updated policy claims and repetitive loss information. Appendix B details the updates to the plan.

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1 INTRODUCTION

This annual report presents the ongoing status of the **Pinellas County Flood Insurance Coverage Improvement Plan**. This plan is developed and coordinated by the multi-jurisdictional **Pinellas County Flood Risk and Mitigation Public Information Working Group (FRMPIWG)**, which serves as the Flood Insurance Assessment and Improvement Plan Committee. The FRMPIWG is also responsible for developing and coordinating the efforts of the multi-jurisdictional Program for Public Information (PPI), Floodplain Management, Flood Warning and Response, and providing input to the multi-jurisdictional Local Mitigation Strategy (LMS). The FRMPIWG includes representatives from the community's floodplain management division and the public information office as well as representatives from local insurance agencies.

REVIEW OF FLOOD INSURANCE POLICY DATA

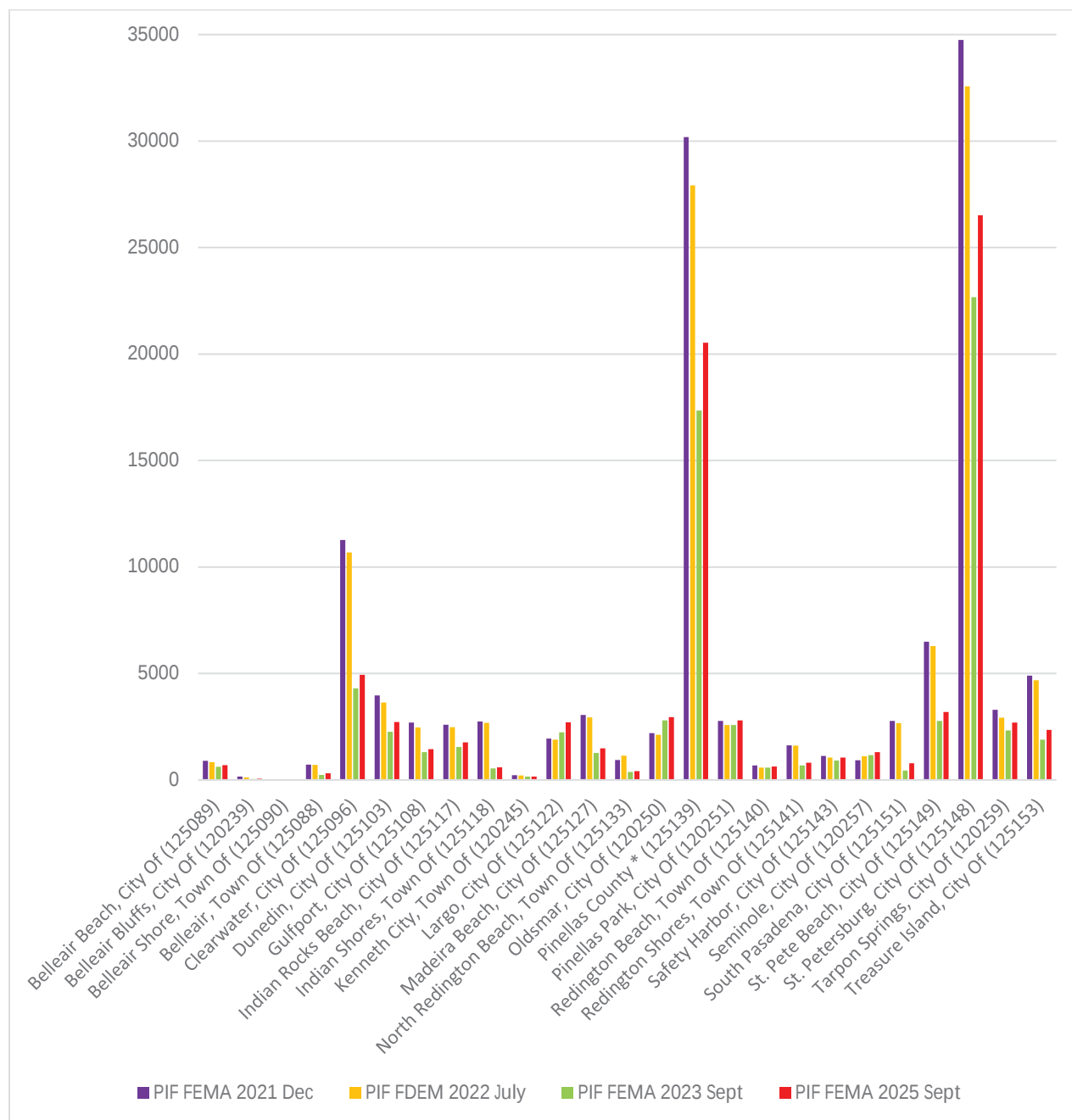

The provided data included the community's name, address, occupancy type, flood zone, premiums, fees, building coverage, contents coverage, and policy effective date for active contracts. Note that the 2023 data is based on the assumed community from the address geolocation and does not include premium data.

Since Risk Rating 2.0 began in 2021, there has been a decrease in NFIP policy counts year to year for most of the Pinellas County communities (Table 2). It is unclear how many people dropped NFIP policies to purchase flood insurance through a private insurer or how many people chose to not renew their NFIP policies because of increased rates. There is an increase in NFIP policy counts between 2023 and 2025, which could be from homeowners being enrolled in group flood insurance policies by FEMA, property sales increasing the number of federally backed mortgages, the demolition and construction of new structures, private flood insurance companies dropping members, and the outreach efforts of the working group. Although there has been an increase in NFIP policies between 2023 and 2025, the NFIP policy counts are drastically lower

than they were in 2021. The difference in the number of NFIP policies is concerning and the working group will continue to identify, improve, and implement outreach to educate the public about the benefits of insurance coverage following a flood. Countywide, the majority of the PIF in 2025 were for single family homes in the FEMA Special Flood Hazard Area (SFHA) (Table 3). A focus on outreach to residential properties will take precedence.

Figure 2: Countywide NFIP PIF by FEMA Flood Zone and Structure Type

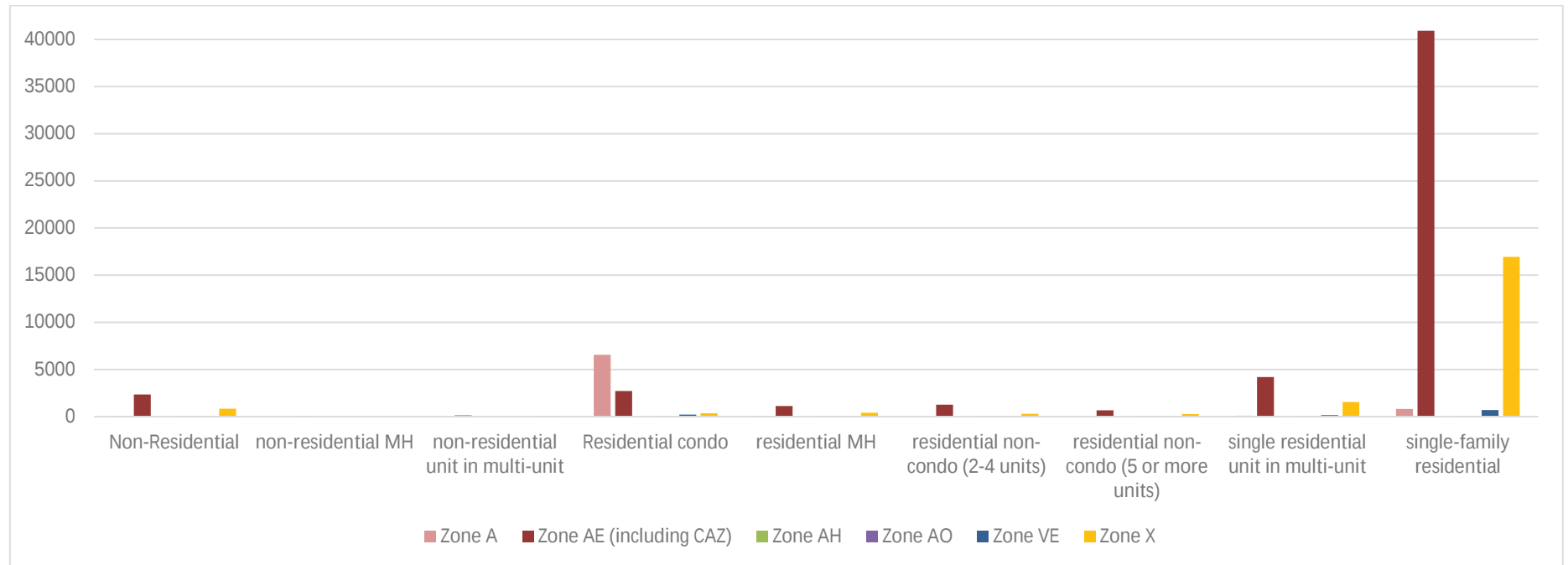

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PINELLAS COUNTY NFIP COMMUNITIES REPETITIVE LOSS AREA ANALYSES

Introduction

Flooding continues to pose a significant challenge to the safety, resilience, and long-term sustainability of Pinellas County. Properties that experience repeated flood losses place a disproportionate burden on residents, local resources, and the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP). Structures located in flood prone areas are costly and may be classified by the NFIP as Repetitive Loss (RL) or Severe Repetitive Loss (SRL) structures. An RL structure is one that has had two or more NFIP-paid flood insurance claims of at least \$1,000 within any rolling 10-year period. An SRL property is one that has experienced multiple flood losses of significant severity, such as four or more separate NFIP claims of at least \$5,000 each, or two or more claims where the cumulative amount exceeds the value of the building. These definitions highlight properties where repeated flooding is not incidental but indicative of higher flood vulnerability.

To better understand the underlying causes and consequences of these recurring losses and to identify any potential mitigation strategies, Unincorporated Pinellas County and multiple municipalities have undertaken Repetitive Loss Area Analyses (RLAA) in accordance with the requirements of the NFIP Community Rating System (CRS) program. The purpose of these analyses is to examine areas containing RL and SRL properties and nearby buildings that are subject to the same flood hazard, evaluate the physical, environmental, and flood hazard factors contributing to flooding, and develop actionable recommendations that reduce future flood risk. Unlike a parcel-specific engineering study, the RLAA focuses on the broader neighborhood-scale conditions that shape flood risk like building characteristics, flood behavior, community vulnerabilities, and drainage patterns.

It is important to note that the RL and SRL properties are merely representative of the community's overall repetitive flooding problem. Other structures near the ones listed by FEMA may have been uninsured during the floods, may have had single flood insurance claims, or may have had claims under private market policies. As such, all properties with the same exposure to repeated flood damage are analyzed through the RLAA.

This report is intended to support Pinellas County and its municipal floodplain management programs, guide mitigation investments, inform local planning efforts, reduce flood losses and NFIP claims, enhance public safety, and strengthen compliance with CRS requirements.

