I understand that you have been urged, and plan, to consider this Thursday proposals to repeal the mask ordinance that was adopted to help stem the spread of COVID-19.

Since it has also been discovered that persons can be infected and contagious without even having symptoms, it is even more critical that everyone wear a mask to protect from becoming ill and to prevent the spread from asymptomatic carriers. Respected medical journals, such as the New England Journal of Medicine, are publishing scientific articles with significant data proving that wearing of masks greatly reduces transmission. As someone who works in the pharmaceutical industry in R&D, and who is currently working on COVID treatments that are in clinical trials, I understand the importance of these measures. Any preventable illness or death that might occur at my place of employment due to someone not wearing a mask in public could mean someone taken away from the important work of getting these treatments and vaccines into the marketplace as quickly as possible.

To whom it may concern,

The Pinellas County Commissioners are meeting this Thursday, September 17, 2020 to discuss lifting the mask mandate that requires masks to be worn in public places. The Commission has been inundated over the past several weeks with well-organized and vocal anti-mask advocates emailing and calling in to public meetings, demanding the ordinance be repealed.

It is critical that Pinellas County Commissioners also hear voices reflecting sound science and a concern for public health and safety. Instructions for commenting on keeping the mask mandate at this Thursday's Board of County Commissioners meeting are below.

Dr. Angus Jameson, the medical director for Pinellas County Emergency Medical Services, described the COVID-19 as an unpredictable new disease that medical experts are still studying. Although disease rates are lower than they were at the peak of the pandemic, the epidemic is far from over. Consider the following:

1. The drop in local disease and death rates are because we are wearing masks; wherever there are no masks (North Dakota/South Dakota, for example) the highest increases have been observed.
2. If we stop wearing masks the risk of increased disease and death will rise again, as we have seen in other parts of the world, requiring repeated shut downs.
3. We have just begun to re-open and re-enter bars– we risk inviting the virus to spread more freely by encouraging more interaction without masks.
4. Hillsborough County continues with a mask ordinance. In a regional economy with many people commuting between counties we need consistent mask mandates. Committing to stopping this deadly virus is the surest path to full economic recovery.
5. We are a tourist economy – people will be coming here from all over the country and world. Adherence to the mask mandate will reduce the likelihood of disease transmission brought from areas experiencing a resurgence of cases.
6. The highest infection and mortality rates are among people of color, the elderly and essential service workers. These disproportionately harmed groups need us to wear masks to protect their health and their lives.
7. Wearing a mask is inconvenient, but they are the best way to stop this disease and get our economy working again. There are many precedents for rules that protect public health, such as anti-smoking laws. Mask ordinances a life-saving policy tool.

I urge you to not lift the mask mandate, in doing so you will inadvertently harm and potentially end hundreds, if not thousands of lives. Please think of the larger picture and long-term future instead of the uncomfortable, short-term, present day. It is now more than ever that we need to embrace our compassion for one another and show mutual respect by wearing a mask, no matter how inconvenient it may seem. In doing so, you are showing that you care for the lives around you and your community. We need to protect our community and demonstrate that they matter. By lifting the mask mandate, you are giving a death sentence to your community and their loved ones. Don't be the reason that people must leave their loved ones to die alone in a hospital. Don't be the one to contribute to the increasing infection and death rate. Don't lift the mask mandate and DO better.

I'm fearful what lifting the mask rule will do in our schools. Having a husband who teaches, I've heard first hand of the many difficulties teachers are dealing with in an already intensely stressful situation. I can't imagine what this would do to encourage that many more to leave their positions as they see yet another way in which they aren't being valued.

Once the rule is gone, should numbers rise again, it will be near impossible to reinstitute the mandate. Though this is not something we want to see happen, we can't be confident that it won't. Why go there, risking a relapse? There are many rules that keep societal order that may be "inconvenient" to many of us, yet of course we would not think of breaking them as the safety of our community would be negatively impacted. I just don't see how wearing a mask is any different.

You and the Commission are meeting this Thursday, September 17, 2020 to discuss lifting the mask mandate that requires masks to be worn in public places. I know you have been inundated over the past several weeks with well-organized and vocal anti-mask advocates emailing and calling in to public meetings, demanding the ordinance be repealed.

It is critical that our Commissioners also hear voices reflecting sound science and a concern for public health and safety. Instructions for commenting on keeping the mask mandate at this Thursday's Board of County Commissioners meeting are below.

Dr. Angus Jameson, the medical director for Pinellas County Emergency Medical Services, described the COVID-19 as an unpredictable new disease that medical experts are still studying. Although disease rates are lower than they were at the peak of the pandemic, the epidemic is far from over. Consider the following:

1. The drop in local disease and death rates are because we are wearing masks; wherever there are no masks (North Dakota/South Dakota, for example) the highest increases have been observed.
2. If we stop wearing masks the risk of increased disease and death will rise again, as we have seen in other parts of the world, requiring repeated shut downs.
3. We have just begun to re-open and re-enter bars– we risk inviting the virus to spread more freely by encouraging more interaction without masks.
4. Hillsborough County continues with a mask ordinance. In a regional economy with many people commuting between counties we need consistent mask mandates. Committing to stopping this deadly virus is the surest path to full economic recovery.
5. We are a tourist economy – people will be coming here from all over the country and world. Adherence to the mask mandate will reduce the likelihood of disease transmission brought from areas experiencing a resurgence of cases.
6. The highest infection and mortality rates are among people of color, the elderly and essential service workers. These disproportionately harmed groups need us to wear masks to protect their health and their lives.
7. Wearing a mask is inconvenient, but they are the best way to stop this disease and get our economy working again. There are many precedents for rules that protect public health, such as anti-smoking laws. Mask ordinances a life-saving policy tool.

Please vote to continue the mask mandate for public places. Thank you.

Hopefully your decision is led by science and we can get to a day after day decline in cases for atleast 14 days before changes are made, along with improved access to testing, contact tracing and eventually a vaccine.
