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Dearest Commissioners and County Administrator Burton –

The attached letter, co-signed by 100+ community leaders, contains an urgent and time-sensitive request that you ensure that the allocation of the \$170 million in CARES Act funding approved for Pinellas County has a focus on equity.

The missive outlines why African Americans and other lower-income minority groups stand to be among the hardest-hit by the economic shutdown to contain the COVID-19 pandemic, and how community and system leaders are uniting to support many of the entrepreneurs who will be unable to access other emergency resources.

We applaud your many recent actions toward the goal of economic equity (some of which are mentioned on page 1 of the letter); and we ask that you apply the same intentional lens to the allocation of emergency resources that will help many remain afloat during this unprecedented economic downturn.

The letter asks for specific and immediate actions to ensure that our hardest-hit entrepreneurs and workforce segments have access to the help they urgently need.

- 1) Protect the vulnerable (elderly and those people with immune deficiencies, chronic conditions and premorbidity issues) - nursing homes and ALFs are the worst petri dish environments as we have seen our worst outbreaks in those type facilities. The elderly and informed in their own homes are, in many cases, already being helped by family, friends, neighbors, volunteers and church "family".
- 2) Promote getting people outside, out and about. Of course, care and common sense are a must when being out in public. The vast majority of people are much smarter than some give them credit for, so regulating the populous based on the least responsible sector of society only creates loss of trust in those in "authority". The beaches and parks here in Florida are perfect virus mitigating environments due to the conditions described above. This is not Spring Break any longer, so as a beach goer, there are few to no large groups gathering at the beaches. Most people I know and see at the beach like their own "space" and don't drop down their blanket and chairs right next to strangers.

My clients, business and individuals, have gone from various levels of being scared, to being concerned and now to increasing levels of anger and frustration. From my weekly (at a minimum) discussions with them, they are seeing the reality of the virus - it IS infectious and deadly, but it is panning out as being **MUCH** less deadly (by many

multiples) than the initial models indicated. They also have realized that many multiples of people have been or are infected with no or very mild symptoms, and they very well understand this proof of the building of herd immunity. They pay attention and they are not stupid - they do not need to be told how to mitigate since most or all of them take extra precautions during every flu season.

I'm sorry this is so lengthy, but I feel that We The People are seldom listened to and mostly not heard. I hope and pray this time it's different.