The findings will also inform outreach to property owners to help promote long-term resilience. These findings and recommendations will be incorporated into the Pinellas County Local Mitigation Strategy (LMS), which serves as the Floodplain Management Plan for Unincorporated Pinellas County and most of its municipalities. Countywide Flood Loss Overview

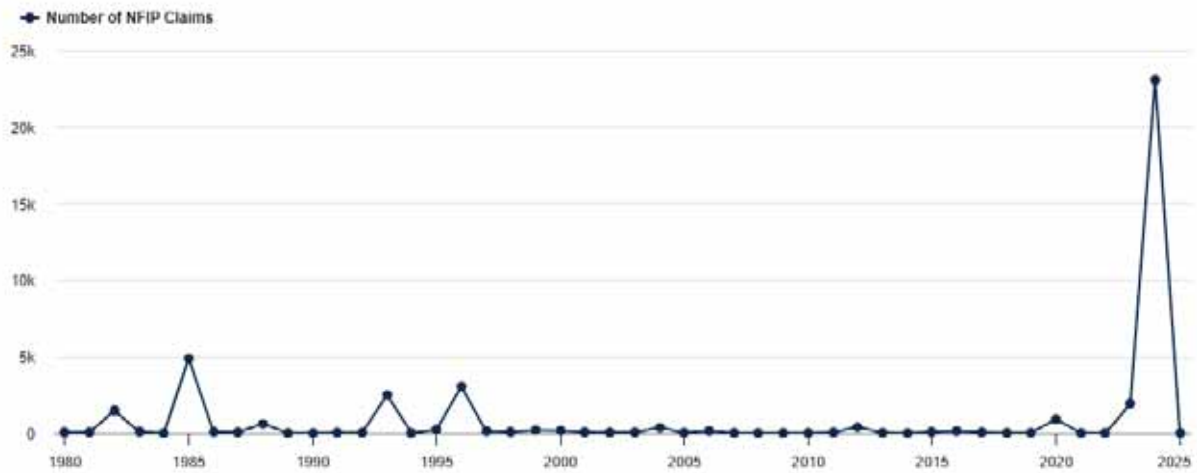


Figure 2: NFIP claim payments in Pinellas County, Florida through 2025 (floodsmart.gov/historical-nfip-claims-information-and-trends)

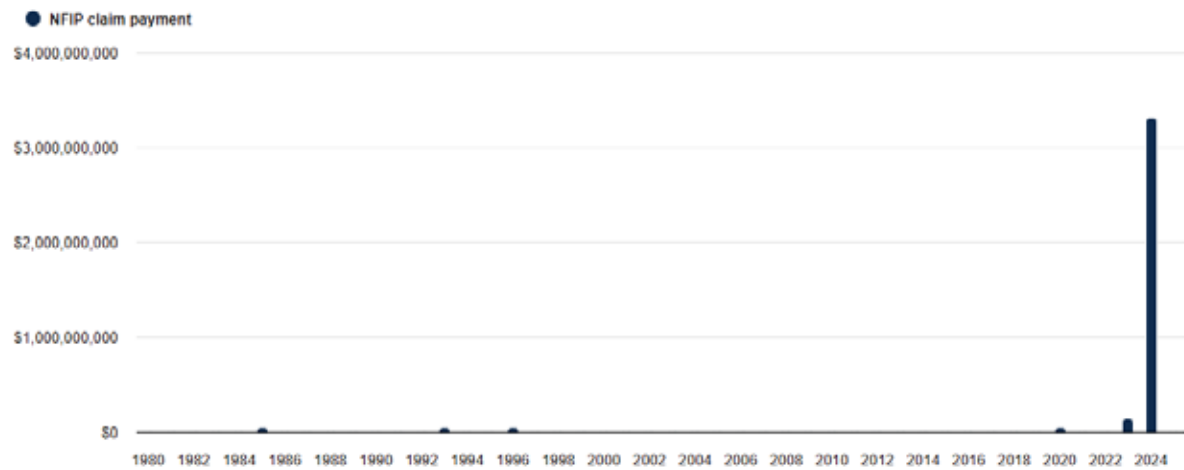


Figure 3: NFIP Claims paid through August 2025

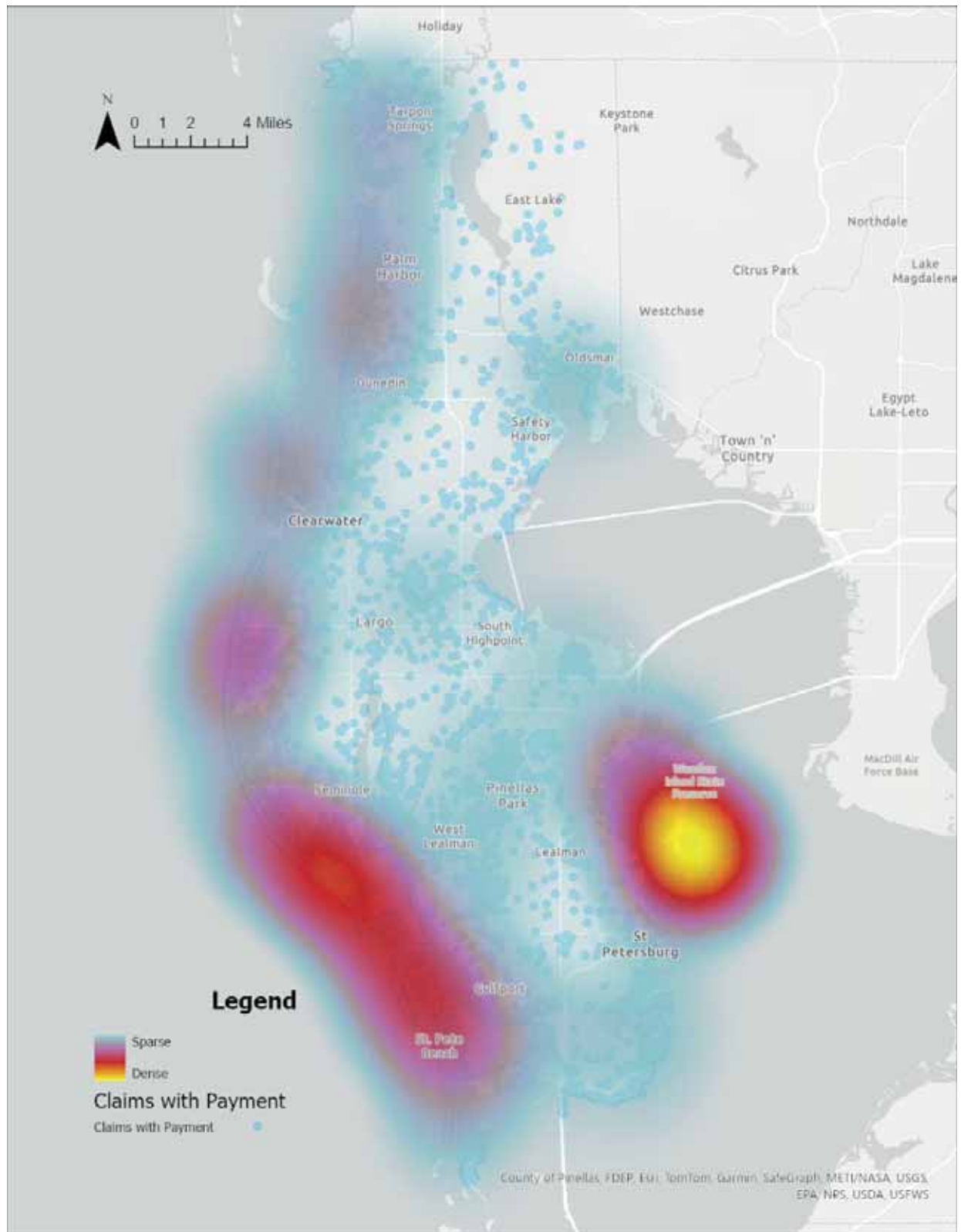


Figure 4: NFIP claim payments in Pinellas County, Florida through August 2025

Countywide, 41,356 NFIP claims have been paid through 2025. This equates to over 3.6 billion dollars in claims paid by NFIP (Figures 1 and 2). Structures with claims are generally located in low-lying riverine and coastal areas. Pinellas County claims data, as of August 2025, is shown in Figure 3, Figure 4 and Table 1.

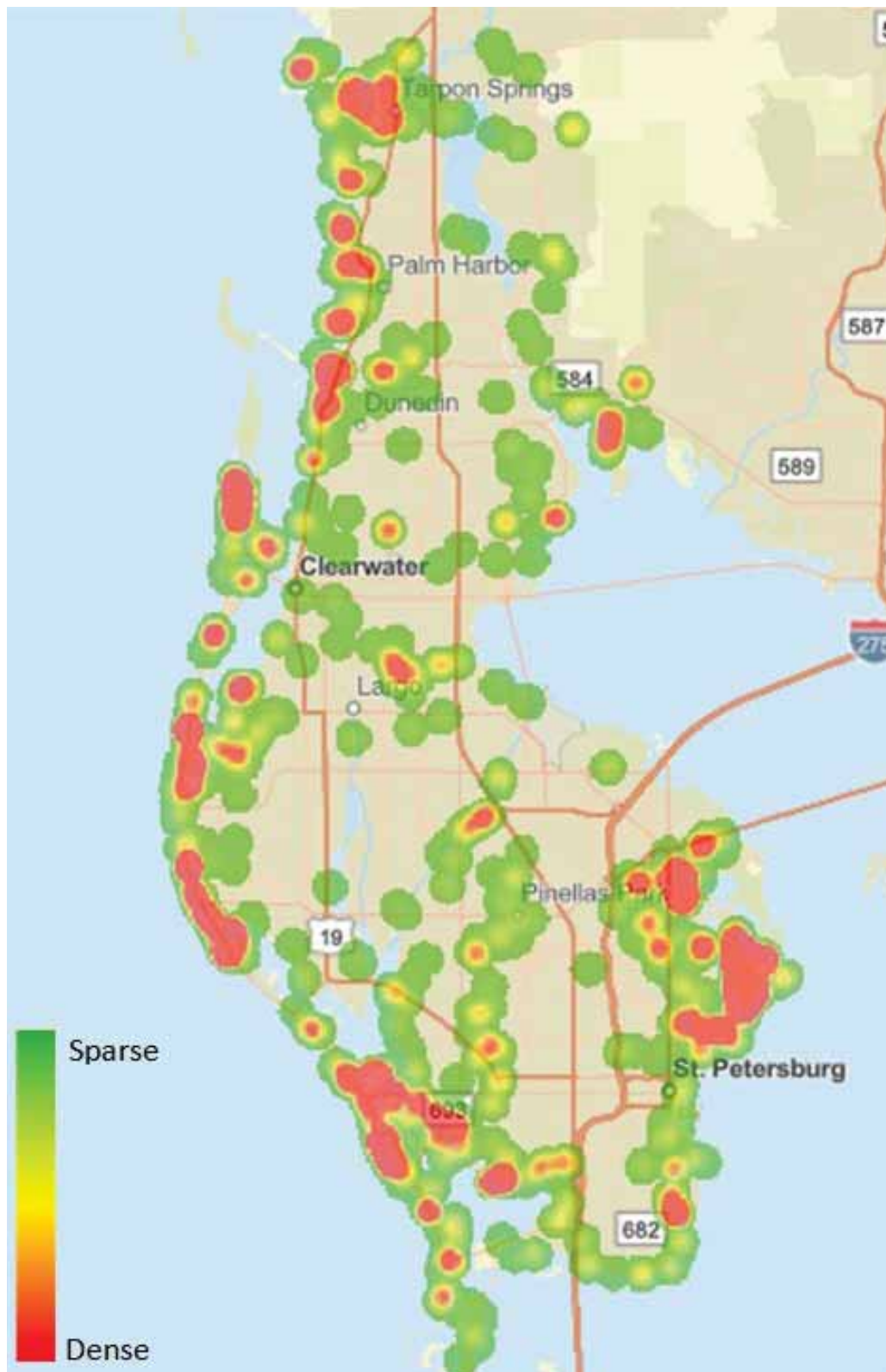


Figure 6: Pinellas County Repetitive Loss Properties Summary

There are 3,042 RL structures across Pinellas County. Of the total NFIP claims paid, almost 600 million dollars is attributed to flood damage to the RL structures (Figure 5, Figure 6 and Table 2). Pinellas County has 24 incorporated municipalities with many of them having 40-50% of their RL structures classified as SRL (Table 3). Like with the claims, RL structures are generally located in low-lying riverine and coastal areas.

Methodology

FEMA claims and repetitive loss data were geospatially mapped using the latitude and longitude coordinates provided in the dataset. For records without coordinate information, addresses were geocoded to generate location points. These claim points were then appended with data from the Pinellas County Property Appraiser's Office through spatial analysis.

Each claim point was associated with a parcel by identifying the closest address point and assigning its corresponding Parcel ID. This Parcel ID served as the related field for the claim data with property appraiser records.

In addition, both FEMA claims and Repetitive Loss (RL) points were spatially evaluated against multiple flood hazard layers, including Sea-level rise projections, Hurricane storm surge inundation areas, and the 25 and 100-yr design storm floodplains. Any claim or RL point located within 50 feet of a mapped flood hazard was considered vulnerable to that specific risk.

Due to inherent limitations in geocoding and spatial matching processes, minor positional inaccuracies may exist. Therefore, the results should be considered representative and suitable for the purposes of this analysis, rather than exact.

