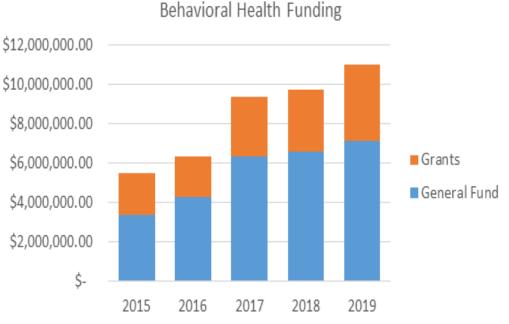

Provides wrap around mental health and substance abuse services to clients who were chronically homeless who are now permanently housed. Goal is to continually provide services to reduce the risk of return to homelessness.

Collaborative treatment court for Veterans currently involved with the criminal justice system who suffer from substance abuse problems with co-occurring PTSD, Traumatic Brain Injury, Military Sexual Trauma and other psychological or physical problems as a result of serving in the Armed Forces.

Those engaged with the Courage to Change project remained crime free during program enrollment.

Provides substance abuse treatment to parents who are involved in the child welfare system related to substance abuse.

Pinellas County Adult Baker Acts 2012-2017







Lack of Secure Marchman Beds/Facility

- May 2017- November 2018
 - Over the 19 month period, 1756 Marchman Acts were sent to the Pinellas County Jail. (92 per month)
 - 1,266 were accepted
 - 490 were refused for medical concerns and sent to the ER





Sustainability

- Grants are time limited and lack capacity to sustain without additional funding.
- Often, county is requested to fill gaps in funding to sustain successful programs.

Psychiatric Demand

- National Shortage of Psychiatry staff
- Wait times for a Psychiatric Evaluation can be approximately 30 days or more.





Health Information Exchange

• Florida does not have an active health information exchange. Workgroup in place to develop.

- Florida uninsured: Florida currently has an estimated 2.676 million uninsured individuals which is down from a high of 3.9 million in 2013. 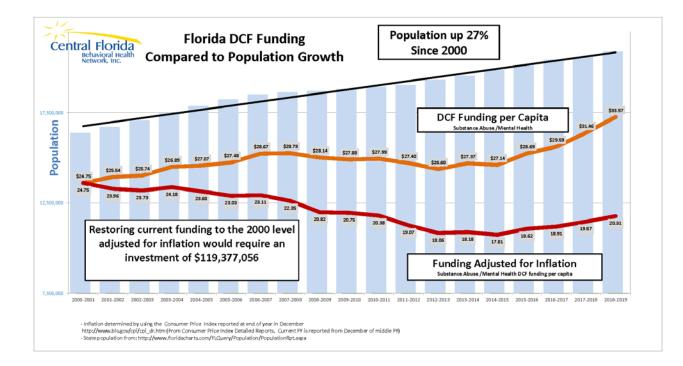

This project is funded through a grant and the Department of Children & Families

Strategic Plan Goals include:

- <u>Increase use of Peer Specialists</u> people in recovery with lived experience that assist individuals in their road to recovery
- <u>Increase spaces of "wellness</u>" in the community via consumer involvement, use of family voice and choice, and supporting efforts to remain well in the continuum of care. Also focus on identifying needs, building capacity, infrastructure development and financing options
- <u>Implement the Wraparound program</u> that supports wellness





Serves transition aged youth and young adults between the ages of 16-25 who are living with or at-risk of developing a serious mental health or co-occurring substance use and mental health related disorder.

Over 75% of the direct services staff are young adults themselves with lived and life experiences.

Core values of the program:

- Youth and Young Adult voice are critical to achieving successful outcomes
- Youth and young adults are the first experts of their lives
- Peers are critical to the success of young people, because young people learn best from other young people
- Services must be provided in the communities where young people reside

In Pinellas County, Florida Healthy Transitions providers are 2-1-1 Tampa Bay Cares and Suncoast Center.

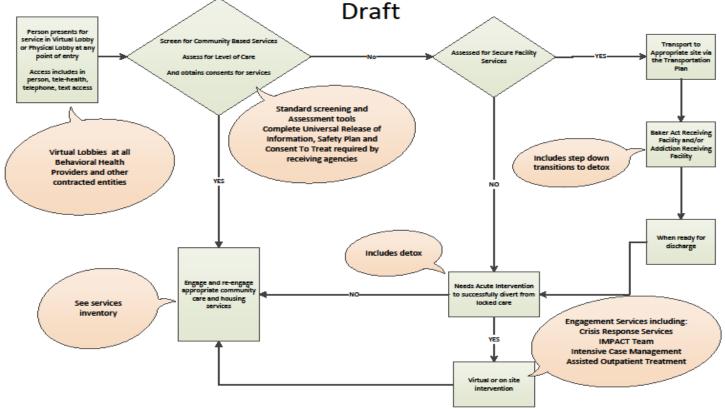
