




















2018 Great American Cleanup

Each spring KPB recruits volunteers, site captains, and sponsors to participate in the Great American Cleanup. These community improvement initiatives include litter abatement, gardening and tree plantings, and invasive removals. These events foster unity and strengthen community bonds through community improvement and beautification projects at multiple locations throughout the county. During the 2018 Great American Cleanup, we worked with 6,619 volunteers to clean up 283,645 lbs of litter and remove 76,694 lbs of invasive species. As a result, KPB returned over \$500,315.62 in measurable benefits across Pinellas County.

















2018 International Coastal Cleanup

This fall we continued our partnership with the Ocean Conservancy to host the International Coastal Cleanup. Through these efforts we hope to minimize the impact of marine and terrestrial debris within our Pinellas County ecosystems. During the months of September and October, we worked with 3,505 volunteers to remove 125,678 lbs of litter and 17,242 lbs of invasive species from our Pinellas County waterways. As a result, KPB returned over \$239,6326.25 in measurable benefits across Pinellas County.









Education

Education is fundamental in all that we do. Our educational programs provide presentations, outreach education services, and experiential learning opportunities to residents of all ages in the areas of Litter Prevention, Waste Reduction, Conservation, Beautification and Community Greening. In addition to education presentations, KPB hosts a free youth workshop series in the summer. This year's program included a Middle School Watershed Workshop and two High School Environmental Leadership Workshops. Throughout 2018 we held 459 educational presentations reaching 32,922 community members.

Additionally KPB spread environmental awareness to 8,194 citizens at 48 outreach events.

Community Improvement

Keep Pinellas Beautiful engages residents to be a part of our community improvement initiatives to create positive change and a lasting impact within our local communities. We host environmentally impactful events throughout the year, including the Great American Cleanup and the International Coastal Cleanup. Additional Community Improvement initiatives include: cleanups, native species plantings, sustainable gardens, tree plantings, invasive removals, and mulching. In total we successfully held 1,141 cleanup and beautification events during the 2018 year. By engaging 18,873 volunteers, we removed 614,584 lbs of litter and 147,668 lbs of invasive species. Volunteers also assisted through the planting of 121 trees and 1,776 flowers/shrubs. As a result, KPB saved our County \$1,296,414.34 in measurable benefits.


Adoptions

Our Adoption Programs offer individuals, groups, and corporations an opportunity to give back to their communities in a highly visible way. Through this free program, participants adopt an area of Pinellas County and receive the training and supplies to host their own cleanups. Adoptions include: County roads, Pinellas Trail, shorelines, intracoastal islands, piers, communities, and alleyways. This year we introduced a new partnership with the City of St. Petersburg adding on alleyway adoptions to our program. We look forward to continuing to develop this program with the city to improve conditions in St. Petersburg alleyways. In total, 4,774 volunteers cleaned 819 miles, removing an estimated 19,982 lbs of trash. Through the contributions of these efforts, KPB has saved the County \$161,332.88 in measurable benefits.

Litter Hotline

The KPB Litter Hotline was designed to have direct input from our County residents. Residents assist us in our countywide beautification efforts by reporting excessive trash and illegal dumping. Pinellas citizens can call the 24 hour reporting line, (727)-210-4663, to give the details of an illegal dump or littered site in the County. Keep Pinellas Beautiful will further investigate and remove the litter or direct the resident to additional resources. In 2018, KPB received **246 hotline calls** resulting in over **35,795 lbs of litter** being removed from our community.


As a result, the combined efforts abated 614,584.71 pounds of Litter

we see that we saved taxpayers \$1,296,414.34 (of labor) in community improvement services.
