
Grant Program

The CRA District boasts numerous facilities for the public that attract a steady stream of people. England Brothers Park has long served as a popular location for concerts and events, such as the City's iconic Country in the Park Festival. During 2017-2018, the CRA supported enhancements to the adjacent Performing Arts Center to expand available capacity and event opportunities.

The CRA District is the City's hub for arts and cultural events, as well as community gatherings. Located in the heart of the District, the Pinellas Arts Village features a monthly Art Walk. This free community event features local artists and vendors on the fourth Saturday of each month, beginning at 4 p.m.

The CRA issued a Request for Proposal for the United Cottages Neighborhood in August of 2018 after years of strategic site acquisition and assemblage. The 1.22-acre site, which was once one of the District's areas of most concern, will be transformed into a vibrant community of Live-Work units. These homes will provide a unique and attainable option for homeownership in the District.

An annual budget is adopted by the Pinellas Park Community Redevelopment Agency. By September 30 of each fiscal year, funds identified for the District have to be spent, encumbered or appropriated. These funds must be used for redevelopment programs and projects specified in the approved Redevelopment Plan.

community redevelopment Policing UNIT Addressing public health and safety is a major component of eliminating slum and blight. The officers assigned to the Redevelopment District are not only responsible for reducing crime, but also educating, building trust within the community, and recognizing blighted areas of the District that need attention. In addition to initiating thousands of contacts per year with residents and business in the CRD, the unit has organized Neighborhood Crime Watch units throughout the District, working closely with residents to monitor and address safety conditions as well as supporting neighborhood events and initiatives.

The Redevelopment Plan is a workable program for utilizing public resources to accomplish various redevelopment objectives:

- Create a new image for Pinellas Park through a strong downtown/city-center.

- Guide public policy and public investments to achieve long term redevelopment.

In Fiscal Year 2017/18, the CRA began the process of updating the Redevelopment Plan. The Plan Update will be completed in 2019 and will serve as the CRA's guiding document.
