1. Pinellas County Residential Recycling Facts

- Estimated 60-65K total annual recycled tons generated countywide (1/3 unincorporated, 1/3 City of St. Petersburg, and 1/3 remaining cities).
- Average Materials Recycling Facility (MRF) processing cost: \$150/ton
- Average Market Value (AMV) of recycled materials: \$60/ton.
- Landfill life would be reduced from 80 to 55 years if recycling programs are abandoned.



- 2. Current State of Single-Family Residential Recycling
 - Municipalities have mandatory curbside recycling, some also offer recycling drop-off sites
 - Recycling is voluntary in the unincorporated areas with private haulers and/or drop-off sites.
 - More than 70% of unincorporated area residents recycle.
 - All recyclables are processed at one of five regional MRFs.



3a. Municipally Owned MRF

• Pinellas MRF: \$26.7M in capital to construct, \$105/ton to process

• Hillsborough MRF: \$7M in capital to construct transfer station, \$128/ton to

process

3b. Countywide Processing Contract

- City of St. Petersburg not interested in countywide contract
- Only one existing regional MRF Processor interested



4. Staff Recommendation

- Cease Countywide MRF and contract efforts and maintain status quo
- Cease any efforts to mandate residential recycling in unincorporated areas.
- Continue Countywide efforts to standardize recyclable materials.
- Technical Management Committee (TMC) and City Managers supports this recommendation.



Solid Waste Ordinance – Chapter 106



1. Recommended Revisions:

- Private hauler licensing requirements
- Clarify TMC responsibilities

2. Not Recommended Revisions:

- Mandatory single-family residential recycling in the unincorporated areas
- Commercial/institutional/government food waste collection and processing

3. Next Steps

- Incorporate Board direction
- Stakeholder engagement and subsequent revisions
- Legal review and final draft
- Public hearings and Board consideration Feb/Mar 2025

Waste-to-Energy (WTE) Facility Operator Procurement



- 1. Current contract extension with Covanta (Reworld)
- 2. Planned solicitation process and schedule for a WTE Facility operator



Current contract extension with Covanta (Reworld)



- 1. Current contract expires December 31, 2024.
- 2. Contract extension to continue WTE operations until new procurement process is complete.
- 3. Contract extension to the Board for consideration in September.
- 4. Term: 6-months with two 3-month options
- 5. Rate: \$38.00/ton with annual increases, but not to exceed \$40.00/ton.

Solicitation Process and Schedule for a WTE Facility Operator



1. Two-phase solicitation

- Phase 1: RFQ where firms shortlisted based on qualifications only
- <u>Phase 2</u>: RFP for shortlisted firms: proposals, negotiations, and recommendation.

2. Schedule

Phase 1: RFQ Process
 September-December 2024

Phase 2: RFP Process January-June 2025

New contract award: August 2025

Mobilization: September 2025

• Transition: October-December 2025



Existing Markets and Rates





Power Purchase Agreement Offer



Constellation Energy (CEG) for Southern Georgia

Capacity: rights to first 40MW generated

Term: 5-years

Rate: \$42.39/MWh

CEG responsible for all transmission fees





Power Brokering Services



- 1. Services needed to broker 20-30 MW of power on a real-time basis.
- 2. Purchasing has confirmed that Pinellas can piggy-back Lee County contract
- 3. Fee is 10% of revenue above what could be sold directly to Duke Energy
- 4. Contract start date would be January 1, 2025
- 5. Agreement to come before the Board for consideration in September or October.
- 6. Monthly revenue reconciliation will be performed by County's third-party energy engineer, staff, and Clerk's Finance
