

School Health Nurses Initiative

- Began SY17-18 only 33 schools, School Year 20-21, Nurse in all 125 schools
- Significant reduction in services due to COVID-19 & online learning:
 - Referrals to community services and Agency (4/30/21) ytd 7,868 19% reduction
 - Educational opportunities offered (ytd 3/31/21) 33,058 students, 12,222 parents, 10,147 staff.
 - Return to class rate ytd (4/30/21) 82.16% compared to 93.7% (3/30/20)
 - Mandatory screening targets reduced by 10%; 61.69% vision, 62.84%hearing, 26.22% scoliosis and 24.136% BMI
- Continue to improve management of immunization compliance rates in all public school:
 - SY21-22 nurses will track immunization status, & communicate with parents,
 - information letters with immunization requirements sent to 263 childcare centers to distribute to 4yr old entering school SY21-22


Pinellas County Opioid Task Force


- Over 520 naloxone kits distributed directly to the homeless population in 2020.