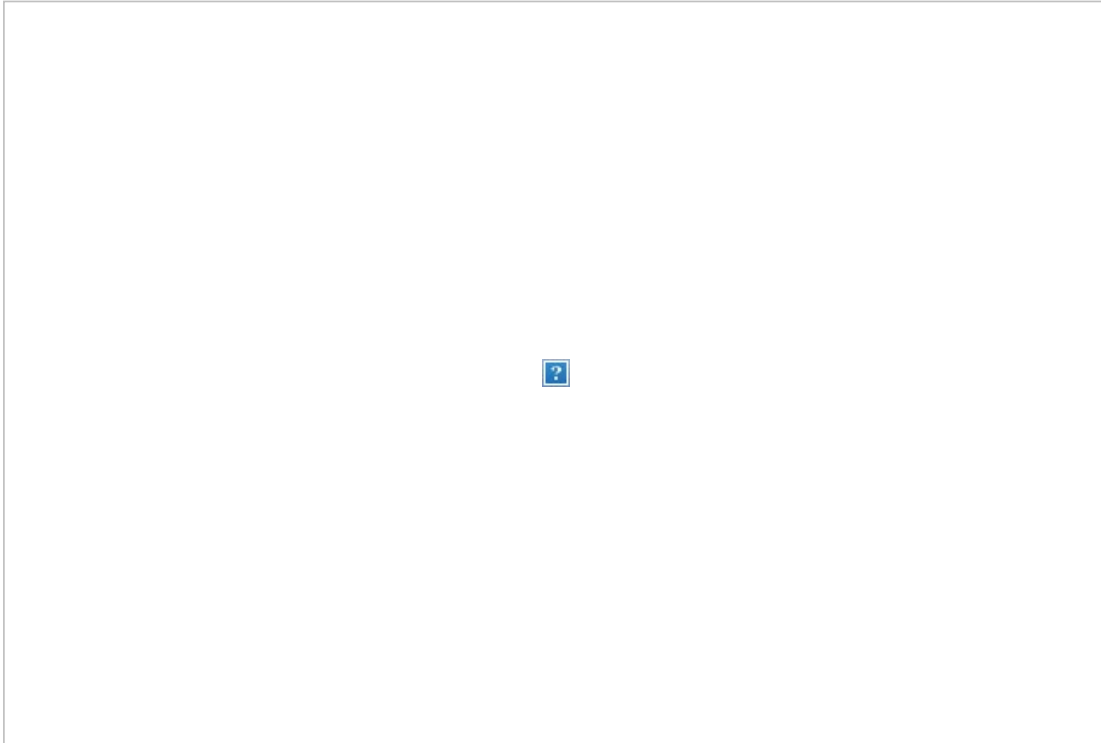

In today's "Covid-19" Update, Pat Gerard stated that "our steps" have worked in limiting the virus. Question #1 - How do you know that, based on what data? Did you run a baseline test on people not "safe in home"? If not, which I doubt, you have no data proving your claim.

Does the County feel it's citizens are entitled to full transparency and explanation of this "data"? This answers, if given, will be very interesting. The only data I have seen used are the #Cases, #Deaths...that's it. Using just these 2 data points is incredibly misleading, frankly, can not be used in decision making. Why? 1) You have zero idea of how many "cases", past and current, exist because you only know how many tested cases exist and said testing is only given to the very sick (and maybe the "important people who have connections). The past and present "cases" are many multiples higher than what we know. That's actually good news many hundreds, more likely many thousands in Pinellas County already have anti-bodies! This is something you don't know going on limited data, meaning you will make decisions based on ignorance. That's not a good way to lead.

I have previously sent you the blog by the renowned Dr. Scott Atlas, a Senior Fellow from Stanford University's Hoover Institute. I trust that all have read this and have the intellectual curiosity to seek other similar experienced and knowledge based discussions of how this virus works and what we must do to help mitigate it - and essentially locking people in their homes is not how it's done. If you are hanging your hat on Dr. Fauci's approach, I suggest that is more of a risk since he has substantially changed his stance on the virus at least 5 times since February. His previous handling of prior outbreaks were all littered with potholes and inconsistencies.

In the meantime, I hope you all actually have the sole intent to do what's best for the citizens of Pinellas County, and without other motivations that will interfere with that basic task.

I urge you to have safeguards in place for the elderly, especially in those inside, climate controlled, re-circulated air nursing homes and ALFs as well as urging those with chronic conditions and those with immune system deficiencies to take extra care and try to limit visitors as well as trips out of the home to indoor public areas.

I also urge you to NOT treat the rest of the Pinellas County populous the same as those high at risk. That will prove to be a "prolonging the virus" approach and if you're still not understanding that, I again urge you to read Dr. Scott Atlas' published blog as well as seek articles by Dr. John Ioannidis, professor of multiple medical disciplines at Stanford University. I am an independent contractor in a 6-salon suite building (2100 sq ft). There are five other Independent Contractors in my building. We share a community bathroom, laundry room, lobby, and dryer station. We cannot do social distancing in our field. The client cannot wear a mask during services because we need access to behind the ears for cutting, and for color services. The client will be contaminating the area if they cannot wear a mask. Taking time to sanitize every surface between clients will take time. Double booking will not be an option, due to timing for services, sanitation, and social distancing. The stylist could wear a proper mask once they are back in stock. The mask would need to be of hospital grade quality. Many of our clients are advanced in years so they will be at a higher risk. Having so many communal areas, as the stylists including myself have all been put out of work due to social distancing.