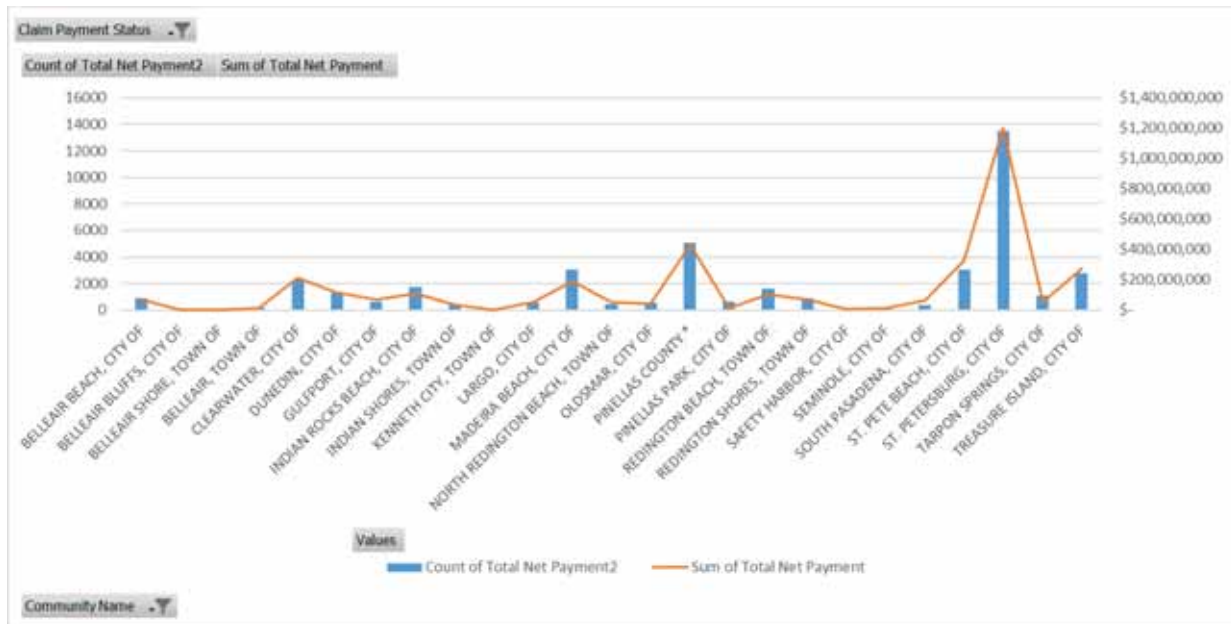

Figure 5: Repetitive Loss Heat Map

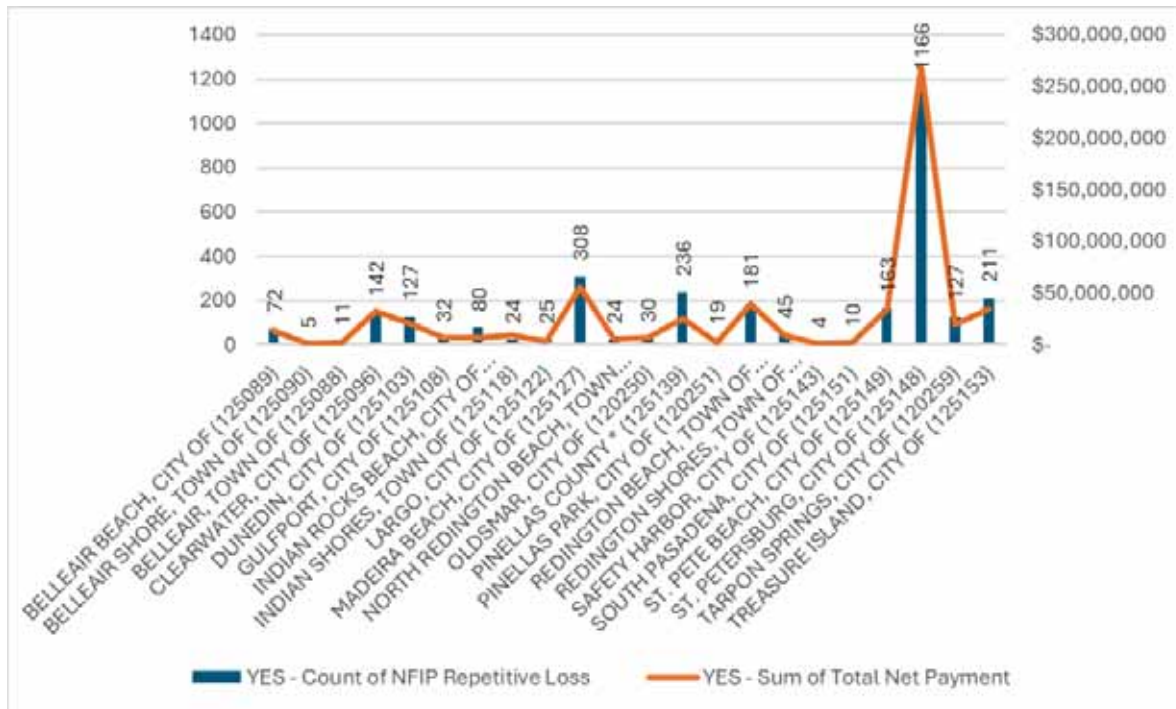

Causes of Flooding

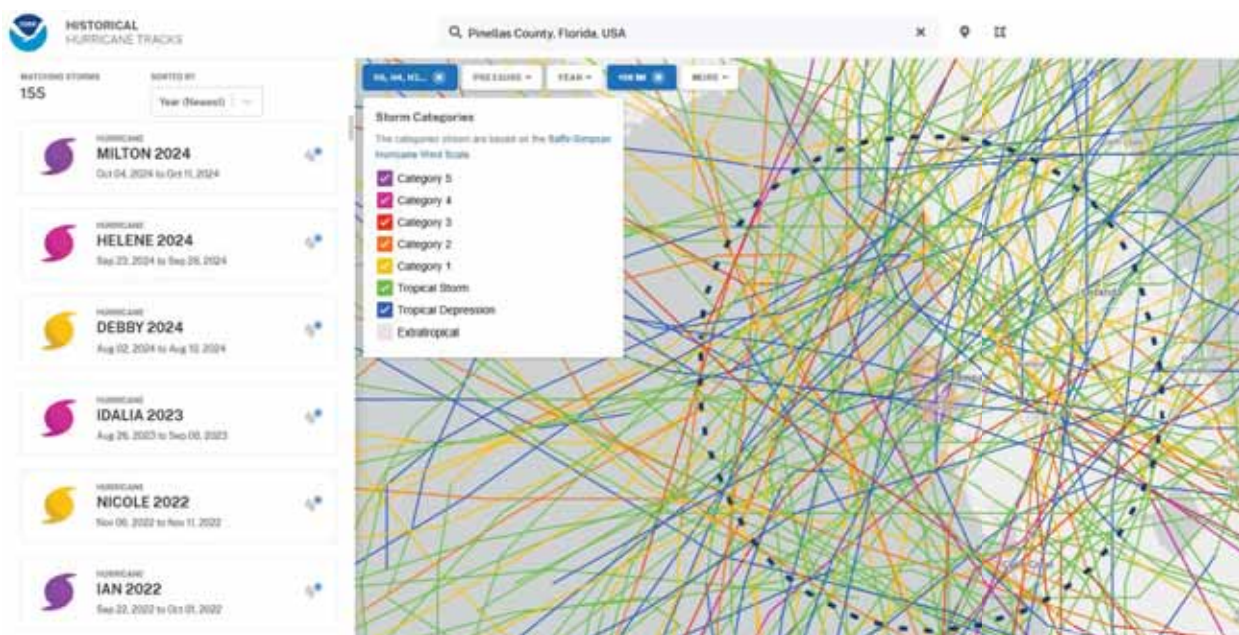


Figure 8: Tropical events within 100 Miles of Pinellas County Since 1970

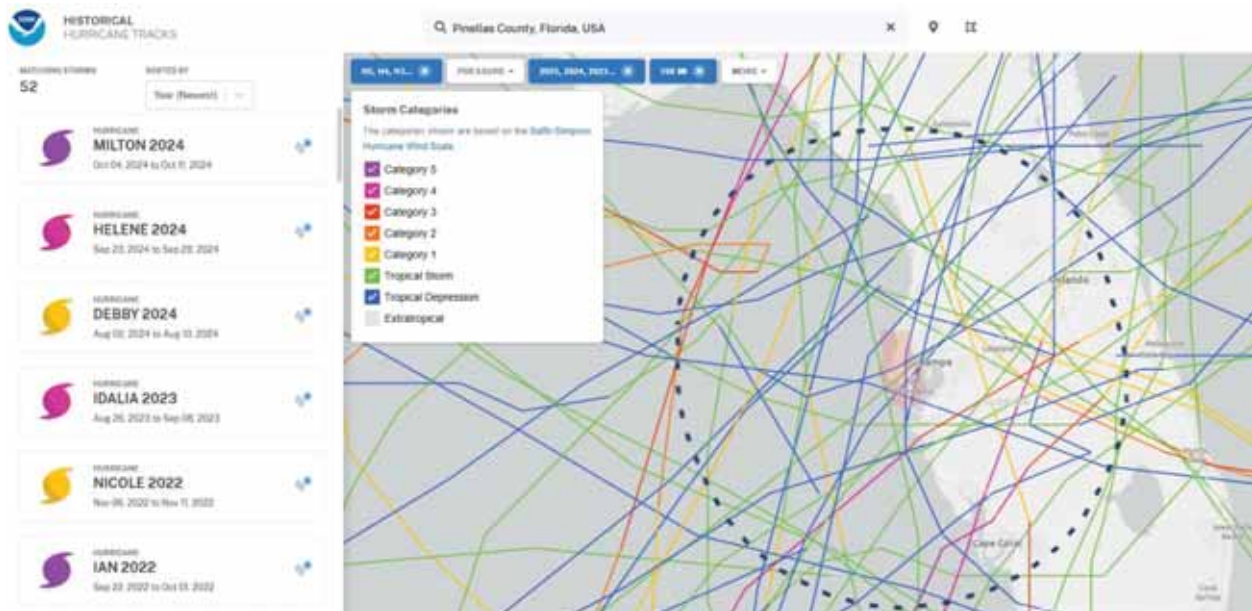


Figure 9: Pinellas County Hurricanes Prior to 1970

Tropical events, including tropical depressions, tropical storms, and hurricanes, are the primary cause of flooding associated with NFIP claims across the county. These tropical events result in flooding from storm surge, moderate to excessive rainfall, or a combination thereof. Most flood events in the County were associated with named storms. Based on data from the NOAA, 155 tropical events have passed within 100 miles of Pinellas County, dating back to the 1800s (Figure 7). Since flood hazard maps became available in Pinellas County in 1970, 52 tropical events have passed within 100 miles of the county, of which several tropical depressions crossed the county (Figure 8); however, no hurricanes have made landfall in the county since flood maps and floodplain management regulation have gone into effect across Pinellas County. Prior to this, four hurricanes passed through Pinellas County (Figure 9).

Most of the RL structures are in low-lying coastal or riverine areas. Some of the RLs are located along tidally influenced creeks where astronomical tides may prevent runoff from rainfall to discharge. Generally, these RLs were built prior to the existence of flood hazard

maps, thus flood damage is attributed to the structures having been built below the current 100-year flood elevation. To a lesser extent, some RL structures are in areas outside of designated flood hazard and are impacted by storm events that cause flooding beyond the 100-year flood.

