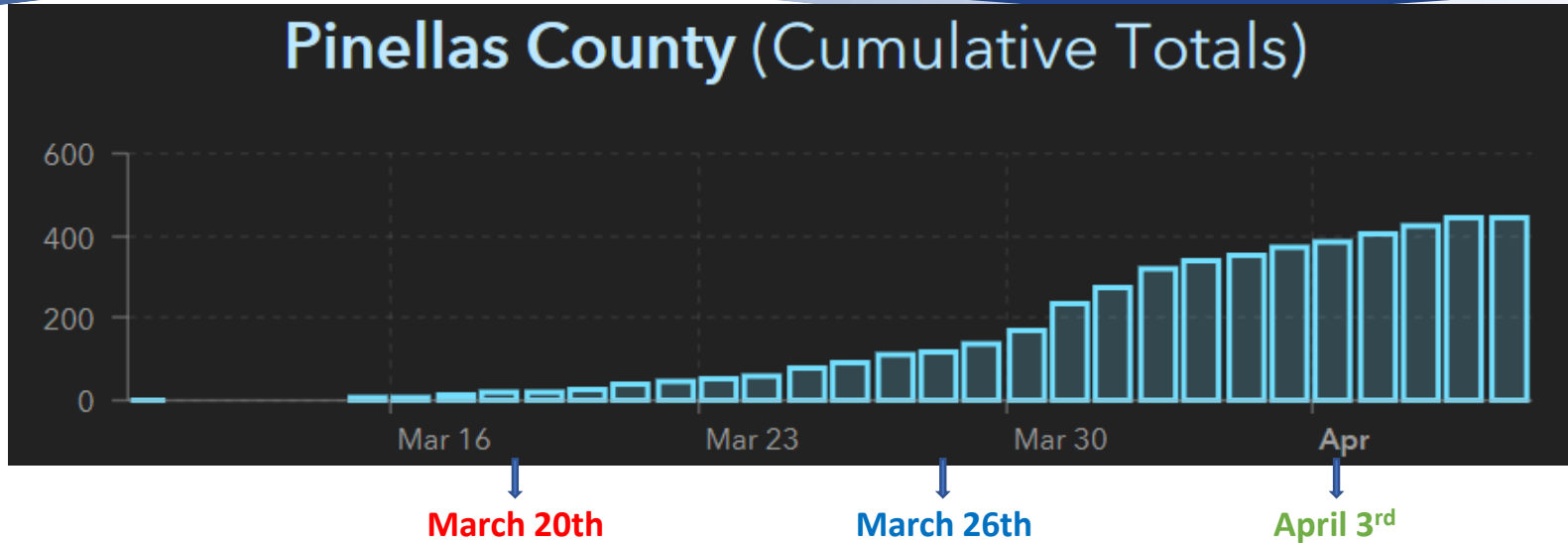

Timeline of Actions Taken

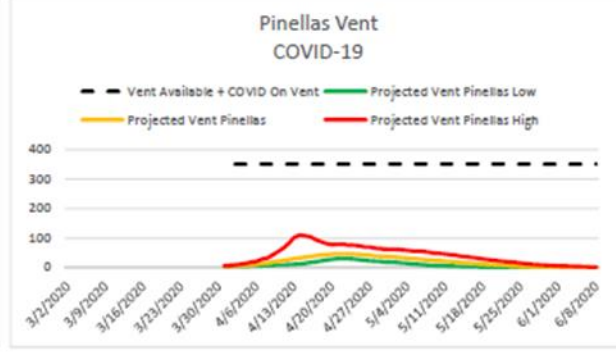
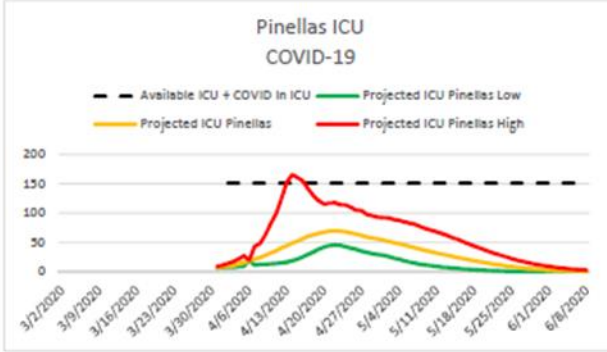
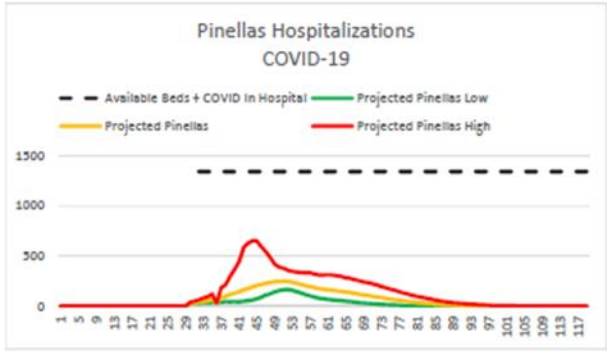


