### What is the Penny for Pinellas?



A 1-percent sales tax building a better Pinellas since 1990



### **Penny Facts**

sales tax paid by everyone who spends money in the county.

is paid by tourists and seasonal visitors.



Not a new tax; Penny has been in effect since 1990.



### **Penny Facts**

Not collected on essentials, such as groceries or medications, and only applied to first \$5,000 of a single purchase.



### Stays local

The Penny is collected in Pinellas and builds a better Pinellas.



### **Penny Facts**

Investments without property tax
Annually, the Penny generates the
equivalent of 2.4 mills
of property tax
(\$286 for average home in Pinellas)

Leverages funding from other sources, including state and federal grants

Funds long-term, capital investments in roads, bridges, trails, parks, land, public facilities, public safety equipment, water quality and others.





#### **Guiding Principles & Strategies for Penny IV Investments**

- Using the Penny as a platform for partnership
- Preserve and extend life of existing assets
- Investing capital dollars to reduce long term operations and maintenance costs
- Address needs and gaps annual citizen survey
- Alignment with the strategic plan
- Public needs unmet by previous Penny
- Consider adaptations related to climate change, including sea level rise
- Prioritize/implement including commitment to age friendly community



### **Guiding Principles & Strategies for Penny IV Investments**

- Highlight signature projects within a master plan, allowing for changing priorities based on community needs and leveraging grant and other revenue opportunities
- Adopt portfolio approach prioritize projects that accomplish multiple public needs/priorities
- Countywide Investments: economic development capital projects, affordable/workforce housing, jail & courts facilities





Improved Roads, Bridges & Trails

- Road improvements
- Sidewalks
- Bicycle facilities
- Stormwater and wastewater improvements
- Intersection improvements
- Connect employment centers, cities and neighborhoods throughout the county





Improved Roads, Bridges & Trails

#### Major County Roads:

- Starkey Rd from East Bay Dr to Flamevine
- 62nd Ave N from 34th St to 49th St
- Forest Lakes Blvd from SR580 to SR584
- East Lake Rd Expansion Tampa Rd to Keystone Rd

#### Local Roads:

- 126th Ave from 34th St to US 19
- 46th Ave from 49th St to 35th St
- Gulf Boulevard Improvements





Improved Roads, Bridges & Trails

# Resurfacing, Restoration and Rehabilitation of Existing Roads:

- Belleair Rd from US 19 to Keene Rd
- Paving of unpaved roads (MSTU Program)
- 22nd Ave S from 58th St to 34th St

### Sidewalk Preservation and Improvement:

- Virginia Ave from Keene Rd to Hercules Ave
- Belcher Rd 38th Ave to 54th Ave N
- Hercules Ave from Sunset Point to Sherwood St
- Belleair Rd from Fort Harrison to Lake Ave





Improved Roads, Bridges & Trails

### **Intersection Improvements:**

- Belcher Rd/Gulf-to-Bay
- 49th St/58th Avenue N
- Keystone Rd/Fire Station
- East Lake and Ridgemoor
- Bay Pines and 95th St

#### Bridge Rehabilitation & Replacement:

- San Martin Blvd Bridge and Road
- Westwinds Dr and Crosswinds Dr Bridges
- Oakwood Dr Bridge
- Beckett Bridge
- Dunedin Causeway Bridge





Improved Roads, Bridges & Trails

#### Trails:

- Fred E. Marquis Pinellas Trail Loop South Gap from Haines Bayshore to San Martin Bridge
- Construction of community trails to enhance the County trail network - Joe's Creek Trail and other connections to parks
- Resurface Fred E. Marquis Pinellas Trail segments
- Refurbish trail bridges/overpasses





Water Quality, Flood & Sewer Spill Prevention

<u>Stormwater/Sanitary Sewer System Projects -</u> Reduce Sanitary Sewer Overflows:

- Reduce impacts of surface water inflow into the sanitary sewer system
- Provide storage areas for stormwater
- Convey stormwater away from sewer system
- Preventing stormwater from entering sewer system





Water Quality, Flood & Sewer Spill Prevention

#### Regional Stormwater Systems:

- Reduce flooding and inflow into the sewer system
- Improve water quality discharging into our Bays, lakes, and the Gulf
- Remove properties from floodplain
- Provide economic development opportunities
- Neighborhood stormwater parks
- Converting paved areas to green infrastructure
- Floodplain compensation areas





Water Quality, Flood & Sewer Spill Prevention

#### Water Quality:

- Improve existing stormwater treatment facilities
- Develop new storage areas to treat stormwater prior to discharge
- Long Branch Regional Stormwater Retention Facility & Channel Restoration
- Joe's Creek Water Quality Improvements
- Alligator Creek Water Quality Improvements
- Roosevelt Creek Pond Improvements
- Improve Treatment Capacity in County-Owned Ponds
- Spring Branch Floodplain Preservation and Habitat Improvement Area