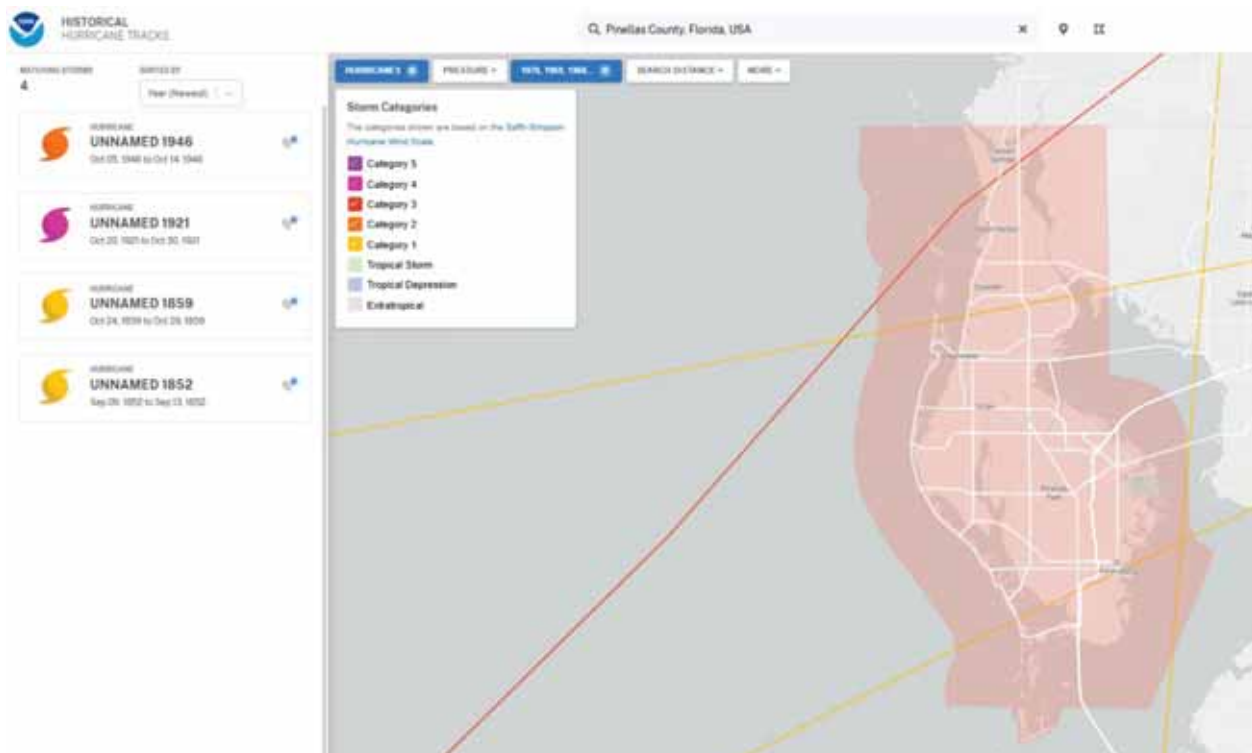


Figure 10: Hurricane Idalia Track 2023

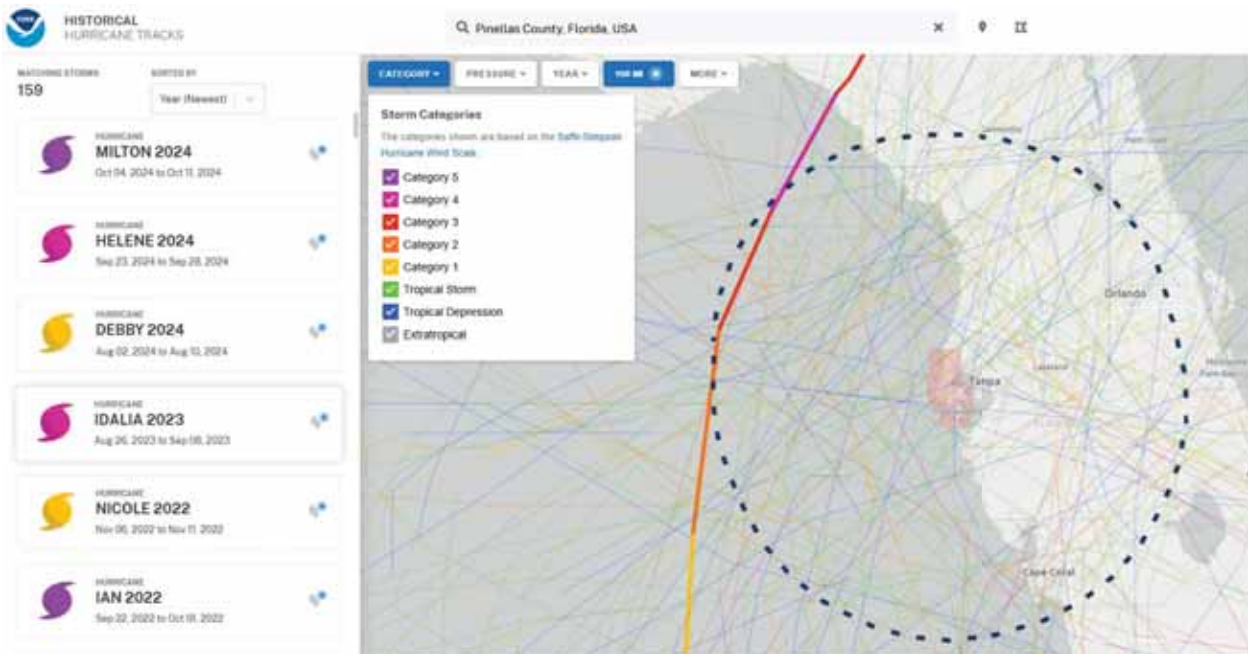


Figure 11: Hurricane Helene Track 2024

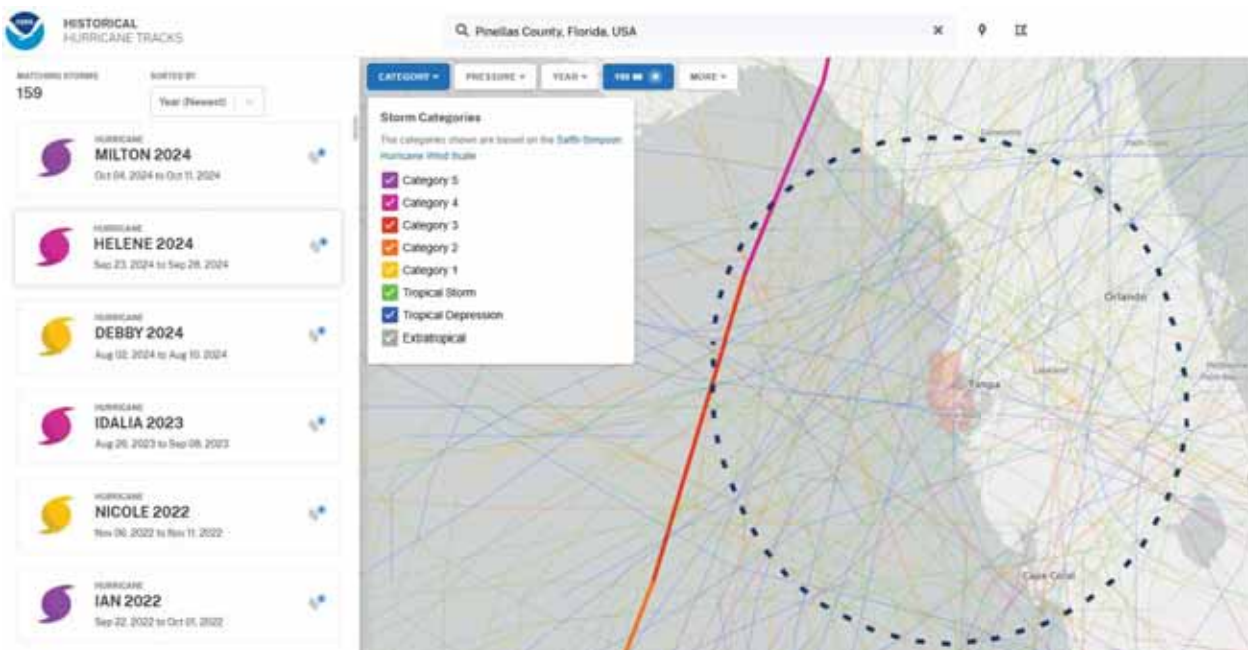


Figure 12: Hurricane Milton Track 2024

Many structures have become classified as RL since 2020 as a result of flooding from several storm events, including Hurricane Eta in 2020, Hurricane Idalia and a winter front in 2023, followed by three storm events in 2024 (Figure 10, Figure 11, Figure 12). The 2024 events included an extreme rainfall event, Tropical Storm Debby, which brought heavy rainfall in tandem with astronomical tides, followed by Hurricane Helene, which was over 100-miles away and still brought a 7 ft storm surge, and lastly, Hurricane Milton, which brought extreme rainfall reaching a 250 year-event in some areas of Pinellas County.

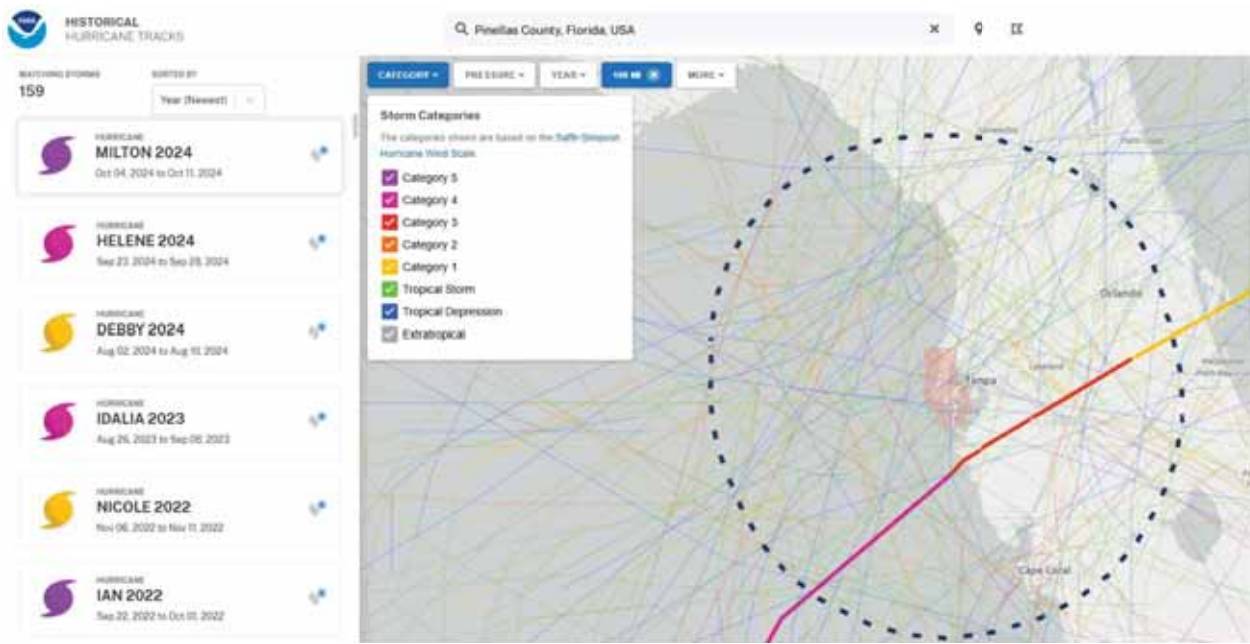
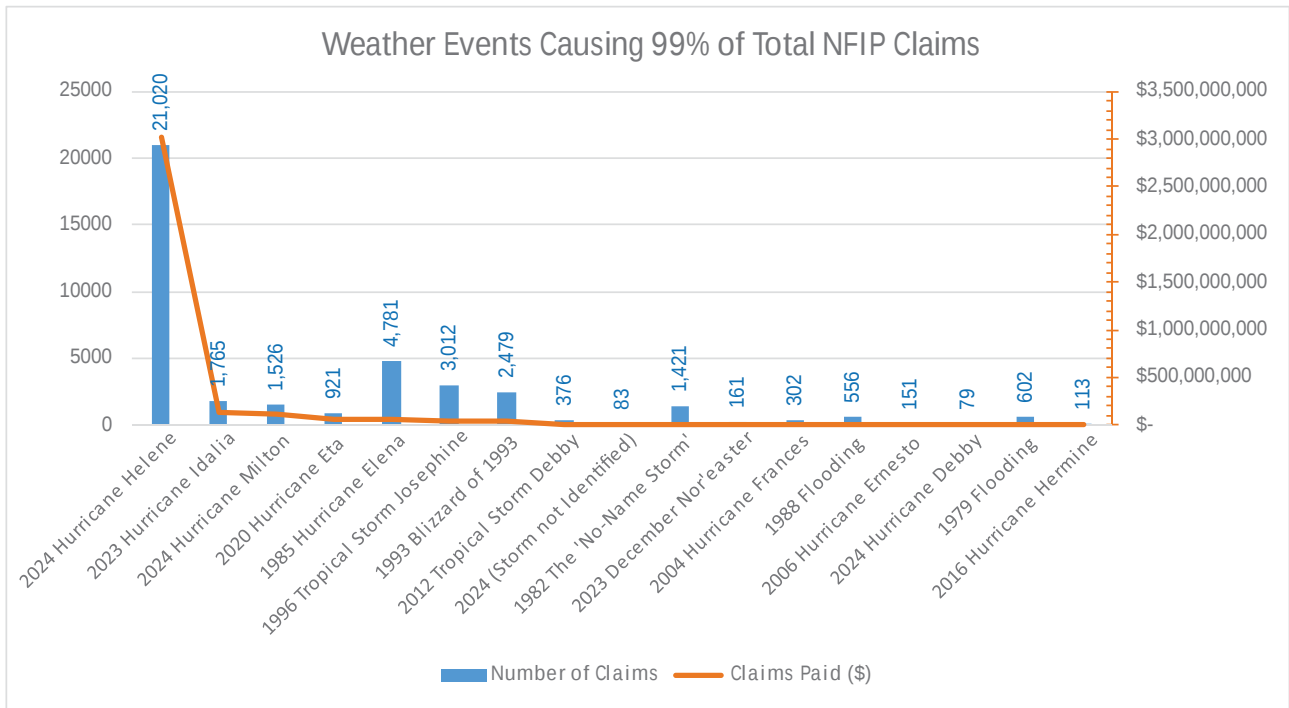