- 1. March 20th** - Pinellas County Resolution #20-17. All public beaches and public beach parking were required to close.
- 2. March 26th** - Pinellas County "SAFER AT HOME" Order #20-20. Places of public and private assembly were required to close, including pools and all public playgrounds.
- 3. April 3rd** - Governor's Executive Order #20-91 – Addressed essential businesses.

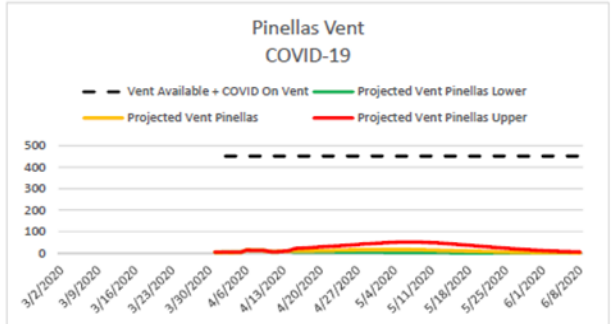
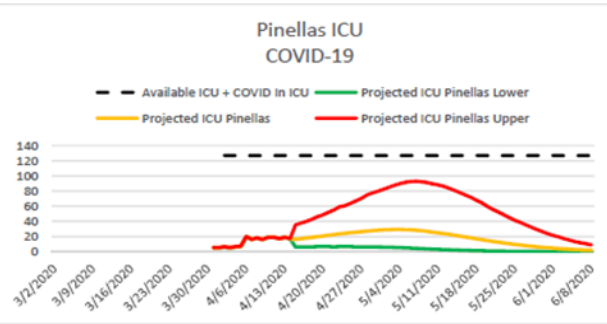
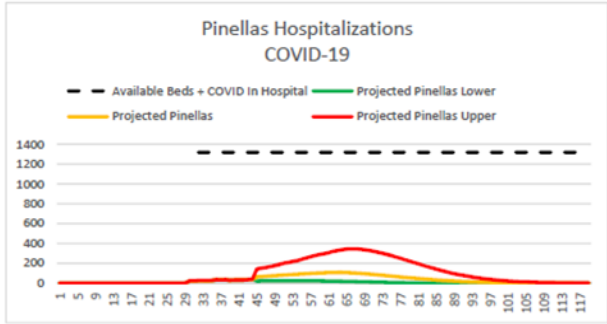
Hospital Capacity - Pinellas County

