

What is Human Trafficking?

- Florida State Statute 787.06- Human Trafficking
- "Human trafficking" means transporting, soliciting, recruiting, harboring, providing, enticing, maintaining, or obtaining another person for the purpose of exploitation of that person.
- The Legislature finds that human trafficking is a form of modern-day slavery. Victims of human trafficking are young children, teenagers, and adults.
- The Legislature finds that victims of human trafficking are subjected to force, fraud, or coercion for the purpose of sexual exploitation or forced labor.
 - Force, fraud, or coercion not needed for a juvenile case*

The Tampa Bay Human Trafficking Task Force

January 2020 through September 2020

• Sex trafficking

- Member agencies opened 107 new investigations
- \circ Member agencies reported 34 resulting arrests from investigations.
- Member agencies reported 79 potential victims involved in investigations with 10 of the victims identified as 17 years of age or younger.
- Labor Trafficking
 - Member agencies opened 7 new investigations and identified 15 potential victims.