Figure 13: Weather Events Causing 99% of Total NFIP Claims

Hurricane Helene, which passed about 100 miles west of the county, caused the costliest flood event in the history of Pinellas County (Figure 2). However, based on the flood maps, it was not a 100-year flood event. Weather events that have resulted in 99% of all NFIP claims since the inception of the program are shown in Figure 13.

Pinellas County also experiences nuisance flooding from astronomical tides, intense rainfall, or a combination thereof. Although these minor flood events do not result in structure flooding or NFIP claims, they do cause damage to vehicles and other personal property. This flooding also impacts community assets, such as roads, and in some cases can overload the sanitary sewer system.

Figure 7: Tropical events within 100 Miles of Pinellas County

Flood Vulnerability

There are several factors that affect a property's flood vulnerability, such as location, type(s) of flood hazard(s), and how a structure is built. Pinellas County is vulnerable to flooding from storm surge, astronomical tides, rainfall, and combinations thereof. The hallmark of floodplain regulation is its building elevation requirement, wherein new development within a flood hazard area must be built at or above the base flood elevation (BFE). Most repeatedly flooded structures were built before detailed flood hazard data and flood elevations were available in locations susceptible to flood hazards. As such, most of these structures were built below the flood protection elevation for its location. Once flood hazard maps become available, communities may join the NFIP and enact floodplain management regulations to ensure flood insurance is available within the community and foster resiliency.

All municipalities in Pinellas County, including unincorporated, participate in the NFIP, have enacted and enforce floodplain management ordinances, and flood insurance through the NFIP is available. All but four municipalities in Pinellas County had a flood hazard map and had entered the NFIP in 1971 ([fema.gov/flood-insurance/work-with-nfip/community-status-book](https://www.fema.gov/flood-insurance/work-with-nfip/community-status-book)). Pinellas Park and Belleair Bluffs joined the NFIP several years later in 1977 and Seminole and Kenneth City joined a decade later in 1981. For analysis of the flood vulnerabilities of NFIP insurable structures in Pinellas County, the year following the community's NFIP entry date was selected to distinguish as pre or post floodplain construction requirements. Selecting the following year accounts for the time to build following the enactment of the floodplain development requirements.

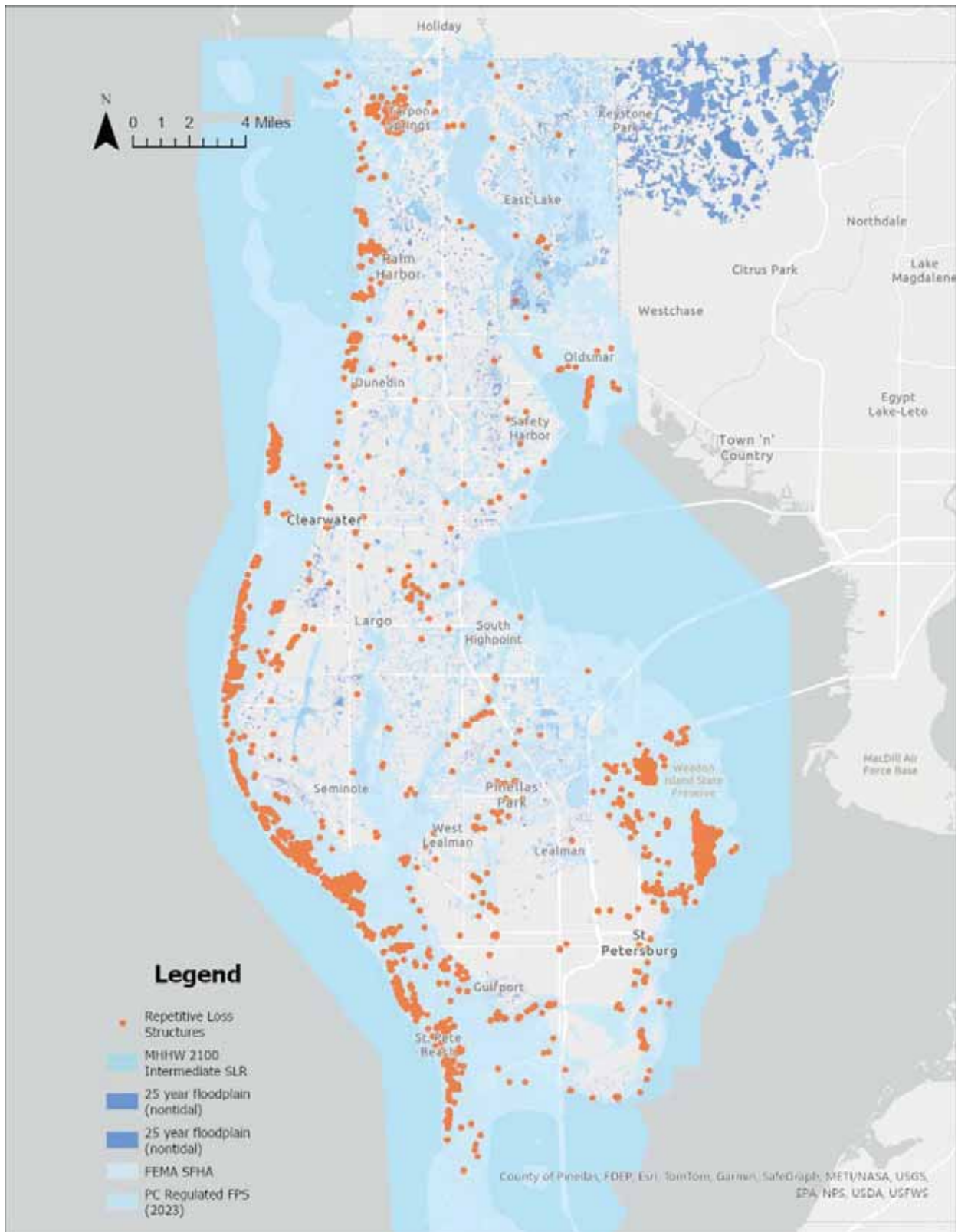


Figure 15: Percent of RLs by Flood Hazard

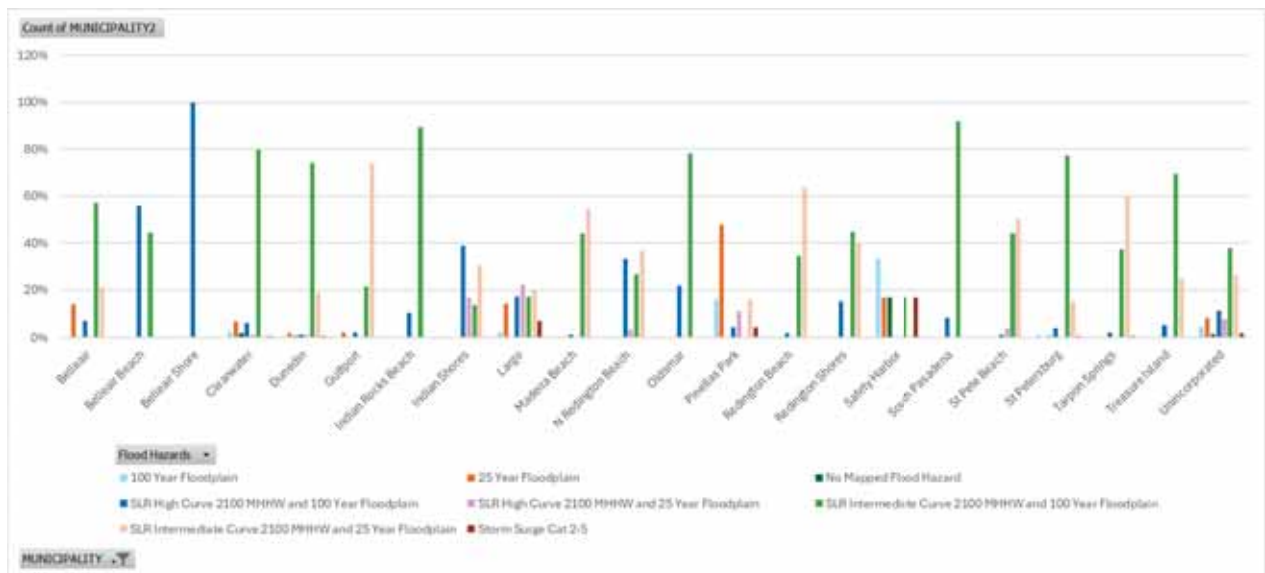


Figure 16: Claims Paid for Pre and Post NFIP Participation for all Pinellas County Municipalities

Countywide, at least 71% of the total amount of claims paid through August of 2025 have been for structures that were built prior to the community's participation in the NFIP (Figure 16). The 5% of structures with no year built may be structures that have been demolished. Almost all RL structures are within the FEMA Special Flood Hazard Area (SFHA) and/or a Pinellas County Floodplain, with almost a third of those in a 25-year floodplain. Over 85% of the RL structures are within the year 2100 Mean High Higher Water inundation area based on the intermediate Sea Level Rise (SLR) Curve (Figure 14). About a quarter of the RL structures are vulnerable to the 2100 MHHW based on intermediate SLR and the 25-year event, while almost 60% are vulnerable to the same SLR but the 100-year event. The RL vulnerabilities for each community vary (Figure 15).

