Timeline



June 2015

- State of Florida enacted a new statute requiring Human Trafficking Public Awareness Signs
 - Authorizes counties to adopt ordinances to enforce the requirements
 - Effective January 1, 2016

January 2016

- Board of County Commissioners approve ordinance
 - Ordinance effective March 1, 2016

Public Awareness



Alert employees and the public about the existence, remedies and protections related to human trafficking

- Provides the hotline number to the National Human Trafficking Resource Center
- Required at the following locations:
 - Adult Entertainment establishments
 - Any business or establishment offering massage or bodywork services that is not owned by a healthcare professional
 - Specialty salons performing nail services

Sign Requirements



Public Awareness Signs must:

- Be displayed in a conspicuous location that is clearly visible to the public and employees of the establishment.
- Be at least 8.5 inches by 11 inches in size and printed in at least 16-point type.
- State substantially the following in English and Spanish:
 - "If you or someone you know is being forced to engage in an activity and cannot leave whether it is prostitution, housework, farm work, factory work, retail work, restaurant work, or any other activity call the National Human Trafficking Resource Center at 1-888-373-7888 or text INFO or HELP to 233-733 to access help and services. Victims of slavery and human trafficking are protected under United States and Florida law."

WARNING SIGNS

- Signs of physical abuse
- Non-English speaking
- Deprived of food, water, sleep or medical care
- Someone whose communication is restricted
- A large number of occupants in one residence
- Someone who is rarely seen outside the residense
- Always accompanied when outside the residence
- Not allowed to socialize or attend religious services
- Outside locks on doors and windows to prevent someone from leaving the residence
- No travel documents for identification, i.e. birth certificate, passport, visa, social security card or ID card

QUESTIONS TO ASK

- Can you leave your job if you want to?
- Can you come and go as you please?
- Have you or your family been threatened?
- What are your working and living conditions like?
- Do you have to ask permission to eat/sleep/ go to the bathroom?
- Are there locks on your doors/windows so you cannot get out?
- Has your identification or documentation been taken away from you?

Since inception of the ordinance, 536 businesses have downloaded the sign from the website for posting.

Consumer Protection sends a letter to new businesses annually advising them of the requirements and includes a copy of the sign to assist in ensuring availability for posting.



Pasco County