We will be trying to catch up on bills, and therefore can't keep track of who goes in the communal areas and possibly contaminates the area for everyone else. Even in compliance with current salon guidelines from the state and what I am proposing we still have one big hurdle. Testing. Until we can verify and test more people, we do not know who is at risk and what the factual numbers are.

I am coming up with my plan for when we can re-open. I plan on sticking to my regular business hours to limit any additional exposure. I also plan on sending a questionnaire to clients in order to have a trail for any tracing that needs to be done in the event exposure does happen. In addition to that I plan on having a fresh cape for each client, gloves for the client to wear to limit contact on surfaces. Due to a building that shares air conditioning vents with the other salons I plan on having an air purifier as well as an oil diffuser utilizing oils for air purification. I plan on having clients wait in their cars until I am ready to perform the service.

Questionnaire:

Have you been out of the country in the last 30 days?
Have you been to a hospital in the last 30 days?
Have you taken anyone to the hospital in the last 30 days?
Have you had a fever in the last 30 days?
Do you present any symptoms of Covid-19?

I already have a compromised immune system, I'm worried my business is going to go under, and I am worried to return to work right away without proper testing and precautions. As the days go by, I am coming up with additional protocols to take to make myself feel safe providing services. I miss my clients and my career very much and am anxious to get back to it, but I feel with the contact and closeness we have with our clients, phase one is too soon. I am losing out on a lot of money but the life of my husband as well as my own and those we love means more.

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It looks like our Sheriff and Administrator are now in favor of opening the pools. As the President of our condo Board, I called an executive session last Thursday and we created our rules which support social distancing while in the pool. We have no real way to enforce this; so we stated that our residents must manage this or the board would have to close the pool again. This was Commissioner Peters solution when I asked how to manage problems with the pool usage since we have 160+ residents and one medium sized pool.

I also read that there would be additional sanitization required. Are we going to get details on what is required? We have a property management company, but they haven't heard what will be required either. Our attorney informed us that our liability insurance will not cover lawsuits regarding negligence for Covid-19, so any support you can provide on what is required would be appreciated.

Another misconception I keep hearing is that snowbirds have left and condos are empty. Most of our snowbirds are retired and from New York, Chicago and other hotspots. They didn't go back and I don't think they will anytime soon.

Thank you, and I look forward to a complete data driven and comprehensive motion being made that includes recognition of condo associations' liability issues and sanitization methods.

PS: We also set up an agreement with our property manager to allow people who are financially not able to pay their monthly fees to be allowed to repay them on a payment plan when they return to work. We had some building improvements that we might have to postpone, but we will manage.

Hello Pat Gerard,

I am one of the many small business owners struggling to keep our doors open. So far, we have managed to keep our staff on payroll despite the restrictions that we believe are now unfairly placed on a large segment of our particular business, pet grooming.

Our grooming department, which is 35% of our income, has been closed for weeks without any idea as to when my groomers can get back to work. Grooming can be done with social distancing and is essential for our pets' health. Many of our customers are elderly and unable to care for their animals. Many of their pets have conditions that require regular care, from nail trimming, flea bathing, ear cleaning, to special baths for dogs and cats with skin conditions.

Grooming is a much-needed service that can safely be conducted. It will also help ease the opening of our economy by putting people back to work safely.

We are not allowed to sell pets either, not even fish. The small amount of dog and cat food we sell is not enough to sustain our mom and pop business of over thirty-five years.

I applied for financial help through my local Regions branch, but the SBA money has run out. I also have not received the Twelve-hundred-dollar stimulus check, and neither have any of my seven employees.

We are at the point where the solution is weighing heavier than the problem. Many small businesses will not survive this much longer. Mine is one of them. I know you are a strong voice for the working people. We need to hear from you. One cannot feed the horse while the barn is burning down. Our country needs immediate action on this financial debacle. Thank you for your time.