Figure 14: RL Flood Vulnerabilities

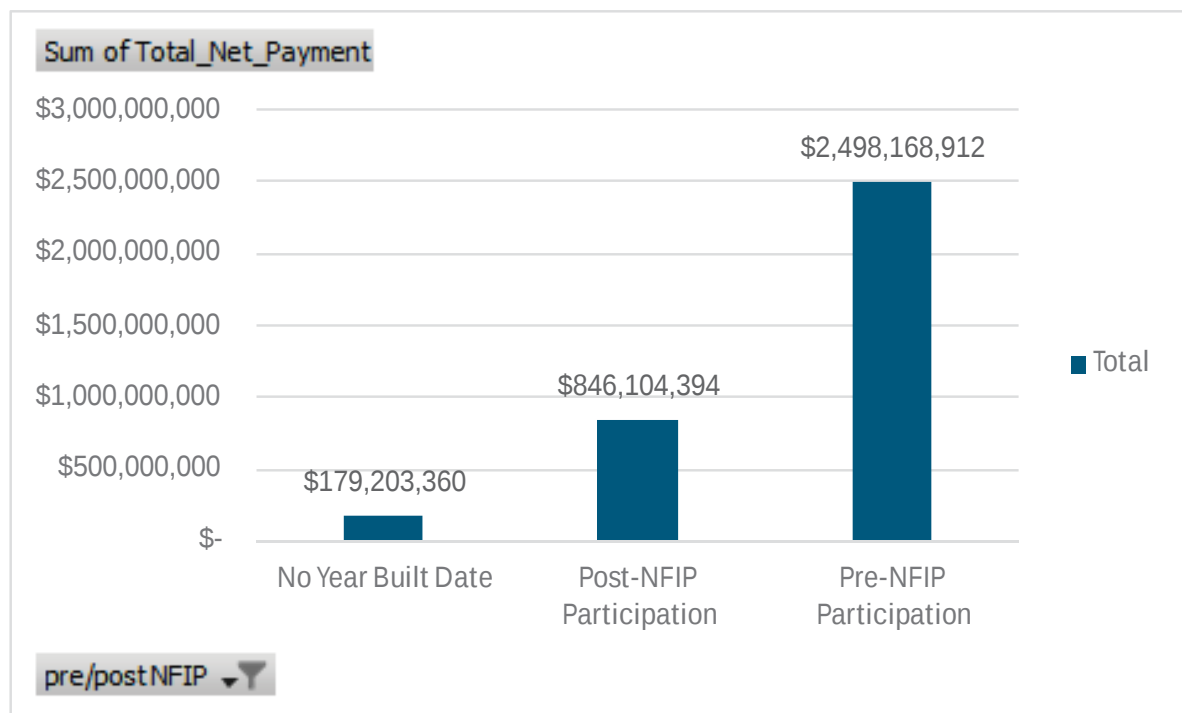
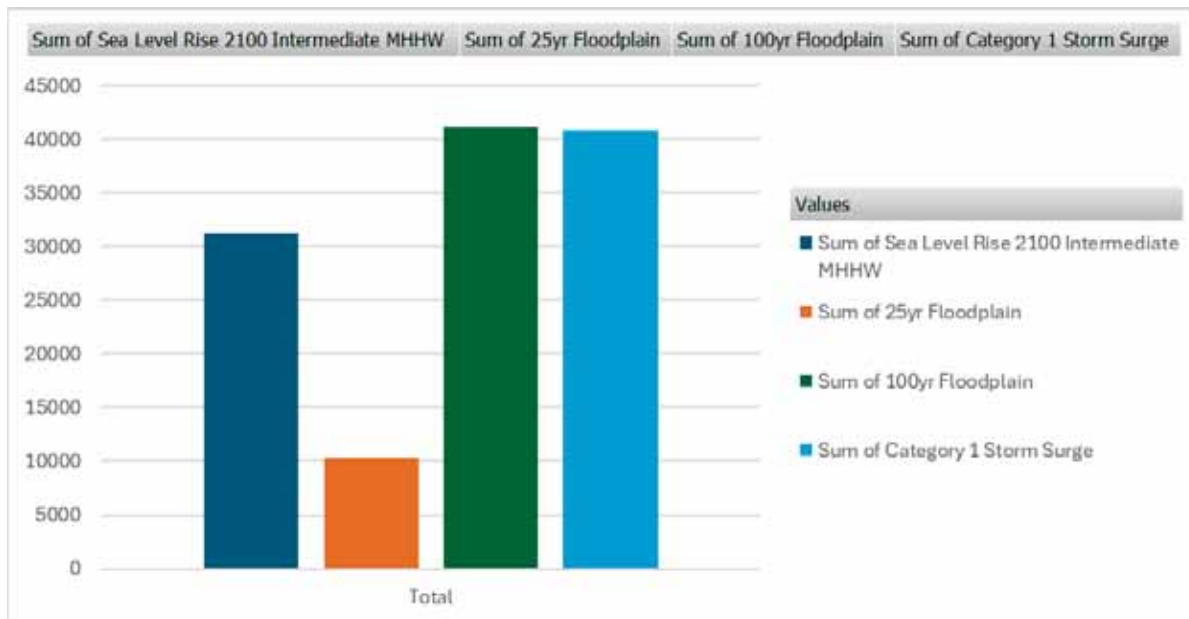


Figure 17: Claims Count by Structure Flood Hazard



Repetitive Loss Area Analyses for Unincorporated Pinellas County

The Pinellas County Repetitive Loss Area Analysis (RLAA) includes all unincorporated properties on the repetitive loss list and all nearby properties that may experience similar flooding conditions. Data used to develop the RLAA included, but is not limited to:

- FEMA repetitive loss data
- FEMA Flood Insurance Claims
- Damage Assessments
- Conveyance system components (e.g., location and size of stormwater pipes, ditches, storage basins, and work requests)
- Known hot spots (e.g., conveyance system problem areas)
- High water mark (HWM) information
- Flood complaint information
- Floodplains (e.g., Pinellas County Watershed Management Plans (WMP), municipal Stormwater Master Plans (SWMP), Pinellas County Vulnerability Assessment, FEMA Flood Insurance Study (FIS) and FEMA Flood Insurance Rate Maps (FIRMs))
- Storm surge areas
- LiDAR (elevation data)
- Street view

- Field observations

Each year the County requests various data from FEMA to review and update their plans as needed, including repetitive loss data. The most recent repetitive loss data from FEMA was provided to Pinellas County in August 2025. Because Pinellas County experienced significant damages from four consecutive storms in 2024, a significant amount of new RLs were added. As recovery efforts continue to date, permit records are in flux with many property owners still working to secure funding for mitigation. Pinellas County Floodplain Management is reviewing the list for accuracy to determine whether the properties are within the community's corporate limits, and whether the buildings have been removed, retrofitted, or otherwise protected from the cause of repetitive flooding. Any corrections to the list will be sent to FEMA.

As of August of 2025, there are a total of 301 repetitive loss properties (RL) listed as unincorporated Pinellas County. Of these, 236 are listed as "NFIP Repetitive Loss", and 35 are listed as "NFIP Severe Repetitive Loss". Additionally, 21 of the 301 properties are considered "Flood Mitigation Assistance (FMA) Repetitive Loss" and 46 are considered "FMA Severe Repetitive Loss". After comparing the recently provided RL list to the previously provided RL list, it was determined that FEMA added 165 properties listed as unincorporated Pinellas County to the list. Presumably, the 2024 storms were the cause of the increase in RLs, however, loss dates were not included in the data set provided to confirm this. Table 4 summarizes the findings; pursuant to the Privacy Act of 1974, addresses have been excluded.

A review of previously recommended mitigation strategies for identified Repetitive Loss Areas (RLA) was completed as well. No new mitigation strategies have been identified or implemented; however, the County continues to implement ongoing efforts, such as known hot spot inspections and maintenance. There are no recommended changes to the action items at this time. New RL that does not fall within identified RLA are still under evaluation.

Mitigation Strategies

Several structural and nonstructural mitigation strategies were identified to reduce flood loss in the RLAs. Structural projects identified for different RLAs, such as culvert and channel upgrades and elevating buildings and equipment, are described in the RLA attachments, which are organized by watershed. Nonstructural strategies, such as education, flood information services, and conveyance system maintenance apply to all the RLAs. For instance, Pinellas County routinely informs residents and businesses in RLAs of strategies and opportunities to decrease their flood risk. The County will also:

- Maintain funding for and continue to implement identified surface water capital improvement projects to improve storage and conveyance in problem areas.
- Maintain funding for and continue to implement proactive stormwater operations and maintenance program to ensure storage basins and major conveyance are functional.
- Maintain the County's CRS classification to help make flood insurance more affordable.
- Review and update the Local Mitigation Strategy (LMS) as needed to maintain eligibility for FEMA's Hazard Mitigation Grant Program (HMGP).

Methodology

The methodology for this Repetitive Loss Area Analysis follows the standards outlined in CRS Activity 512 and FEMA's guidance for conducting area-based flood risk assessments. The analysis was completed using a combination of spatial data review, field observations, stakeholder input, and evaluation of historical flood loss information.

Data Acquisition

The information in this report comes from many sources including internal departments, external agencies and direct input from citizens. Collecting data from these sources is extremely important as it provides additional information on existing conditions and plans or studies that could affect the cause or impacts of flooding. Pinellas County departments that contributed information in this RLA analysis include: BTS (Business Technology Service), Building, Development Review Services, Public Works, Property Appraiser Office, and Emergency Management. Data from federal and state agencies like FEMA, Southwest Florida Water Management District (SWFWMD), National Weather Service, and National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) was also used.

The data provided by both internal and external agencies included: historical NFIP claims, repetitive loss claims, NFIP policy data, stormwater asset inventory, digital LiDAR,

development plans, high water marks, building/structure information, elevation certificates, FIRMs, County watershed management plans and floodplains, storm surge, evacuation zones, transportation, CIP, hot spots, flood related work orders, and major storms, precipitation and gage data.

Identification of Repetitive Loss Areas

Repetitive loss properties form the basis for the RLAA. Each RLA was delineated using local, state and federal datasets as well as citizen input specific to the flood conditions and observations in each area. NFIP Repetitive Losses, historical claims, and policy data obtained from FEMA were geocoded in ArcGIS Pro and layered with the other collected data to identify areas with structures that may experience the same or similar flooding as the RL and historical claim properties in the vicinity. Weather events and drainage patterns for each area were then evaluated to identify potential causes of the repetitive flooding. Flooding and flood-related datapoints reviewed for RLA delineation include:

- Repetitive loss properties and data (e.g., number of losses and associated cost).
- Historical claims properties (e.g., number of losses and associated cost).
- Damage Assessments
- LiDAR (elevation data, land slope).
- Conveyance system components (e.g., location and size of storm water pipes, ditches, storage basins, work requests).
- Known hot spots (e.g., conveyance system problem areas, storm high water information, and flood complaint areas).
- Floodplains (e.g., WMP studies and FIRMs, Vulnerability Assessment).
- High water marks.
- Work orders.
- Storm surge zones.
- Building information (e.g. year built or substantially improved, foundation type, elevation data)
- Major storms, surge, precipitation date vs historical loss dates
- Property owner/resident provided information
- NFIP claims data and FEMA repetitive loss (RL) and severe repetitive loss (SRL) property lists were reviewed to identify clusters of properties with multiple flood insurance claims.

Properties were grouped into repetitive loss areas based on proximity, shared drainage characteristics, and common flood sources. Boundaries of each RL area were mapped using GIS to support field verification and hazard assessment.

Outreach and Engagement

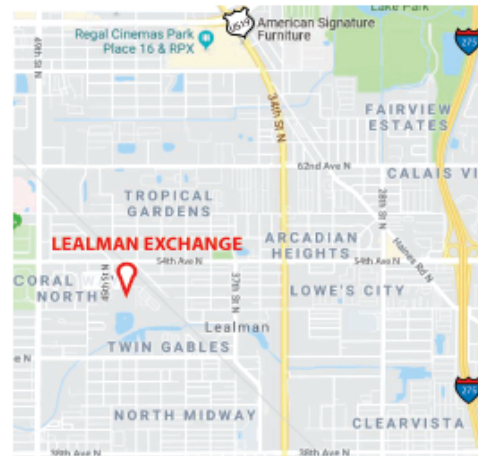
Figure 18: Public Workshop 1

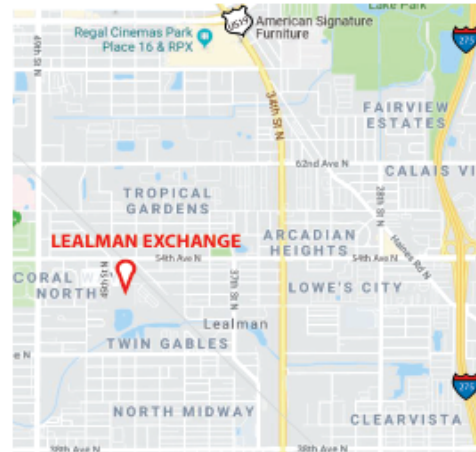
Figure 19: Public Workshop 2

This RLAA was completed in conjunction with the Pinellas County LMS 5-year update and is included in the LMS as an appendix. Residents and businesses were invited to two workshops and community open houses to provide their observations and concerns about local hazards, including their susceptibility to flooding. The first event was held on April 15, 2024, and the second was held on October 17th, 2024 (Figure 18 - Figure 19). The events were publicized in the newspaper, through press releases, via social media, and the LMS website. Attendees were encouraged to provide input for the draft RLAA and were able to learn more about other components of the LMS. Each year a press release regarding the annual LMS update and publicizing the LMS website, www.pinellaslms.org, is also distributed.