Data as of April 15, 2020

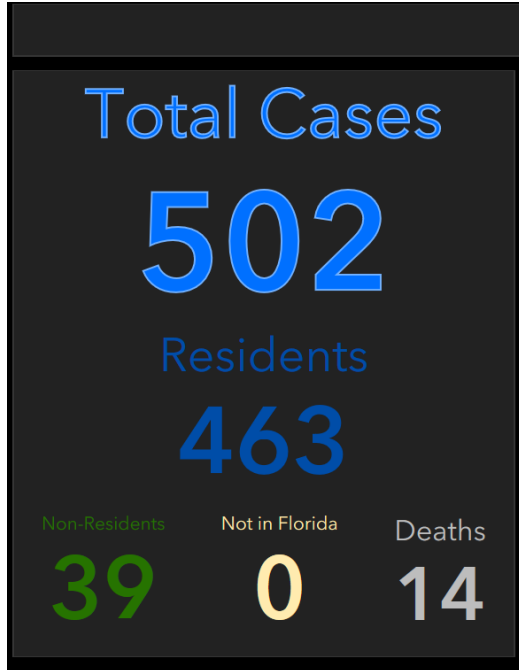


Case Count and Projections

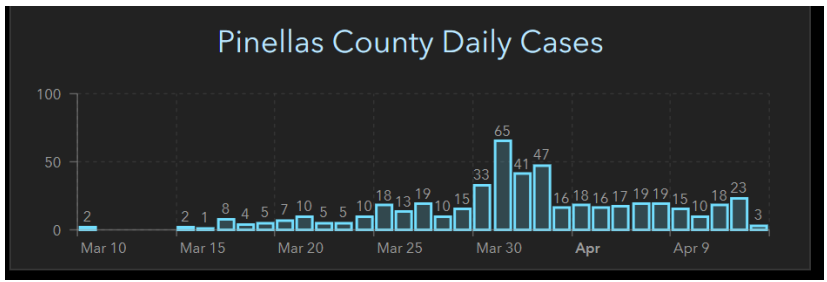
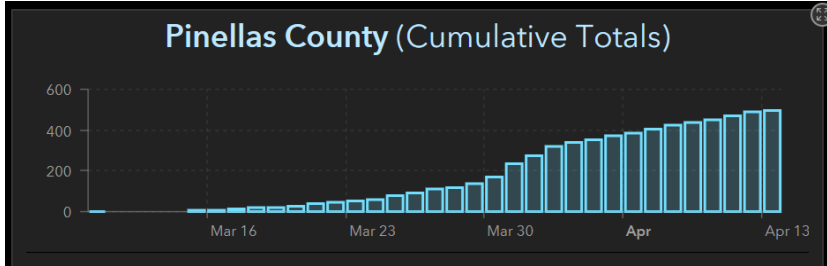


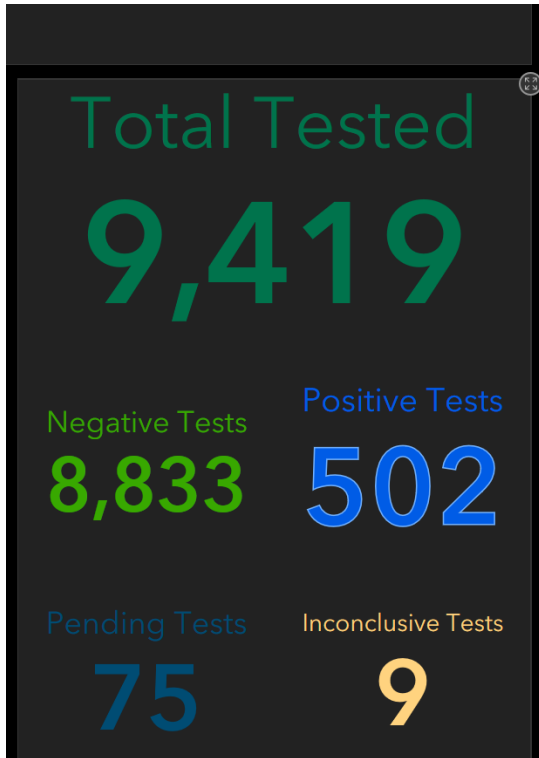
Projected Peak of COVID-19 Cases:

- Cases Projected to Peak on April 26.
- Cases Projected to Return to Low Levels at the Beginning of June.

Test For COVID-19 Ramps Up, But Supplies **Still Limited.**

- So far, Florida has tested more than 200,000 individuals for COVID-19 – or nearly one in every 140 Floridians.
- The 9,419 total tested in Pinellas County equates to roughly 96 tests per 10,000 residents – or roughly 1% of the population.

- **Case Count:** Sustained reduction in cases for at least 14 consecutive days.
- **Testing:** Capacity exists to test all people with COVID-19 symptoms, through same-day, point of contact diagnosis.
- **Capacity:** Hospitals and Fire/EMS are properly equipped to treat all patients requiring hospitalizations without resorting to crisis measures.

Steps Before Easing Restrictions



1. Governor's Executive Order is revoked or modified

- Reconsider or modify Board of County Commissioners' **"SAFER-AT-HOME"** Order.

2. Confirm declining cases, testing and hospital capacity are met

- We need conditions on the ground and the indicators identified to be the determining factors as we make decisions.

3. Confirm declining cases, testing and hospital capacity are met, we may

- Develop strategies for pools and/or public beaches to safely reopen.

4. If actual conditions or indicators for cases, testing and hospital capacity change, be prepared to reinstate former orders or impose stricter guidelines.
