1985

Taxpayers in the Palm Harbor Fire District started an initiative to tax themselves to provide recreation and library services.



The County formed PHCSA

A volunteer Board of Directors appointed by members of the county commission and entity advisory boards.

1990 1997 In 1990, residents organized a book drive and opened a storefront to form the East Lake Community Library. In 1997 the purchase of land; made possible with a state construction grant, county matching funds, private donations, and dollars from the Pinellas Public Library Cooperative put ELCL on the map.

#### **2022 ELCL PATRON SURVEY RESULTS:**

- 99.4% of respondents participated in library programs at least once a month
- 100% felt the library performed an important role in the community
- 99% satisfaction rate with our library staff

#### **East Lake Provide Essential Services**

- FOOD PANTRY (started during COVID) is a lifeline to 20-30 families per week
  - 10% of East Lake residents are below the poverty level
- Many "ALICE" families\* (35% of households in Pinellas County) use the library as a source of free materials, programs, services, and devices to use in their homes.
  - \*Asset-Limited, Income-Constrained, Employed
- There is a constant demand for our one Community Room by local businesses and organizations.

The social return on investment in public libraries are simply benefits that include the many FREE or low-cost services the East Lake Library offers. There is also the technology for use in the library or at home; the expertise of the library staff; the library facility as a community gathering place; the "halo" spending by library users at establishments close to the library; and the value of a library's enhancement to neighborhood real estate and community























## East Lake Community Library - A Return on Investment for our Residents!

ROI measures tax dollars against the savings (i.e. not having to pay elsewhere for the use of library materials, programs, and services). Library ROI studies consistently suggest that public libraries give a high return on investment - East Lake Community Library provided a return of \$6.57 to \$9.46 for every \$1.00 of taxpayer money spent over the past five years!
