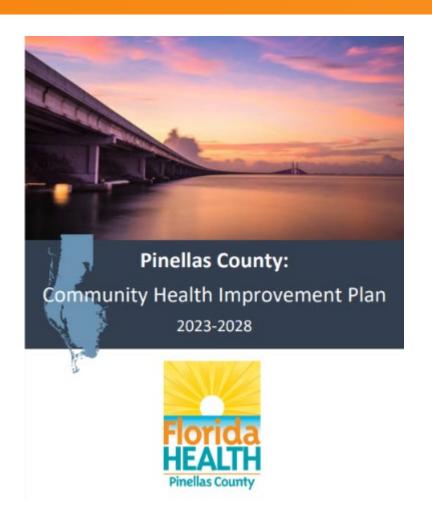






Top Health Priorities

DOH-Pinellas Highlights

- Provided > 1.1 million services last year
- Highest number of STI/ STD treatments provided among all the local county health departments in the state
- Opioid Overdose Prevention:
 - Continue to facilitate the Pinellas County Opioid Task Force
 - Distributed 2,753 naloxone kits
 - Participated in the Opioid Abatement Advisory
 - Starting Medicated Assisted Treatment in our Healthcare for the Homeless program
 - Continue to support the syringe exchange program

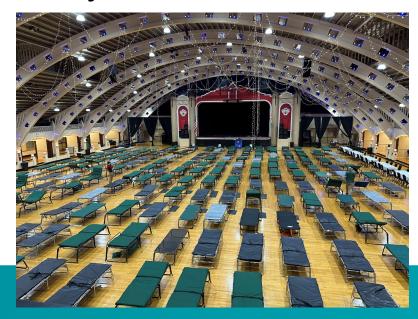


Public Health Preparedness

- DOH staff the Special Needs Shelters
- In 2024:
 - HS Helene: 237 clients
 - HS Milton: 1,098 clients
- Large stepdown shelter at the Coliseum: nearly 300 clients







School Health Nursing

- Contribute 40 LPN positions to schools, who also assisted in Special Needs Shelters
- Increase in referrals to community services and agencies including mental health and social services in 40 LPN schools:
 - 4,866 referrals SY 23/24
 - 5,861 referrals SY 24/25
- Assist with state-mandated physical screenings: vision, hearing, scoliosis, and growth and development:
 - Vision: 97.3%
 - Hearing: 96.8%
 - BMI: 97.2%
 - Scoliosis: 94.2%
- Assist with improved return to class rates:
 - 86.4% SY 23/24 LPN contracted schools
 - 88% SY 24/25 LPN contracted schools



Dental Sealants

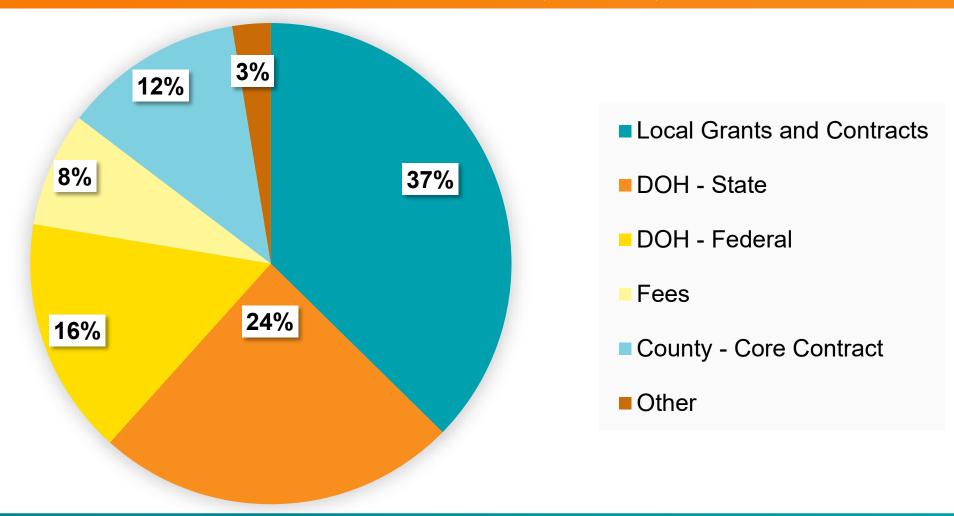
- 53 Title I Elementary Schools and 15 Head Start Centers
- 8,688 children were screened and given oral health instruction
- 3,544 children received sealants
- 14,726 teeth were sealed





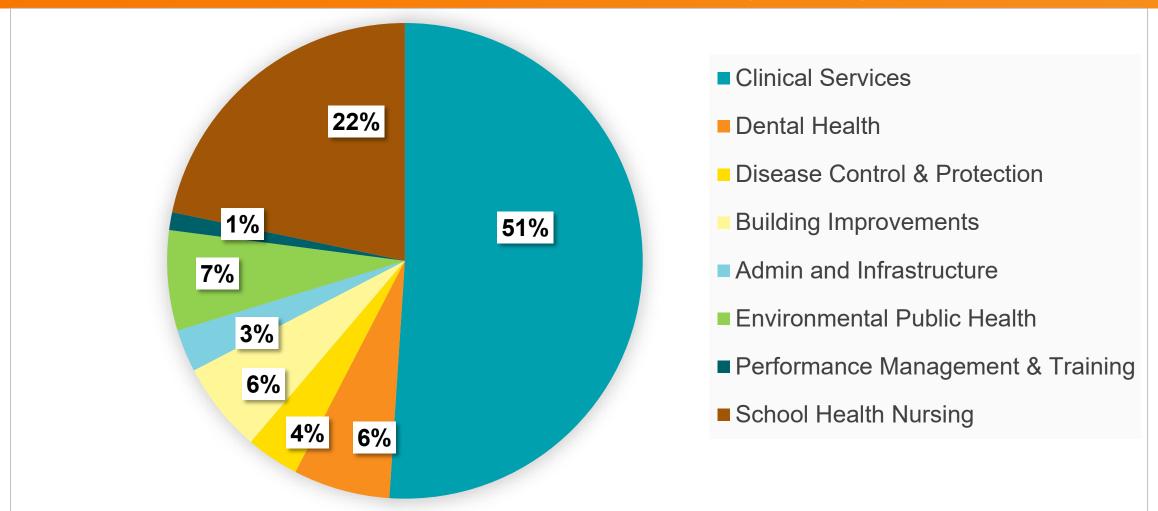


FY 2024-2025 Financial Resources: \$67,173,650

FY 2025-2026 County Resources

Resources are provided by the Board of County Commissioners (BCC) through a core contract agreement for programs approved in the annual County budget, totaling \$8,013,000.

Ad Valorem Taxes (0.0713)

- Public Health Services \$5,943,090
- School Health Nurses \$2,069,920
- Health Fund Reserves \$4,154,430



Infrastructure Proposal

- Clearwater AC Replacement: 2 chillers, engineering and roof stairs total \$500,000
- St. Pete Roof: \$2.5 Million
- St. Pete Space Assessment To be performed by CBRE \$115,000
- Mid-County Engineering Projects: \$900K
 - Moisture Intrusion Engineering reports recommend to install a moisture barrier which will force replacement of 1st floor
 - Slab Adjustment: Engineering confirmed no further moving Installing expansion remediation and flooring
 - Conference Room Sound Barrier: Metal roof does not have sound barrier