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The Pinellas County Flood Risk and Mitigation Public Information Working Group (FRMPIWG) is a countywide public information group that is tasked, in part, with the integration of CRS elements like the PPI and RLAA into the LMS. This group is comprised of staff and stakeholders. This group met two times during the LMS update. The FRMPIWG received updates from the LMS Working Group and provided input for the updated LMS. Many members of the FRMPIWG also attended the LMS public workshops. The information regarding the FRMPIWG and the countywide Program for Public Information can be found at pinellas.gov/program-for-public-information.

As an additional measure of public outreach, the Pinellas County Floodplain Administrator sent letters to RLA properties notifying recipients of their location within an RLA and requested information about previous flooding issues (Figure 20 - Figure 21). The letter notified residents that county staff would be visiting their neighborhood to collect data and contained an email address and phone number for recipients to report any flood-related information available.

We are concerned about repetitive flooding and have an active program to help you protect yourself, your family and your property from future flooding. You may see Pinellas County staff in your neighborhood inspecting conveyance systems and collecting data as part of our floodplain management and stormwater maintenance program.

We recommend the following activities to prepare for and mitigate the impacts of flooding to your property:

- 1. Know your risk for flooding.**

Pinellas County and its municipalities offer a flood map service to find out if your property is in a floodplain or floodway; if flood insurance is required for structures on the property with a federally backed mortgage; and your hurricane evacuation zone. The free service also provides information needed to complete an elevation certificate. Find out if your property is susceptible to flooding from storm surge, and how deep it could get, as well as information regarding future flooding conditions. The service can also help you learn more about nearby protected areas that have natural floodplain functions, like wetlands, swamps or mangrove stands. These areas store flood waters or buffer wave action while providing habitat for wildlife and cleaning the flood water. Visit Pinellas County Flood Map Service at floodmaps.pinellas.gov to search by address or contact (727) 464-7700.
- 2. Know your hurricane evacuation zone. Atlantic Hurricane Season runs from June 1 to November 30.**

Floodplains, floodways, hurricane evacuation zones and FEMA flood zones are all different! Floodplains are areas of land at high risk of flooding from any natural source of water (i.e., rain and/or storms). Floodways are protected waterway areas that carry floodwaters. Hurricane evacuation zones are based on storm surge flood risk – the greatest threat to life from hurricanes. FEMA flood zones are designated by FEMA for minimum building requirements and insurance purposes. A property may be in a non-evacuation zone yet still be in a floodplain because it is at risk of flooding from rainfall. On the other hand, a property could be outside of the floodplain but still be in a hurricane evacuation zone because of storm surge projections.
- 3. Stay connected and prepare ahead.**

Tune in to local news stations or NOAA weather radio stations 162.450 or 162.550 to stay informed. Sign up for Alert Pinellas to receive text, phone and/or email notifications if flooding is expected in your area. Visit pinellas.gov/alert-pinellas/ for more information and to sign up. Prepare ahead and get a plan with the Ready Pinellas app, which has built-in readiness checklists and allows you to create a plan for yourself, your family and your pet(s). Download the app for free on your mobile device through the Apple App Store or Google Play or visit disaster.pinellas.gov for more information.

4. Purchase flood insurance for your home, business, or rental.

Flood insurance is recommended, even if it is not required by your lender. When purchasing a flood insurance policy, **understand what is covered!**

- Most homeowner and renter insurance policies don't cover water damage from flooding or storm surge.
- There are separate flood coverages for the building and your contents.
- Flood insurance usually takes 30 days to go into effect.
- A National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) policy does not cover loss of use, meaning any hotel stays or equivalent after your home is flooded will not be reimbursed.

Because Pinellas County has a proactive Floodplain Management Program and participates in the NFIP Community Rating System (CRS), you may get up to a 40% discount on your NFIP flood insurance premium. Pinellas County also offers free flood insurance technical assistance from flood insurance specialists in the insurance field. Visit pinellas.gov/flood-advocates/ for a list of flood insurance advocates.

5. Determine what building permits you may need and hire a licensed contractor.

Building permits protect you and others by ensuring all proposed work complies with current construction codes, standards, and methods. Design projects with flood hazards and required development standards in mind.

Be aware of the substantial improvement rules:

Remodeling projects that cost 49% of the value or greater of the original structure will require you to elevate the building above the regulatory flood level. This includes work on structures substantially damaged by fire, flood, or any other cause. Visit pinellas.gov/sdsi/ to learn more.

6. Protect your property.

- Elevate your equipment, such as water heaters and A/C units above the base flood elevation.
- Check and mark your fuse or breaker box to show the circuits for areas that are vulnerable to flooding.
- Determine if sewer line check valves, which prevents sewer backups, will work for you.
- If you are rebuilding or elevating your existing home, consider building stronger to withstand future storms.

Financial assistance may be available. Visit pinellas.gov/flood-mitigation/ for information about the FEMA Flood Mitigation Program, FEMA Hazard Mitigation Program, and Increased Cost of Compliance funding.

Staff is available for drainage evaluations and one-on-one consultations about how to protect your property from flooding. To schedule a consultation, call (727) 464-7700.

7. Help prevent flooding by keeping storm drains clear.

Keep leaves, grass clippings and other debris out of storm drains and waterways to prevent flooding in your neighborhood. Additionally, pollutants from trash, yard waste, pet waste, or pesticides that spill into waterways may cause algae blooms that result in fish kills. When storm drains get clogged with debris, they can back up with water and flood yards and homes. Remember, only rain down the drain! It's the law, Ordinance #06-13. To report illegal dumping, visit pinellas.gov/report-request-contact-us/ or call (727) 464-4425.

Identification of Mitigation Strategies

Each RLA was evaluated to determine whether any of the following property protection measures or stormwater management improvements were feasible or may be beneficial based on the character of the RLAs and nature of the flooding.

1. **Public Education and Outreach:** Education and public awareness is essential to flood protection. Public education will raise awareness about flood risks and the impact of flooding and build support for floodplain management planning and projects. Public information and messaging: Initiating public outreach that teaches the community about the risks of flooding and how to take preventative measure to reduce flood risk (e.g., flood brochures, educational door hangers, “only rain down the drain”); Adding areas as target warning areas.
 - a. Cost: Cost for various outreach projects, which are identified in the Pinellas County Program for Public Information (PPI) vary in cost based on dissemination method and breadth of audience.
 - b. Feasibility: Flooding occurs in and out of areas designated as high-risk flood zones and outreach is recommended for all properties in Pinellas County, especially the target audience identified in the PPI.
2. **Acquiring and Maintaining flood insurance:** This measure does not protect or reduce damage that floods cause; however, it can help homeowners rebuild damaged property at a reduced cost.
 - a. Advantages of the NFIP program:
 - i. Covers flood damage to the property from multiple sources: storm water runoff, heavy rainfall, tidal patterns and storm surge.
 - ii. Building coverage is included as well as contents coverage if the owner/renter chose to have it.
 - iii. It might be the only option
 - b. Cost: The cost varies depending on multiple factors, such as the age of the age of the structure and the flood zone. Because the County participates in the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) Community Rating System (CRS), many residents and businesses throughout Pinellas County are eligible for a discount on their flood insurance premiums. Unincorporated residents and businesses may receive up to a 40 percent premium discount, which is a cumulative savings of more than \$10 million a year for policyholders.

Properties located in X zones may be eligible for extremely discounted Preferred Risk Policies (PRP) as well.

- c. Feasibility: Flooding occurs in and out of areas designated as high-risk flood zones and is recommended for all properties in Pinellas County. Residents should ask their insurance agent about their options or contact the County or a flood insurance specialist at: pinellas.gov/flood-insurance-technical-assistance
3. **Utility protection**: This measure applies to several different utilities that can be adversely affected by floodwaters such as Heating, Ventilation, and Air Conditioning (HVAC) systems; Fuel meters and pipes; Electrical service boxes, wiring and fixtures; Sewage systems; and Drinking Water systems. Damage to utilities can prevent a residence that remains structurally sound after a flood from being reoccupied. Retrofitting utilities includes things as simple as raising them above the flood level and building small walls around furnaces and water heaters to protect from shallow flooding.
 - a. Cost: The cost for protecting utilities varies and is dependent upon the measure itself, condition of the system, structure, and foundation. A lot of the measures can be performed by the homeowners themselves, although it is always a good idea to consult a professional contractor and/or engineer (depending on the project). The costs can be lower when done as part of a repair or remodeling project. Residents interested in pursuing a retrofitting measure to protect their utilities should contact Pinellas County to determine whether a permit is required.
 - b. Feasibility: Given that the flooding experienced by the homeowners across Pinellas County includes both shallow and deep flooding, utility protection is an acceptable mitigation measure. Interested homeowners should examine their flooding history and decide if utility protection is an appropriate measure for their building.
4. **On-Site stormwater management improvements (gutters/grading)**: Re-grading yards, swales or adding drainage gutters to the structure as well as adding yard drains.
 - a. Cost: The cost for retrofitting a property varies and is dependent upon the measure itself and how much work is needed. Residents interested in pursuing stormwater management improvements should contact Pinellas

County Development Review Services to determine the best option and whether a permit is required.

- b. Feasibility: Onsite retrofitting strategies can be very cost effective and time intensive in reducing flood damage from less extreme weather and tide events.
5. **Dry Floodproofing**: This technique involves modifying the structure to keep floodwaters out of a building. Close any foundation cracks with mortar and masonry caulk or hydraulic cement, which expands and fills gaps completely. Walls may be coated with waterproofing compounds or plastic sheeting. Openings (i.e., doors, windows, and vents) may be closed either permanently, or temporarily with removable shields or sandbags. To protect a structure against sewer backup, backup valves or overhead sewer lines may be installed. The FEMA P-312, Homeowner's Guide to Retrofitting and FEMA Educating Damage from Localized Flooding: A Guide for Communities describe several floodproofing techniques (www.fema.gov/homeowners-guide-retrofitting and www.fema.gov/media-library/assets/documents/1012).
- a. Cost: The cost for a floodproofing project will vary according to the building's construction and condition. It may range from \$5,000 to \$20,000, depending on how secure the owner wants to be from flooding. Owners can do some of the work by themselves, although an experienced contractor provides greater security. Each property owner can determine how much of their own labor they can contribute and whether the cost and appearance of a project is worth the protection from flooding that it may provide.
 - b. Feasibility: Because the walls are exposed to floodwaters and the pressures they exert, dry floodproofing is practical only appropriate for structures with walls constructed of masonry or poured concrete and only where flood depths are low (typically no more than 2 to 3 feet) and short duration. Many dry floodproofing techniques involve components that must be installed or activated each time flooding threatens, such as a flood shield placed across a doorway. For this reason, dry floodproofing is not an appropriate retrofitting method for flash floods or for structures that are only occupied seasonally, and the homeowner does not have someone locally that is able or willing to install shields or other components before floodwaters arrive. Additionally, there is no government financial assistance programs available for dry floodproofing, therefore the entire cost of the project must be paid by the homeowner. However, National Flood Insurance Program flood policies will

cover up to \$1,000 in reasonable expenses incurred to protect your insured property, and up to \$1,000 to move your insured property away from a flood or imminent danger of a flood. To be eligible for the Flood Loss Avoidance benefit, the insured property must be in a community where a general condition of flooding in the area exists, or an official has issued an evacuation order or other civil order for the community requiring measures to preserve life and property from flooding.

