


# **Study Overview & Methodology**

Pinellas County Citizen Survey Telephonic Methodology RDD—Random Digit Dial Calls Completed December 4, 2017- December 28, 2017 800 Completes—200 in North, Mid, South and Beaches Regions ±3.5% at 95% Confidence Level


# **Map of Regional Breakdowns**



Approximate 2010 Census populations by regions of study:




### **Demographics**



### **Tenure as Resident**

- The pool of respondents reflects a strong base of tenured residents.
  - More than half have lived in the county for 15 years or more
  - 23% have lived in the county less than five years

# **Highlights**

- Recommendations of Pinellas as a place to live and retire continue to be upheld by a majority of residents, however, fewer identified the County as a great place to work and raise children in 2018 as compared to 2017.
  - A significant volume of the definitely/probably would recommend Pinellas County as a place to work and raise children shifted to unsure in the current study as compared to 2017.
- Mid county residents and those with a high school education or less were less likely to recommend Pinellas as a place to work.
  - Their open comments indicated more frequent concerns regarding jobs, public infrastructure, a general sense that things are not getting better, and comments on the economy, than other demographic segments.
- South county, HHLDs with under \$50K in income and residents with a high school education or less were less likely to recommend Pinellas as a place to raise children.
  - Their open comments indicated more frequent concerns regarding jobs, support services, safety, the economy, education quality and traffic, among others.
- Despite declining recommendations, quality of life perspectives indicate significantly more residents both content at present and optimistic towards the future, than discontent.
  - An increasing majority consider quality of life to be as good if not better than five years ago and expect
    quality five years in the future to also be as good or better than the present.
- Factors named by respondents who view their quality of life to be worse than five years ago included **traffic** congestion, personal **safety**, **support services**, quality **schools** and **employment** opportunities as contributing factors to their rating.
  - Congestion, public infrastructure improvements, support services, homelessness, and housing affordability were named at a greater frequency than in prior studies.

# Highlights (cont'd)

- There were not *significant* shifts in citizen perceptions of expectations being met related to the community characteristics studied.
  - Top citizen priorities included personal safety, traffic flow, public infrastructure, aging population services and cleanliness of public spaces.
  - Traffic flow continued to be the largest expectation gap while support-oriented characteristics
    (mental health resources and services for disadvantaged residents) replaced pedestrian travel and
    biker safety as prior categories of most notable expectation gaps.
- Largest expectation gaps by region of residence were as follows:
  - North: Traffic flow on major roads, availability of mental and behavioral health resources, health care and human services for disadvantaged residents, opportunities for quality education, support services for the homeless
  - Mid: Traffic flow on major roads, supportive services for an aging population, availability of mental and behavioral health resources, support services for the homeless, health care and human services for disadvantaged residents
  - South: Traffic flow on major roads, housing affordability, availability of mental and behavioral health resources, supportive services for an aging population, support services for the homeless
  - Beaches: Traffic flow on major roads, availability of mental and behavioral health resources, support services for the homeless, health care and human services for disadvantaged residents, housing affordability
- The **high levels of trust and confidence in Pinellas County government** reported in 2017 were maintained in 2018.

### **County Recommendation**

- 9 in 10 resident respondents indicated that they would recommend Pinellas County as a place to *live* and *retire*.
- Approximately 8 in 10 would recommend Pinellas County as a place to *work* and raise children.


Would you recommend Pinellas County as a place to live, work, raise children, or retire?



### **Recommendation Trends: Live**

- 92% of residents recommend Pinellas County as a place to live
  - 4% decrease in definitely/probably would recommend responses
  - 2% increase in unsure responses
  - 3% increase in probably not/definitely not responses


### Recommendation Trend: Pinellas County as a Place to Live



### **Recommendation Trends: Work**

- 77% of residents recommend Pinellas County as a place to work
  - 15% decrease in definitely/probably would recommend responses
  - 12% increase in unsure responses
  - 2% increase in probably not/definitely not responses


### Recommendation Trend: Pinellas County as a Place to Work



### **Recommendation Trends: Raise Children**

- 82% of residents recommend Pinellas County as a place to raise children
  - 10% decrease in definitely/probably would recommend responses
  - 7% increase in *unsure* responses
  - 2% increase in probably not/definitely not responses


### Recommendation Trend: Pinellas County as a Place to Raise Children



### **Recommendation Trends: Retire**

- 92% of residents recommend Pinellas County as a place to retire
  - 4% decrease in definitely/probably would recommend responses
  - 1% increase in *unsure* responses
  - 2% increase in probably not/definitely not responses

### **Demographic Analysis**

Declines in respondents who would *definitely/probably recommend Pinellas County* as a place to *work* and *raise children* prompted a deep-dive into the demographics to understand who these respondents were. Below are the demographic segments that were either notably more or notably less complimentary of Pinellas County.

#### Recommend Pinellas as Place to Live

- More complimentary of Pinellas: College Degree, \$75K+ HHI
- Less complimentary of Pinellas: South, Under 40, Children in HHLD

### Recommend Pinellas as Place to Work

- More complimentary of Pinellas: Age 30-39, Children in HHLD
- Less complimentary of Pinellas : Mid-county, High School or Less

### Recommend Pinellas as Place to Raise Children

- More complimentary of Pinellas: Age 40-64
- Less complimentary of Pinellas: South, High School or Less, \$50K or Less HHI

#### Recommend Pinellas as Place to Retire

- More complimentary of Pinellas: \$75K+ HHI
- Less complimentary of Pinellas : Age 18-29, High School or Less

# **Quality of Life in Pinellas**

- Nearly three in four residents (74%) perceive their quality of life to be better or just as good compared to five years ago.
- Future optimism also prevailed, with 88% projecting the next five years to be better or just as good as the present.

Better or Just as Good as Five Years Ago 74%


### **Future Quality of Life**

# Sea-Level Rise Impact on Quality of Life

- Sea-level rise was not identified by respondents as an overwhelming factor weighing on their quality of life.
  - 8% are greatly concerned
  - 1 in 3 are somewhat concerned
  - Close to 3 in 5 haven't given it much thought or are unconcerned by it

The following rationales were provided by respondents who perceive their quality of life as being "worse" than five years ago:



### **Expectation Gap Trend vs. 2017**

- Respondent ratings of importance in relation to their satisfaction with the measured community characteristics revealed their expectation gaps. The larger the gap the greater room for improvement; smaller gaps reflect resident expectations being met.
- None of the changes noted reflect statistically significant increases or declines.









# **Overall Citizen Expectation Trend**


- Aggregated citizen expectation ratings indicate that Pinellas County is working to meet their expectations.

How important is it to you personally, that your community possesses the following characteristics? In your personal experience, are these characteristics true of Pinellas County?



How important is it to you personally, that your community possesses the following characteristics? In your personal experience, are these characteristics true of Pinellas County?


### Alignment with Citizen Expectation: Mid Residents

How important is it to you personally, that your community possesses the following characteristics? In your personal experience, are these characteristics true of Pinellas County?



How important is it to you personally, that your community possesses the following characteristics? In your personal experience, are these characteristics true of Pinellas County?


#### Alignment with Citizen Expectation: Beach Residents



### **Trust & Confidence**

- 9 in 10 (93%) residents reported having a *great deal* to a *fair amount* of trust and confidence in Pinellas County government's handling of County issues.
- Pinellas County trust and confidence ratings held consistent between 2017 and 2018.


How much trust and confidence do you have in Pinellas County government when it comes to handling County issues?