Water Quality, Flood & Sewer Spill Prevention

#### Flood Prevention:

- Reduce neighborhood flooding
- Replace aging pipes, structures, ditches, ponds
- Divert stormwater to storage areas
- Increase stormwater conveyance systems
- McKay Creek Watershed-wide Flood Reduction Projects
- Starkey Channel 8 Drainage Improvements through Green Meadows and Twin Oaks
- Pinebrook Canal / Cross Bayou Stormwater Management Improvements
- Crystal Beach Comprehensive Drainage Improvements





Water Quality, Flood & Sewer Spill Prevention

#### Flood Prevention (continued):

- Neighborhood Flood Reduction
  - Indian Rocks Rd Drainage Improvements in Harbor Bluffs
  - Cherokee Drive (48<sup>th</sup> Ave N) Drainage Improvements
  - Brooker Creek Channel Improvements
  - Chenango Rd and Sedeeva Dr
  - Ozona Area Drainage Improvements
  - Wexford Leas Roadway
  - Cross Bayou Estates
  - Lealman Area
- Road Flood Reduction:
  - Florida Ave (Tarpon Springs) Drainage Improvements
  - Drainage improvements along 62nd St N and side streets





Water Quality, Flood & Sewer Spill Prevention

#### **Erosion Control:**

- Creek and channel stabilization projects
- Joe's Creek Channel Erosion Control
- Curlew Creek Channel Improvements
- Stevenson's Creek Channel Reconstruction
- Lower Bee Branch Channel Restoration and Flood Reduction





Safe, Secure Community

#### **Emergency Evacuation Shelters:**

- Increasing countywide shelter capacity
- Design or hardening of existing buildings

### **Emergency Communication Radio Towers:**

Replace/improve radio towers

#### Public Safety Vehicles, Equipment & Facilities:

- Sheriff vehicles, vessels, facilities
- Fire & EMS vehicles, vessels, facilities

### **Animal Services Facility**

Update and expand service capabilities





### **Preserving Parks & Our Environment**

#### Renovate/replace park structures:

- Shelters, bathrooms, boardwalks, playgrounds, observation towers
- Boat ramps, docks, and sea walls

#### Replace aging parks utility infrastructure:

- Lift stations, pump stations, water/sewer lines
- Fire hydrants, electrical supply lines

Paving park roads, parking lots, replace sidewalks





### **Preserving Parks & Our Environment**

#### Wall Springs Park Expansion:

- Public access to north & central tracts
- Trails, boardwalks, shelters
- Canoe/kayak launch
- Primitive camping, interpretive signage

#### **Environmental Land Acquisition:**

Target 250 acres

#### Taylor Homestead:

Renovate historic Taylor homestead for public use and education





- Visitor Center with archives/artifacts/document storage
- Turner Bungalow renovation

# Community Centers, Libraries, Recreational Facilities:

- East Lake Community Library Expansion
- Palm Harbor Recreation Center
- Lealman Community Recreational Center
- Tierra Verde Community Center
- Unincorporated Seminole Recreation Facilities
- Partner Facilities Capital Projects
  - Capital Improvements to County-owned facilities operated by community partners Examples: Palm Harbor Library, Ridgecrest YMCA, Seminole Youth Sports fields.

#### **Government Customer Service Facilities:**

- County Customer Service Centers
- Renewal and Replacement -Preserving/Extending Life of Facilities
- Audiovisual Technology Upgrades for improved citizen access to public meetings
- Technology Infrastructure





### **Community Vitality**

#### **Community Projects:**

- Lealman CRA / Innovation District Complete Streets 54th Ave Project
- Community Redevelopment Stormwater
   Management (Joe's Creek Industrial Area)
- Palm Harbor Master Plan Projects
- Target Area Recreation

### Housing (Countywide Investment):

- Land assembly for affordable housing
- Mixed use projects featuring workforce housing
- Partnerships to develop transitional housing for displaced residents





### **Community Vitality**

#### **Economic Development Capital Projects:**

- Capital investment approved/improved sites
  - Attract and retain businesses
  - Retain and create jobs
  - Sites ready for employers to build to suit
- Assemble land
- Manage environmental testing and remediation
- Demolition of aging and obsolete structures
- Onsite and offsite infrastructure improvements
- Regulatory assistance



### **Next Steps and Timeline**

Ongoing – Public education and outreach open house events; Speakers Bureau

**June 2017** – Municipalities submit executed interlocal agreement

**July 18, 2017** – Authority to advertise the public hearing on ordinance with ballot language and BCC action on the interlocal agreement

August 1, 2017 – BCC considers ordinance with ballot language

Late September – Early October, 2017 – Ballots mailed

October 8 – November 5, 2017 – Early Voting (7 days/week at three Supervisor of Elections offices)

November 7, 2017 - Referendum on Penny renewal for 2020-2030