6. **Elevation:** This technique involves elevating the structure (or lowest living floor) above the flood level and is generally viewed as the best flood protection measure, short of removing the building from the floodplain. There are several methods to accomplish this, such as elevating the whole structure or elevating by extending the walls of the structure or by abandoning the lower enclosed area. The FEMA P-312, Homeowner's Guide to Retrofitting describes several elevation techniques (www.fema.gov/homeowners-guide-retrofitting).
 - a. Cost: Most of the cost to elevate a building is in the preparation and foundation construction. The cost to elevate six feet is little more than the cost to go up two feet. Elevation is usually more cost-effective for wood frame buildings on posts/piles or crawlspace because it is easiest to get lifting equipment under the floor. Elevating a slab house is more costly. The actual cost of elevating a particular building depends on factors such as its condition, whether it is masonry or brick faced, and if additions have been added on over time. While the cost of elevating a home can be high, there are funding programs that can help. The usual arrangement is for a FEMA grant to pay 75% of the cost while the owner pays the other 25%.
 - b. Feasibility: Federal funding support for an elevation project requires a study that shows that the benefits of the project exceed the cost of the elevation. Project benefits include savings in insurance claims paid on the structure. Elevating a masonry home or a slab may cost upwards of \$100,000, which means that benefit/cost ratios may be low. Looking at each property individually could result in funding for the worst-case properties, i.e., those that are lowest, subject to the most frequent flooding, and in good enough condition to elevate.
7. **Conveyance System Maintenance:** Clearing stormwater infrastructure from debris. Pinellas County maintains County stormwater infrastructure. Private stormwater drainage systems are required to be maintained as permitted by the owner.

- a. Cost: The cost varies depending on the equipment and resources needed for the job. Individual property owners can help reduce maintenance costs by clearing stormwater inlets and swales in their neighborhood before and after storms to reduce the need for major maintenance costs in the future while helping to prevent localized flooding from blockages.
 - b. Feasibility: Pinellas County has a proactive Operation and Maintenance Program to maintain major conveyance systems. Additionally, the County inspects and clears as needed “Hot Spot” conveyance system components before and after major storm events. Dumping into the stormwater system is also illegal. The County has a proactive “Only Rain Down the Drain” program to publicize this and encourage residents and businesses to help maintain the system as well. Programs like these are funded through the stormwater assessment.
- 8. **Drainage improvements (CIP)**: Improving existing drainage systems to more effectively manage stormwater runoff. Improvements could include modifying a culvert, stream or river channel to provide a higher carrying capacity. The Pinellas County CIP is a comprehensive multi-year plan of proposed capital projects intended to identify and balance the capital needs of the community within the fiscal capabilities and limitations of the County.
 - a. Stormwater Capital Projects are developed through multiple mechanisms:
 - i. Work requests that cannot be addressed through regular maintenance.
 - ii. Projects identified during the development of studies, such as this RLAA
 - iii. Watershed Management Plans (WMPs)
 - iv. 1984 Stormwater Master Plan (SWMP)
 - v. Vulnerability Assessment
 - vi. Stormwater Technical Committee (SWTC)
 - vii. Tampa Bay Estuary Program (TBEP) Comprehensive Conservation Management Plan (CCMP)
 - viii. Clearwater Harbor-St. Josephs Sound (CHSJS) CCMP
 - ix. CHSJS Sediment Management Plan
 - x. Regulatory Requirements, such as Reasonable Assurance Plans (RAPs) or Total Maximum Daily Loads (TMDLs).
 - xi. Permitted Facilities Alternatives Analysis Report (2016)
 - xii. Inflow and Infiltration (I/I) Study
 - xiii. Wastewater – Stormwater Task Force

- xiv. Pinellas County Comprehensive Plan
- xv. Planning and Economic Development Objectives
- xvi. Public Commitments
- xvii. Local Mitigation Strategy (LMS)

b. Cost: The cost varies significantly depending on the scope of the projects.

c. Feasibility: During the annual CIP budgeting process, the project list is evaluated and adjusted to reflect changes in priority and funding availability.

9. **Acquisition**: Purchasing flood-prone properties and clearing the sites to eliminate structural flood risk. This mitigation strategy is recommended on sites where the flood risk is extremely high or so frequent that it is not safe to leave the structure on the site. Depending on the funding for the project, a new building may be built with correct and updated flood protection code requirements, or the lot can be left vacant. Restoring the acquired land to natural floodplains helps reduce erosion and pollutants, increase groundwater recharge, and provide natural habitat for wildlife.

a. Cost: This approach would involve purchasing and clearing the lowest or the most severe repeatedly flooded homes. If FEMA grant funds are used, the following apply:

- i. The applicant for FEMA funding must demonstrate that the benefits exceed the costs, using FEMA's benefit/cost software.
- ii. The owner must be a willing seller.
- iii. The parcel must be deeded to a public agency that agrees to maintain the lot and keep it forever as open space.

b. Feasibility: Acquisition of multiple flood prone buildings in the same area that are acquired for a floodplain restoration, regional stormwater facility, or similar project may be feasible in some areas.

Although, there are challenges with acquisition/restoration mitigation projects, such as difficulty to obtain a favorable benefit-cost ratio in shallow flooding areas and finding property owners that are interested in relocation, there are numerous benefits, including reduced flood risk, improved water quality, increase groundwater recharge, additional natural habitat for wildlife, and increased local amenities and thus nearby property values. Acquisition of individual scattered properties, on the other hand, in most cases is not feasible, as checkerboard pattern of vacant properties could result, leaving "holes" in the neighborhood. Additionally, there is no reduction in expenses to maintain the neighborhood's infrastructure, although the tax base is reduced. The vacant lots must also

be maintained by the new owner agency, which adds additional expense. If the lot is only minimally maintained, its presence may reduce the property values of the remaining houses as well.

Identification of Potential Funding Sources

There are many possible sources of funding for several of these mitigation strategies. These funding opportunities range from federal FEMA grants, like the HMGP, down to smaller-scale locally derived funds like Penny for Pinellas. Table 5 Summarizes the mitigation strategies and potential funding sources evaluated.

National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) Increased Cost of Compliance (ICC): There is a special funding provision in the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) for insured buildings that have been substantially damaged by a flood, “Increased Cost of Compliance.” ICC coverage pays for the cost to comply with floodplain management regulations after a flood if the building has been declared substantially damaged. ICC will pay up to \$30,000 to help cover elevation, relocation, demolition, and (for nonresidential buildings) floodproofing. It can also be used to help pay the 25% owner’s share of a FEMA funded mitigation project.

- The building’s flood insurance policy must have been in effect during the flood. This payment is in addition to the damage claim payment that would be made under the regular policy coverage, if the total claim does not exceed \$250,000. Claims must be accompanied by a substantial or repetitive damage determination made by the local floodplain administrator
- Coverage under the ICC does have limitations: It covers only damage caused by a flood, as opposed to wind or fire damage. The building’s flood insurance policy must have been in effect during the flood ICC payments are limited to \$30,000 per structure Claims must be accompanied by a substantial or damage determination made by the local floodplain administrator and the structure must be in an A zone.

NFIP Loss Avoidance: NFIP flood policies will also cover up to \$1,000 in reasonable expenses incurred to protect an insured property, and up to \$1,000 to move insured property away from a flood or imminent danger of a flood. To be eligible for this benefit, the insured property must be in a community where a general condition of flooding in the area exists, or an official has issued an evacuation order or other civil order for the community requiring measures to preserve life and property from flooding.

Excess Flood Insurance: Excess flood insurance is a kind of private flood insurance policy that extends policy limits beyond the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) coverage maximum.

The Flood Mitigation Assistance Program (FMA): FMA funds assist States and communities in implementing measures that reduce or eliminate the long-term risk of flood damage to structures insured under the NFIP. Project Grants to implement measures to reduce flood losses, such as elevation, acquisition, or relocation of NFIP-insured structures. States are encouraged to prioritize FMA funds for applications that include repetitive loss properties; these include structures with 2 or more losses each with a claim of at least \$1,000 within any ten-year period since 1978.

Hazard Mitigation Grant Program (HMGP): The HMGP provides grants to States and local governments to implement long-term hazard mitigation measures after a major disaster declaration. Projects must provide a long-term solution to a problem (e.g., elevation of a home to reduce the risk of flood damages as opposed to buying sandbags and pumps to fight the flood). Examples of eligible projects include acquisition and elevation, as well as local drainage projects.

Pre-Disaster Mitigation Program (PDM): The Pre-Disaster Mitigation (PDM) program provides funds to states, territories, Indian tribal governments, communities, and universities for hazard mitigation planning and the implementation of mitigation projects prior to a disaster event.

US Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) 203(K) Rehab Mortgage Insurance: HUD offers a competitive loan to finance mitigation of single-family residences. Section 203(k) insurance enables homebuyers and homeowners to finance both the purchase (or refinancing) of a house and the cost of its rehabilitation through a single mortgage or to finance the rehabilitation of their existing home.

Small Business Administration Mitigation (SBA) Loans: The Small Business Administration (SBA) offers mitigation loans to SBA disaster loan applicants who have not yet closed on their disaster loan. Applicants who have already closed must demonstrate that the delay in application was beyond their control.

Surface Water Assessment: The Surface Water Assessment is a user fee for stormwater services in unincorporated Pinellas County, which addresses flooding, water quality, and the operation of county-owned stormwater systems. The assessment is based on each property's impervious area, which includes all the hard surfaces that do not absorb water, such as parking lots and buildings. Impervious areas increase the amount of stormwater runoff, which is the cause of much of our flooding and pollution problems.

Penny for Pinellas: The Penny for Pinellas tax is a one percent sales tax paid by everyone who spends money in Pinellas County. It was first approved by voters in 1989 and went into

effect in February 1990. Three extensions of the Penny for Pinellas have been approved; March 1997, March 2007, and February 1, 2010, to January 31, 2020.

- The 2020-2030 Penny for Pinellas was approved on November 7, 2017, by 139,000 Pinellas County residents or 83% of registered voters. This fourth round will be in effect February 1, 2020, through January 31, 2030.
- The county uses the Penny for Pinellas resources to fund capital improvements to the county's infrastructure including streets and roads, bridges, stormwater system upgrades, parks and recreation centers and public facilities.
- The county has also leveraged Penny for Pinellas resources to secure additional grant funding to maximize the impact of the Penny. For example, grants from the Southwest Florida Water Management District (SWFWMD) have been combined with matching funds from Penny resources to complete additional stormwater management projects.

Southwest Florida Water Management District (SWFWMD) Cooperative Funding Initiative: A key program for building partnerships is the District's Cooperative Funding Initiative (CFI) program. The CFI covers up to 50 percent of the cost of projects that help create sustainable water resources, enhance conservation efforts, restore natural systems and provide flood protection. All CFI funding decisions are made by volunteer Governing Board members who are well informed on the specific resources and challenges within their areas.

Resilient Florida Program: The Resilient Florida Program, administered by the Florida Department of Environmental Protection (DEP), provides multi-million-dollar grants to help communities prepare for sea-level rise, intensified storms, and flooding.

RLA Summary

Table 6 outlines the costliest weather events to affect RLAs. These storms are associated with 4,774 NFIP claims payments and account for over 99.6% of all claim payouts. Of note, in unincorporated Pinellas County, Hurricane Helene accounted for over half of the claims paid, and over 88% of the total claims paid since the inception of the NFIP.

Based on the character of the RLAs and nature of flooding, Pinellas County Staff identified mitigation approaches to improve protection from future flood damage. The following mitigation strategies are recommended for all areas:

- Public Education and Outreach
- Acquiring and Maintaining flood insurance
- Utility Protection
- On-site Stormwater Improvements where absent
- Dry Floodproofing
- Elevation
- Conveyance System Maintenance where infrastructure exists

Property owners should look at these alternatives but understand they are not all guaranteed to provide protection at all degrees of flooding. Major drainage and/or restoration mitigation projects and acquisitions were applicable in some areas. It is recommended that future conditions, including sea level rise and rainfall intensity, be considered for all development, including redevelopment of properties and Capital Improvement Projects (CIP). Additional flood mitigation projects may be identified through the Watershed Management Planning program as well, as the RLAA data will be incorporated into future WMP updates.

Section 2. That all Resolutions or portions of Resolutions in conflict herewith are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict.

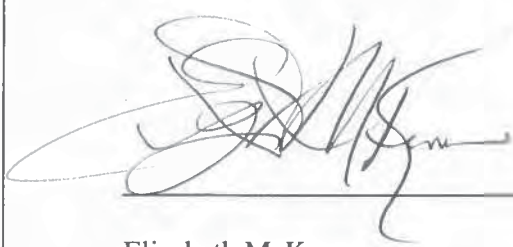
